"THAT WET DAY" by Rod McGiveron

I still remember that day, a Thursday I think it was in May 1974. We had got word that morning about school being cancelled until further notice because of the flood. Yes we had an unexpected holiday. Little did we know that it would be weeks before we had full classes again and before everything would get back to normal. I can't remember exactly how much rain fell over those few days but it was so heavy and persistent it seemed inconceivable there could be that much water up there.

That morning I remember just standing in our porchway looking down the valley toward Legge's and Napier's properties. It was just like an ocean stretching right out to the base of the foothills in the distance. No high ground anywhere. We'd had floods in 1971 and 1972 but nothing like this.

At lunch time my father walked in the door unexpectedly. He worked on the railway fettler's gang and they had been restricted to the sheds at the station because it was impossible to get the gang motors out as major parts of the Twenty-Six Mile, their section, had been rendered impassable and dangerous right down the valley. As you can imagine we pestered and annoyed him to distraction to take us around in the car for a good old sticky-beak. What we saw was almost unbelievable. We could only venture to the town boundaries because St Marys was isolated. Cut off to the world and one of the DMR workers that day had been posted to the town rim to make sure that no one breached the road closed signs. Together with the police that day they had the work in front of them. Senior Constable Doug Cornelius also patrolled the town keeping vigil.

It would have been early afternoon when all roads were classed as unusable to all traffic. This later unfortunate eventuality contributed to a tragedy for the town. Around the streets people were relating stories of what they had seen. I remember one of the Hydro truck crews saying that huge rocks had rolled across the road together with trees and other debris on Elephant Pass. Others told of sections of the main highway to Fingal inundated and the big news of course was that two sections at the top and another further down of the St Marys Pass had completely collapsed. TNT 9 were filming footage but would struggle to get it to air. I can't remember now whether they did or not but it was exciting to see the news crew on the town. Paul Murphy was the reporter, I think.

The whole thing to us kids was proving to a real adventure but looking back on it now it adversely affected the whole area and the cost was horrible.

Over the hours the floodwaters encroached on Mrs Cooper's, Bruce Spilsbury's garage, the Milk Bar, the little old library, Ray White's and so many other properties especially down around Story Street and low lying areas on the other side of the river. Mr Guy Morris" house located high up on the bank even seemed under threat because the rain waters were undercutting the river bank also. From the newsagency to almost the cemetery, all the stormwater drains couldn't contain the volume of water and the roadway consequently remained obscured. People milled around the hotel which was also inundated. One very strong memory that remains is the intense strength of the actual river itself. It's hard to imagine how the supports of both bridges in the town withstood the onslaught of the normally placid Break O'Day. You saw tree butts, fences, drums and branches, anything else you care to mention being rushed downstream faster than anyone could run and what's more only a few centimetres away from the carriageway. They reported later than night the water actually did spill over for a while.

As I mentioned before, the town was isolated for several hours on that fateful day. At the time the young couple who ran the top milk bar had one of their sons ill. During the night the young bloke's condition worsened and the situation with the flood certainly hampered everyones best efforts to help him that day. One wonders if things would have been different otherwise. The whole town really felt for the MacGregor family in their loss.

As you can imagine the district lost livestock and property. There was serious damage to paddocks through erosion. Extensive repairs were required to roads, passes and rail links and not forgetting the damage to residences of course.

At school it was several weeks before St Helens students could attend regular classes at St Marys District High School and special classes were held daily there. Bicheno and Valley students fared better and were back the following week after quicker repairs to roads in the area.

On the light side legend has it that people observed trout swimming across roads and yards. I do remember my father walking in one night with a bag of fish he retrieved from a depression in one of the fields next to the rail line at Frodsley after the flood receding had left them trapped.



It wasn't long after that when there was a major clean-up of large stands of willows that used to over hang most of the river frontage in and around the town. The experts argued that the trees failed to allow proper dispersion of the floodwater thereby contributing to the more substantial effect of the water because it was more concentrated. I don't suppose anyone will ever know if this was right or not.

By 1929 standards probably the 1947 floods weren't as bad but it will always remain entrenched in my memory as a poignant reminder how much floods or bushfires or any other such occurrence affect a small community such as ours.



A free mammography screening service for the early detection of breast cancer will **commence** in **St Marys** on **February 20th** from the mobile bus unit.

It will stay on site in the grounds of the District Hospital till March 3, 1995 and then move to St Helens to commence screening March 7th.


The service is particularly keen to hear from women aged 50-69 years.

LANDCARE NEWS

As we all probably know the years 1990- 2000 is the Decade of Landcare. So what is Landcare, you may well ask.

Landcare is a community program involving land holders and other people to tackle land and water degradation of concern in the local area. Despite its clean and green images Tasmania does have degradation problems on both private and public lands, and the Landcare Program encourages good land management and sustainable productivity.

On farm lands it makes sense that land holders and members of the local community to work together to solve problems such as pests and weeds, water and wind erosion, salinity, stream bank erosions and flooding and tree decline.

Solutions need to be planned, not one property at a time, but to cover the whole catchment area or sub catchment area. Projects may include protection of remnant vegetation, wildlife habitats on land use management plans.

What can I do if i live in a town?

 Plan my garden so I don't waste water or energy and avoid the unnecessary use of chemicals.

 Use grass clippings, leaves, prunings and peelings to make compost to add to my garden to increase earthworms and so improve the soil.

3. Try to reduce the amount of rubbish I throw away by recycling.

The St Marys Landcare Group is in the business of recycling, so please help us to help this community with the recycling area at the tip.

Glass, no matter its colour, and aluminium cans, are obviously the main source of income from recycling to date, but unfortunately for us, often people have the same ideas and constantly help themselves to our collections.

Of course we take plastic containers. Not all plastics are recycleable at this stage, but we are willing to sort them out. We do require your assistance in rinsing out these containers. Milk cartons also require thorough rinsing and should be flattened and places inside one carton to form a brick.

In the near future we hope to establish composting facilities and an earthworm farm so we can extend our service to the community.

Sec. St Marys Landcare Group.

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Tasmanias' forests are justly famous for their wealth of temperate plant life, including a rich variety of ferns and mosses. At Evercreech and Mathinna Falls you will experience Tasmanian wet forest at its most beautiful, with a tall canopy filtering the light falling on lush ferns, mossy banks and clear streams. Rare fern communities which include all five Tasmanian tree fern species are protected in Lower Marsh Creek Forest Reserve.

Griffin

Located 7 km west of Mathinna, this reserve is situated on grassy flats adjacent to the South Esk River. The Ben Lomond Plateau is a pleasant backdrop to an area that is ideal for fishing, swimming, picnicing and camping. Parking areas, picnic tables, barbecues and toilets have been provided. To get there, follow the signs from Mathinna.

Lower Marsh Creek

Just off the Tasman Highway a few kilometres south of Gray contains some of Tasmania's best native tree fern stands. This reserve was set aside to conserve a habitat for all five of the State's tree fern species, including one, the skirted tree fern, Cyathea marcescens, found nowhere else. Others are the soft tree fern, Dicksonia antarctica, slender tree fern, Cyathea cunninghamii, rough tree fern, C. australis, and king fern, Todea barbara.

Mt. Puzzler

This reserve is situated on the upper reaches of the St. Pauls River. A 30 to 40 minute walk leads to the Meadstone Falls, where the St. Pauls River drops 20 metres into a deep pool. Both up and downstream from the falls, a series of crystal clear pools are connected by cascades that are well worth exploring. More experienced bush walkers should consider a scramble along the rocky ridge to Mt. Misery. Access to the reserve is via the Esk Highway to 4 km east of Fingal, follow Valley Road for 16 km to a fourway junction. Turn right and go 5 km to parking area and start of track.

Mathinna Falls

A spectacular four tier waterfall is the focal point of this 280 hectare reserve. A 15-20 minute walk along a well graded track leads to the base of the falls. Many of the native plants are labelled along the way, the vegetation changing from dry sclerophyll to myrtle forest near the falls. For those fit people wanting an extra challange, a rough, steep scramble can be made to the upper falls. The effort is well rewarded with great views of water cascading over vertical drops in a rugged, confined gorge. To get there, follow the signs from Mathinna.

Scamander

The reserve is located about 6 km from the sea on the Scamander River and is accessible by boat as well as by road. Road access is via Eastern Creek Road which turns off the Tasman Highway at Beaumaris, next to the Surfside Motel. After about 8 km turn left onto Trout Road which leads directly to the park. A second route, which could form part of a round trip, is to follow the Upper Scamander Road for 6 km to the bridge across the Scamander River. Cross the bridge and follow Eastern Creek Road to Trout Road. Picnic, barbecue and toilet facilities have been provided and a boat ramp and jetty has been constructed to cater for fishermen and people arriving by boat.

Evercreech

This reserve features the tallest white gum in the world. A short nature trail indicates the names of many of the trees and plants as it winds through the 300 year old white gums and surrounding forest. A visit to this reserve can be capped off with a picnic or barbecue at the facilities situated in an attractive clearing in the forest. A rustic shelter and toilet facilities are available. Access to the reserve is via the Mathinna Road and then Evercreech Road. A round trip can be made returning via Claytons Road. This enables a visit to the Mathinna Falls as well.

Miami Park

This is a delightful picnic area set amongst white guns on the banks of Miami Dam, only 11 km from Fingal. The dam was built around the turn of the century, to serve the Miami Gold Mine. The mine is situated on the hill south of the park and the tunnel entrance can be reached by a short walk through the plantation. Gold bearing ore was transported by tram to an area near the dam where it was crushed and the gold recovered in a sluicing operation. Tailings and sand were then placed in settling ponds which can still be seen opposite the park. The overflow channel, hewn from solid rock can be seen on the northern side of the dam. Parking areas, picnic tables, barbecues and toilet facilities are provided.


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

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
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SMACD INC REPORT

The present committee felt we needed further expertise to help us with our book keeping over the coming year.

AND THE GOOD NEWS IS....

Our "COMMUNITY, ENVIRONMENT, ART AND DESIGN" (CEAD) submission has been successful.

This grant is to develop a collaborative design for the town of St Marys. It involves us the community working with specialists in the field of Urban Design, looking at our past, our present and our future, and coming up with an all over picture of what we would like to happen in our town by way of future development. Keeping in mind that we have a life style which we all enjoy and want to protect.

John Brown, the General Manager of the Council has had a meeting with the Urban Designer from Hobart City Council this week and I would hope to be able to report further development next report.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SECURITY RESEARCH PROJECT

This submission has also been successful...as reported in the last Valley Voice. At this stage we are attempting to locate a building in which to set up an information centre. The project can't go ahead until we secure a building. We are presently negotiating several options and hope to secure something by early March.

The project will attempt to offer

information and options that will improve the lifestyle of the low income earner.

One of the early information sessions we will be offering will be the LETS system, or bartering in the community, a great money saver for everyone.

We would also hope to use some of the Government Employment Schemes like NEW WORK OPPORTUNITIES to get things progressing in the town.

Finally, at our last meeting a member of the committee (born and bred in St Marys) expressed his concern at the general apathy of the community. Apparently we are faced with more downgrading of services in the town in the not too distant future and this is of great concern to SMACD. We are attempting to do something about our future but we do require the continued support of the entire community.

It is obvious that our business people have faith in the town, you just have to look at the face lifts taking place in the Main Street and don't they look great. The least we can do is shop locally to support our local businesses.
