TWO ROOMS AT THE TOP

The rooms at the top of the 18 steps of the steep stairway may be a little shabby now, strewn with paper, rather hot in summer, very cold in winter but this is where it happens. Climbing the steep old stairway a number of times a day is certainly good exercise and this is where the Valley Voice newspaper is put together by a small group of volunteers each fortnight. Almost 90 years ago, a new baby was rought home to these rooms above the St Marys Boot Shop. On the 16 June 1904, John Thomas Douglas Smith was born, known to the people of St Marys as Mr Jack Smith. Mr Smith grew up with his parents James and Elizabeth, brother James and sister Eva. The present Shoe Shop and Health and Beauty Shop are on the site of one of the oldest buildings in St Marys. The two rooms at the top were built onto the original building as extra bedrooms above the family home.

I spent a most interesting evening with Mr Smith, sitting near his cosy fire listening as he recalled some of the memories that have stayed with him all these years.

"My father told me that the English minister was 75 years old when he hristened me and in later years I was invited to his 100th birthday party and I said to my father that perhaps it was a good sign and that he may have blessed me with a long life like himself." The minister used to walk from St Helens to Cullenswood to preach then would stay a few days before going home. He lived to be 107 years old Mr Smith told me.

Mr Smith also talks of a day when he and his cousin Cyril had to escort the midwife to a neighbouring farm about a quarter of a mile away. "...my crikey she was a lifter" he said, "...and when she fell over going across the rough paddock she just sat there and laughed and told us to go for help to get her onto her feet as she was too big for us boys to lift - must have been about 20 stone". Mr Smith chuckles as he remembers this as it happened when he stayed with relations at Pyengana.

Mr Smith's father was a bootmaker who

had learnt his trade when apprenticed to a man at Avoca. In those days you paid for the privilege to be an apprentice whereas when Mr Smith worked with his father to learn bootmaking he was paid five shillings plus his keep.

Jack Smith left school at 14 and 'poked about down the railway' hoping for a job but then decided to stay with his father and learn the boot trade. His father warned him "if you marry son, your wife will have to take in washing to help make ends meet" - but she never had to, Mr Smith smiles as he proudly remembers his successful business.

There were no gumboots when Mr Smith was making boots and he would make fine waterproof boots for the farmers with leather bought from W G Genders, then he would cut out his patterns and use wooden sprigs 'morticed like spokes in a wheel' as there were no nails. These boots were made to order after the customer had been measured.

When it became unprofitable to make his own boots, Mr Smith began to order them from Melbourne and came up with the idea that if you put a size 8 sole on a size 7 boot it would wear much longer. Mr Smith suggested this to his Melbourne manufacturer who later wrote to him and commended him on his initiative. These boots were good hard wearing boots for the miners.

When the war came, Mr Smith would have to collect coupons and send them to Melbourne before his order would be returned. His order of fifty pair of boots at a time would soon be sold.

Mr Smith believes that the first boot that his father made may be on display in the St Helens History Room and that a friend still has the first boot that he made when just a boy.

Mr Smith has many memories of living behind and above the Boot Shop. Two bedrooms upstairs for his parents and sister, he and his brother slept downstairs, the dining room behind the shop and the kitchen down a couple of steps. Nearly everyone fell down the

steep stairs at sometime. His father fell down them when he was very elderly, probably nearly 90. He was taken to hospital but never recovered well enough to go home and died in his 90th year. Mr Smith spoke fondly of his father who taught him much but was also like a very good friend. His mother had died much younger than his father. "She was a real worrier", he said.

At the time when the Smith's had their Boot Shop the other part was rented out as a Bakery. Mr Smith says the Maddens, Williams then Ted Chapman were bakers that he could remember until his father got tired of fumes and smoke from the bakery and asked Mr Chapman to move to a site across the road.

The Bakers Shop then became a Chemist Shop. Some of the names remembered are Warren, George Dineen, Ernie West, Forsyth and Jackson. Possibly there were a couple of grocers between the time of the bakers and the chemists as well as families living in the building.

Mr Smith married and moved to his newly built home in Clive Street where he still lives today, but continued his business in the same spot as his father before him. It is still a shoe shop today.

When the Valley Voice was looking for a place to operate from, Mr Smith let us move into the rooms upstairs above where he worked and we are grateful that that has been our permanent headquarters ever since.

These are just a few of Mr Smith's memories and I think he must have been right about the minister's blessing as Mr Smith will be 90 in a few weeks.





FROM THE APPLE TO THE BIG APPLE

9 weeks ago, 12 months of planning all fell into place, when we arrived at Los Angeles Airport.

From Los Angeles we travelled to Tijuana (Mexico) where the people are poor and their children were begging in the streets. Tijuana is a town of markets where everything is for sale at a price and that price is as low as you can barter. From the hustle and bustle of San Diego to a sedate country town of Flagstaff was a welcome change. Hiring a car we drove to the Grand Canyon on the wrong side of the road. One of the many different aspects of driving in America. We saw the Grand Canyon in two extremes, one by helicopter and the other on horse back.

Our next stop Las Vegas (lost wages), a place where you can play the slot machines in the casino, restaurant line and even the toilet.

From Las Vegas we continued across America stopping at Dallas, New Orleans, Memphis, Philadelphia and New York. Staying in New York for three days was an experience in itself. New York being ten times busier than Sydney at peak hour. Taking a kamikaze New York taxi cab ride, we travelled to Empire State Building, World Trade Centre and took the ferry across to the Statue of Liberty. From New York onto Niagara Falls and then to Nashville, Tennessee where a drive to Jack Daniels Distillery in Lynchburg to San Fransisco where a tour to Alcatraz Island was in order, then back to L.A. where a relaxing 4 days in Hollywood was enjoyed. During our stay in Hollywood we had two minutes of stardom when a news crew from Fox Television interviewed us concerning the announcement of Roseanne Arnolds divorce.

As we mentioned these are only a few highlights encounted on our trip.

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Letter To The Editor

I have known Mr Fred Meyer for 25 years. On Wednesday morning, the 13 April, we were notified that Mr Meyer would be taken to Medea Park in half an hour's time.

Upon reaching the hospital other concerned people were gathered outside. My daughters and I entered the Hospital and found Mr Meyer sitting in the Lounge Room, his eyes were red from crying, a wet tissue was on the table in front of him. I asked him if he was happy to go to Medea Park and he shook his head. A friend present asked if he could change his mind and she was told that he could.

A Staff member asked him why he had said he wanted to go if he did not want to. He replied "I had to". I asked why he could not remain at St Marys if he wanted to. I was told by a person from the Northern Region that St Marys Hospital would be an empty building as it was to be closed and the decision to do so had been made in September. I replied that it was not public opinion. He told me it was Ministerial and that if Mr Meyer remained it would be like an empty tomb. I insisted that Mr Meyer should have a choice, other people present agreed. A Staff member was told to ask him. She said, "Freddie do you want to go to Medea Park?" Mr Meyer shook his head, hit the table in front of him with his right hand and said forcibly "No stay here, stay here."

The man from the Northern Region told him he was just upsetand they would hold the bed for him until the next morning when he was not so upset and had time to reconsider. Mr Meyer again shook his head and said "No stay here". The man then said that it looked like he would have to remain at St Marys.

My daughters and I talked to Mr Meyer for a while and left quite confident that he would be allowed to stay at St Marys. At 4.30 pm I received a call to say that Mr Meyer had been taken to Medea Park.

On Wednesday the 20 April, my husband and I visited Mr Meyer at Medea Park. I asked him if he was happy there. He shook his head very sadly and said "No."

We have seen Mr Meyer on several occasions since and he is still upset at having to leave St Marys Hospital.

I am more determined than ever to try and help get a Multi Purpose Centre for St Marys for the sake of Mr Meyer and ones like him, even maybe for my own use one day. Come let us rally and become a caring society.

Extract from letter of reply by Mr Roger Groom, Minister for Community and Health Services to Mr Peter Patmore MHA, in response to Mrs Oliver's letter to Mr Patmore regarding her concern for the elderly patients in the St Marys District Hospital.

For your information planning is now underway in respect to establishing the six bed unit at the St Marys Hospital (three acute and three respite beds). To allow the three women to remain in the respite beds for an indefinite period will deny other members of the community respite facilities. The need for this service has been demonstrated in the last few weeks.

The restructuring of community and health services in the St Marys/Fingal Valley area was necessary to provide more comprehensive and effective service delivery for the whole community. As a result of the restructuring, expansion of a range of services has been possible.

I am advised that expansion of the existing four hour Day Centre for the younger disabled (physical/mental) and the frail elderly to two and a half days per week will commence in the East Wing of the St Marys District Hospital on the 30 May 1994. It will provide social and other activities for those attending the centre and respite for carers.

The Child and Family Health nurses have been relocated to a larger self-contained building, and in conjunction with the Child Care Association in the district, are expanding their community services for mothers and young children.

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
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
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
