### REMEMBER WHEN - Ken Young

It was just heaven on entering the beautiful old general store of E B L Dawson. To your left was Menswear where you could purchase everything a man needed. You could purchase a brand name suit. shirts. cuff-links, pullovers, ties. shirt.bands, hats, shoes, slippers - anything at all a well dressed man would wear. Albert Brown and Clive Atkins were always only too eager to be of assistance.

Past Menswear Department was Dawsons main office which handled all transactions relating to Dawsons - accounts from customers at Chain of Lagoons to Gray and Mt Nicholas where deliveries were done every few days by Geoff Adams.

Once a month Albert Brown would take the store truck and collect all the skins, possum, sheep and cow as Dawsons were also skin merchants. Also Albert Brown would take a small range of goods and off he would head with his mobile showroom with top of the range goods. In the office were Margaret Dawson and Margaret Lohrey.

Further on we came to Haberdashery Department, curtains, cotton wool, material by the mile all carefully overseen by Mrs Dawson herself. Anything a woman needed was

here, buttons, knitting needles dye to colour chaff bags to use for mats all catered for by Mrs Cooper, Betty Spilsbury, and Shirley Lohrey. Next was the Showroom of ladies frocks etc and also change rooms.

To the right of the store were tools and hardware where you could buy from a pit lamp to a rabbit trap and a vast range of hammers, files and nails. The Hardware Department would put most stores to shame today. Next the Grocery Department you were always where welcomed by a cheerful face where Mr Bill Graham was in charge for many years. Possibly the largest department in the store, the grocery department had Nita Brown, Nita Denny, Bill Graham, Geoff Dawson, Margaret Wardlaw, Pat Gray, Geoff Adams, Norma Brough and Mr Cliff Rainsford who mainly did deliveries. sugar, rice, flour and biscuits were all weighed for you and put into brown paper bags.

Cheese was cut off by the ounce or pound as you wanted. It was our own beautiful cheese supplied by the cheese factory which was across the road from the hospital and was regarded as the best cheese in Tasmania for many years. Glen Thomas was at the counter.

Also at Dawsons you could buy


cement by the bag or ton. Geoff Adams has delivered up to 20 tons in one day which is 20 times 24 bags - a lot of cement to load and unload by hand.

Also available were fuels, petrol, diesel, explosives, carbide for pit lamps as this was the only form of light in the mines those days, timber and roofing iron.

Dawsons also had a Gift-ware Department which was in the centre of the store where gifts were displayed in a beautiful old glass display cabinet. At Christmas time in particular they also had a vast range of toys available and traditionally a huge Christmas stocking.

When people paid their accounts at Dawsons you could be sure that if Mr Geoff Dawson was in the store you would certainly get a block of dairy milk chocolate - it meant the world.

How lovely it was to go into such a beautiful old store. Oh dear - how times change.



#### LIONS ACKNOWLEDGED FOR ANTI-DRUG CAMPAIGN

At an Appreciation Dinner on Tuesday evening, Lions Clubs throughout Tasmania, and in particular the Deloraine Club, were acknowledged by the Minister for Police & Emergency Services, Dr Frank Madill for their efforts in the fight against drug abuse.

The Dinner was held to enable the Australian Lions Drug Awareness Foundation (ALDAF), a national body with the aim of promoting awareness and prevention of the abuse of alcohol and other drugs, to acknowledge the great effort of the Deloraine Lions Club in promoting the Foundation's 'TRY HUGS NOT DRUGS' campaign through supporting a team entry in last year's Targa Throughout Targa, the team distributed Tasmania. stickers and badges and wore uniforms provided by the Deloraine Club, all featuring the Lion character central to the 'HUGS NOT DRUGS' campaign, vehicles involved carried the 'TRY HUGS NOT DRUGS' message.

ALDAF State Director, Lion David Daniels, took the opportunity to present the Minister and Police Commissioner with Certificates of Appreciation for their support of Lions in the anti-drugs campaign. Presentations were also made to the 1994 team participants, including two-time winners Greg Crick and Greg Preece, Hobart Police Officers Paul Smith and Hedley Browning and Deloraine competitors Gary Wise and Allan Graham.

After presenting a plaque to the Deloraine Lions Club on behalf of ALDAF, Mr Madill voiced his wholehearted support for Lions in their fight against drug abuse, stating that if a programme stops just one child from turning to drugs, it has been worthwhile. He said that the 'TRY HUGS NOT DRUGS' campaign had made an impact throughout the whole community as a result of being promoted in conjunction with a world-class and wellrecognised event such as Targa.

Dr Madill went on to officially launch the Deloraine Lions Club's 1995 Targa involvement.

### SMACD INC REPORT

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OFFICER FOR ST MARYS

St Marys Association for Community Development Inc have received funding through the Office of Labour Market Adjustment (OLMA) to employ an Economic Development Officer.

The committee of SMACD have long been concerned about the lack of employment opportunities in the Valley and although many people have some wonderful ideas, there has been no one available to assist them with information about funding etc. By having someone based in St Marys who has a knowledge of Government Departments we would hope that some of these ideas may be pursued further.

Throughout the life of SMACD, Tourism has been suggested as the only new industry available to improve the economy. We are all aware of the possible attractions in the Valley, unfortunately none of these are being marketed properly and most require upgrading. The Economic Development Officer will endeavour to address some of these problems by utilising some of the White Paper employment/training schemes.

While SMACD are attempting to address our economic problems it must be realised that while we can assist with information, schemes etc., in the long run it comes down to us the community, we must want things to happen and collectively make them happen. "YOU CAN TAKE A HORSE TO WATER, BUT YOU CAN'T MAKE IT DRINK" couldn't be truer in this instance.

As you all know by now March is Landcare month throughout Australia and in 1995 the emphasis is on Catchments, that is, our waterways.

Australia is the driest continent on earth and the past four years have seen drought ravaged areas in all states, so it is now very important to see what we can all do to help improve our waterways.

Many a book has been written on how to keep our houses clean and many adds appear where a selection of toxic cleaners lurk under the sink of the average Australian home to make boring cleaning jobs quicker and easier. Landcare Australia is warning us that too many people are still using phosphate detergents. The problem with these products is that they don't do our environment much good; 30 - 40 per cent of all phosphates that enter the sewage system comes from household cleaners.

A number of the toxic chemicals used to clean our houses can be replaced with a baking powder or borax and water paste as a scourer to clean bench tops and bathrooms. Instead of water polluting phosphates that destroy fish and plant life use soap. If you have trouble with grease add lemon juice or vinegar.

Most manufacturers now make phosphate free detergents and many packs carry an NP or (no phostphate) logo on the labels.

If you really can't bear to go without these powerful chemicals try using as little of them as possible. Remember manufacturers have a vested interest in you using a lot!

St Marys Landcare Group has some very nice seedlings for sale. They are strong, healthy, cheap and ready to be planted out now.

Callistemon pallidus (lemon bottle brush) an evergreen medium shrub flowering spring and summer. Hardy to frost. Attracts nectar feeding birds.

Callistemon citrinus (crimson bottlebrush) an evergreen large shrub. Will grow in almost any soil type or situation. Withstands water logging, tolerates dryness, lime and salt. Attracts nectar feeding birds and butterflies.

Telopea truncota (Tasmanian waratah) highly ornamental, open shrub with brilliant red flowers. Hardy plant tolerant of most reasonably drained, acid soils. Accepts full sun or heavy shade.

Leptospermum nitidum (shiny tea-tree). Handsome shrub. Flowers large and showy. Hardy in most soils and aspects.

Acacia Willdenowiana - Small, fast-growing wattle recommended for folliage.


#### JUNIOR TOURNAMENTS


