HEALTH SERVICES BASED ON THE ST MARYS DISTRICT HOSPITAL

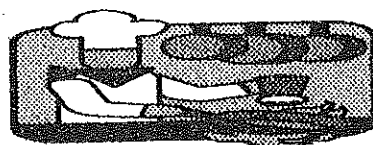

PRESS RELEASE WOOD DESIGN EXHIBITION OPENS DOORS

Tasmanian furniture and woodcraft of the highest quality will find its way to New York as a result of the State's most important wood exhibition to be held later this year.

The 1995 Tasmanian Wood Design Collection's Grand Exhibition, to be held in Hobart's City Hall from September 8 - 11th, will not only show-case the very best of Tasmanian work in wood.

Items selected from this year's exhibition, the third to be held since the Tasmanian Wood Design Collection Trust was founded in 1991, will also be shown next year at the prestigious 1996 International Contemporary Furniture Fair in New York.

Tasmanian items, including furniture and small objects are to be featured in the annual New York Fair for the first time in May this year.

Mr Gary Cleveland of the Tasmanian Wood Design Collection Trust believes this years Tasmanian exhibition presents an ideal opportunity for Tasmanian workers to gain state-wide, national and even international exposure.

"Tasmania's craftspeople and furniture makers are producing work of the very highest standard" Mr Cleveland said. "But often getting your work seen by the people that count is much more difficult than producing the work in the first place. This year's Wood Design Exhibition could lead to all sorts of openings for talented Tasmanian designer-makers." After each biannual Tasmanian Wood Design Collection exhibition, pieces from the exhibition are selected to become part of the permanent Tasmanian Wood Design Collection.

The Tasmanian Wood Design Collection now consists of a number of pieces of Tasmanian designed and produced furniture and craft by 12 Tasmanian designer-makers.

A Tasmanian husband and wife team have already benefited from being selected as part of the Tasmanian Wood Design Collection. A pair of Huon Pine ladles were submitted by Patrick and Mieke Senior of Indeco to be part of the 1993 Wood Design Exhibition.

The award-winning ladles have been selected to feature at the New York Fair in 1996.

"The ladles have received a lot of exposure from being in the Wood Design Collection" said Patrick Senior. "Our business has been growing steadily and we now have another extra large ladle which we have added to the range."

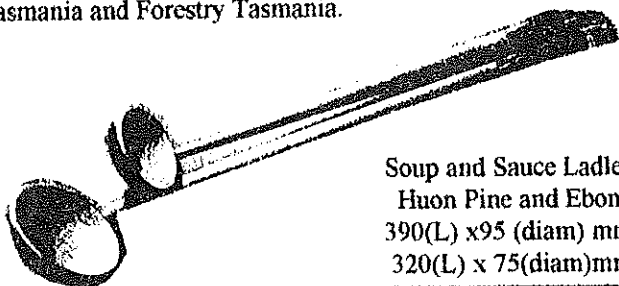

The man said "Yes, you can have them".

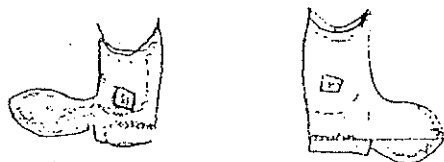


When she went home she went for a walk through the bush. The boots went swish, swish, splash!

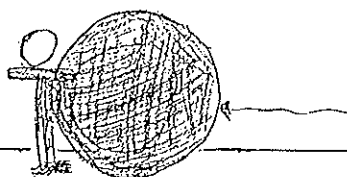


THE MAGIC BALLOON BY BRIGITTE MITCHELL

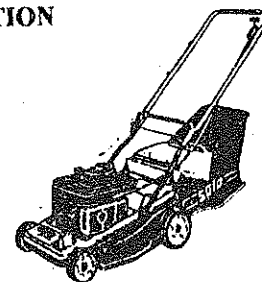
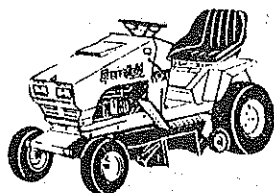

THE YOUTH TRAINING INITIATIVE AND THE YOUTH TRAINING ALLOWANCE.

Young people, living in the St Marys/Fingal Valley area, would probably like to know more about the Youth Training initiative and how it affects them:

The Youth Training Initiative (YTI) provides:

- * intensive case management, so that unemployed people under the age of 18 years will have the assistance of a specific case manager in their search for suitable work, training or education placement. Case management will begin 13 weeks after registering an unemployed (with earlier case management assistance for the "high risk" group)
- * a labour market or vocational training place and job search assistance for those who remain unemployed six months after registering, and
- * new income support arrangements which encourage young people to stay in education and training.

The YTI started on 1st January 1995 and covers all new unemployed 15 to 17 year olds who were not in receipt of Job Search Allowance (JSA) by that date

* The Youth Training Allowance (YTA) is paid to people under 18 who are:

- registered with the CES as unemployed and receive their first benefit on or after 1st January 1995, and

- are involved with job search, training and other employment activity.

* The YTA will be available up to the age of 18 for approved training and job search, and other approved activities while waiting for training places.

* Existing JSA waiting periods apply to the YTA but young people in financial hardship are eligible for early assistance.

* The YTA is subject to an activity test and non-compliance will attract the same non-payment periods as those applying to JSA and NEWSTART.

* The YTA is payable at three rates:

- the 'at home' rate
- the 'away from home' rate, and
- the 'independent/homeless' rate, with special criteria for independence and homelessness.

* Rent assistance is available for homeless youth and independent YTA recipients.

* DSS is the payment agency which receives, assesses and determines claims and processes payments, conducts reviews of eligibility, raises and recovers overpayments and takes prosecution action.

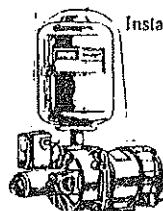

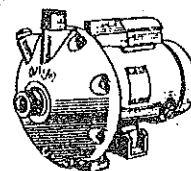

CRIME PREVENTION AND HOME SAFETY A POLICE COMMUNITY PROJECT PROTECT YOUR CAR

- * Before leaving your car remember to remove the ignition key, secure all glass vents, doors and windows.
 - * "Hiding" spare keys under carpeting or over the sun visor is about as clever as leaving a house key under a doormat. Thieves know all the obvious places to look.
 - * A steering lock or car alarm system is a good idea. If you have them, use them. Don't be like many others who have realised too late that they forgot to engage them before leaving the vehicle.
 - * While it may not always be practical to lock your car while at home, do not leave the keys in the ignition.
 - * Keep your garage locked, many cars are stolen from garages and driveways.
 - * If your vehicle is stolen, report the facts immediately to the Police. Make sure you can give them the details such as registration number, make, type, colour etc.
 - * Park away from isolated or darkened areas, especially at night.
 - * Do not leave luggage, packages or other easily removable items in view inside your car.
 - * Avoid transferring items to the boot of a vehicle at a location where it is to be parked. A thief may be watching.
- REMEMBER YOUR CAR COULD BE THE NEXT ONE.**

VANDALISM

Vandalism is the senseless and often malicious destruction of property.

- * Destruction and damage to both public and private property costs millions of dollars every year.
 - * We pay for vandalism through loss of property, personal and physical discomfort, possible danger to life, increased taxes to cover damage to public property and increased insurance costs.
 - * Vandalism can take place anywhere and anytime that an opportunity exists. Vandals, like burglars prefer to commit their cowardly crimes where they are unlikely to be seen. 75% of vandals are aged between 7 and 18.
 - * It is important children are taught to respect public and private property and learn a sense of pride in their community.
 - * **BE ALERT.** If you see vandalism 'taking' place, such as children spray painting graffiti on walls or smashing up a bus shelter or telephone box, call the police immediately. You can remain anonymous if you prefer.
- Remember vandalism is a crime and an expensive one to the community.

ADVICE AND SUPPORT GROUPS

A large number of community organisations are established throughout Tasmania to advise and support people on a range of issues.

The Tasmania Index of Community Organisations published by the State Library of Tasmania is a comprehensive index to those organisations and it provides basic information such as name, address, branches, contacts and aims for each group listed.

Local councils, police and State offices will be able to assist you locate the organisation most suited to your needs in your area.

The Tasmania Police Community Relations Bureau in Hobart can also provide information on the organisations that operate throughout Tasmania.

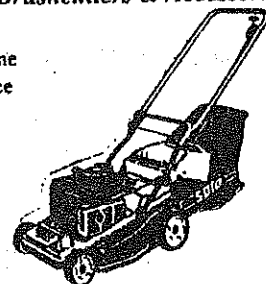

GORSE - *Ulex europaeus*

Gorse is such a common plant in Tasmania that a lengthy description is not needed. It is a prickly, perennial, evergreen shrub which if left undisturbed will, in favourable situations, grow to a height and diameter of 2 - 3 metres in 4 or 5 years, although some plants growing on poor land and subject to grazing from time to time may never grow higher than 0.5 metres.

Gorse is a legume and produces an abundance of small, bright yellow flowers usually in spring and autumn. Seed is produced in pods and when these burst the seed can be thrown 3 metres or so from the parent plant, usually in hot, dry weather. Most seeds are "hard" and may remain dormant in the soil for more than 20 years. Dormancy is broken when existing bushes are burned or mechanically removed. A flush of seedlings may then emerge. Gorse will shoot vigorously from the stem if cut back or burned or even from the roots if cut to ground level.

Gorse is a declared "Secondary Weed" under the Noxious Weeds Act 1964. The provisions of the Act enable the Department of Primary Industry to require landholders to take control measures against the weed. Where gorse is firmly established and its eradication is not feasible, landholders are encouraged to contain and reduce infestations.

Gorse is present in most agricultural and urban areas throughout Tasmania. If allowed to grow and spread without control the weed can quickly smother large areas making them totally inaccessible.

On fertile areas gorse can occupy land that could be more productive in good pasture and it provides harbour for vermin. Near buildings, around towns and on fence-lines

it also constitutes a serious fire hazard.

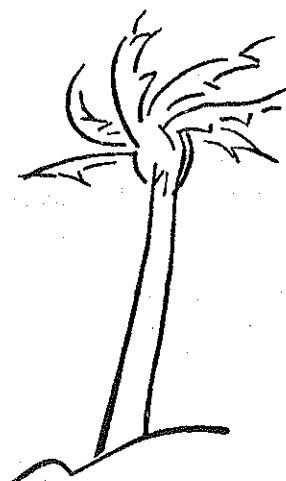
In poor country gorse can be a useful plant providing stock shelter and emergency feed. It also assists in reducing soil erosion.

A decision on whether or not to control or eradicate gorse in any area, and the methods to adopt, depend on several factors - the nature of the land, what the land is to be used for, and the maturity and density of the gorse.

These factors will also affect the time taken to complete an eradication programme and determine the management methods that should be used to prevent the weeds re-establishment.
