RIVERS AND WATERS, outlining a river management scheme that councils can undertake to repair the problems of our river.

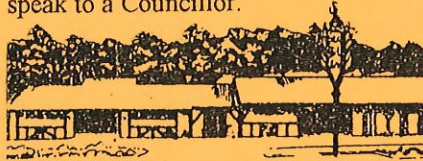

There are many other projects that we are looking at, however our expertise is limited. The three areas that we see as benefiting the future of St Marys are:

TOWNSCAPE This requires us to set up a working scheme with the Council, looking at the whole picture, producing

a plan and prioritising the works to be undertaken. This is happening and though it may seem a slow procedure, we must get it right

ST MARYS RIVULET. This, we feel, could be our best asset in regards to tourism. However the river is in a very poor state, before we beautify the surrounds, we must repair the river itself. Hopefully we can encourage the people whose land is along side the river and the council to adopt a river management scheme. If you are concerned about the river please get in touch with a committee member or speak to a Councillor.



SHARED OFFICE AND INFORMATION CENTRE.

Do you know that the State Government have assisted people to set up such businesses as **MARKET GARDENS, EARTH WORM FARMS, RECYCLING, CRAFT VILLAGES** and many other small enterprise schemes. We need an enterprise centre in St Marys to get this information to you.

We also need a centre for Tourist information. How many people pass through our town and don't realise that there are things to see here?

We have the ACIS Office. our committee is attempting to get these facilities all together.

THE WHOLE TOWN COULD BENEFIT FROM THIS...

Don't think we have gone off the boil, we are slowly getting there.

One comparison that we can make between Latrobe's advisory committee and SMACD is that Latrobe's committee has managed to attract Graphic Designers, Architects, Accountants, Doctors, Representatives from Service Organisations as well as people like ourselves.

Obviously Latrobe's entire population felt there was a future for their town and all decided to work at it together..

ABBNEYFIELD HOUSE FOR ST MARYS ?

At a meeting called by the St Marys and District Chamber of Commerce, sixteen different groups and associations were represented. It was a very pleasing response and shows that there is an initial good interest and a keenness to know more about the Abbeyfield housing concept. The guest speaker at the meeting was Mr Bob Graham who has been closely involved with the planning of an Abbeyfield House in Launceston. Building of that home is just getting underway.

Abbeyfield Housing is a specific type of support housing and is not be confused with Nursing Homes or the issue of the Nursing care beds at our hospital.

Abbeyfield would provide a non-institutional housing option for older and retired people who are able to care for themselves but have the security and companionship of others and at the same time have the privacy and independence of their own private bed sitting room with ensuite facilities.

A live in housekeeper cooks and serves lunch and dinner but residents prepare their own breakfasts and snacks.

Residents are encouraged to share the garden and communal parts of the house such as the kitchen, laundry, guest room and sitting room.

Abbeyfield housing is not a new idea.

About one thousand of these houses are operating very successfully around the world, mostly in England, but in more recent years are becoming very popular in Australia as an ideal option for people in their older years.

Funding, suitable land and community support do not appear to be a real problem at this point. A survey into need and the number of people desiring this type of housing will have to be thoroughly looked into.

A future meeting will be held when feedback from all the various groups has been received.

KNOCK, KNOCK.....

...a fact finding survey is underway in the Break O'Day Municipality to unearth hidden skills and resources.

The survey is being carried out by Jenily Venaglia who has been contracted by the Local Government Association of Tasmania in co-operation with the Break O'Day Council.

It's an exciting project designed to gather the sort of information capable of identifying employment and business opportunities.

It's also designed to attract ideas from members of the community on development opportunities within the region.....limited only by the imagination.

The sort of ideas that have led to self employment and employment in other communities - popcorn and ice cream production on Bothwell - quince cheese and superb chutneys and the like, in Hamilton - furniture manufacturing and restoration in Bream Creek - dry stone walls in the Southern Midlands - the sale of pine cones for fuel in the Northern Midlands - flower and herb production...the list goes on and on.

"The survey helps people identify the resources they have in their own backyards" said Jenily. "A good example is the story of the chap who grows cabbages in his vegie plot - great quality and great quantity - but how many cabbages can you give away? Through the survey we discovered a deli specialising in gourmet sausages and keen to manufacture and sell complimentary lines like Sauerkraut! Our cabbage grower is happy - the sausage makers are happy and the local economy is strengthened".

Another good example is the family with three unemployed boys; they have a couple of cedar pines and were able to sell the "cedar roses" to a mainland display company for substantial return.

Late last year the Deputy Prime Minister, Brian Howe, announced that the Local Government Association of Tasmania had been funded for the survey under a Commonwealth Department of Housing and Regional Development program called "Strengthening Local Economic Capacity".

When the survey is completed, the information gathered will be assembled in a purpose designed database which will provide a basis for future planning and a register of skills and resources.

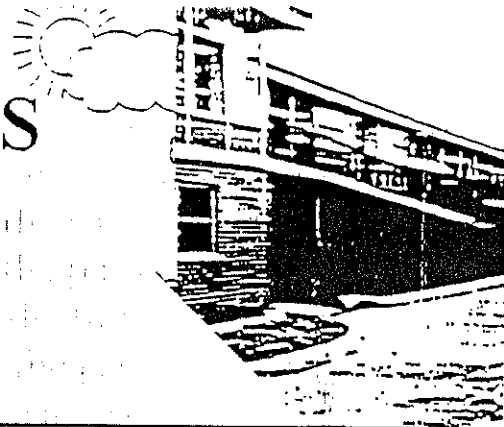
over the coming weeks, businesses and households will be visited; by either the project officer or one of the Councillors, service club members or community leaders who are assisting in the task of gathering information.

This is a great opportunity for the people of the Break O'Day Municipality to identify individual and community aspirations and record any ideas for opportunities and potential development that may exist.

"This is the kind of project that promotes lateral thinking" said the General Manager of the Council, John Brown. "It's an exciting venture and will expose new opportunities that could be developed."

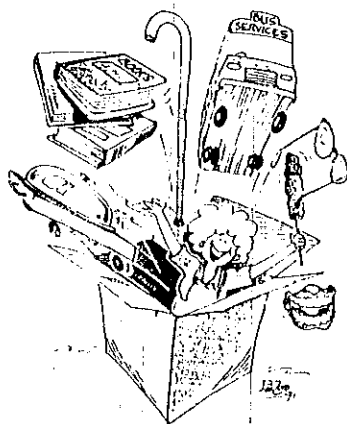

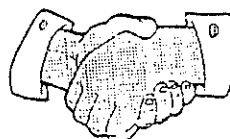

It gives me pleasure to mention that we have had, yet another very successful term. Highlights for the term were:

1. Three of our students participated in the national 'Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians'. All of them won awards (see below).

2. 9 students (Amanda Walker - 8A, Malcolm Woods - 8A, Melanie Bennet - 8B, Sommer Woods - 8B, Bridgitte Halton - 8B, Sarah White - 9A, Donna Semmens - 9A, Shannon Williams - 9B, Melanie Sutton - 10A) participated in a mathematics competition organised by the Mathematics Association of Tasmania. We are waiting for the results to arrive.

3. Organisation of a special mathematics activity day for our very able students. This was conducted by Mr David James, the Mathematic Advisor for the Forester District. I thank Mr John Marshall, Ms Carolyn Watson, and Mr David Bain for the organisation of the event. Many thanks to David James. This event is in line with a school priority for this year - 'Catering for Individual Needs (Gifted and Talented)'.

4. As a result of her excellent performance in the mathematics challenge competition Sarah White was invited by the University of Tasmania to participate in a "Maths Camp" in the school holidays. This camp, to my knowledge was targetted to the mathematics students in Tasmania.

We believe that mathematically interested and talented students and self-motivated achievers should be given the opportunity to take up challenging activities to encourage scientific talent and initiative and nurture and extend their talents.

Results of '1994 Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians'.

1. Sarah White of 9A did extremely well to win the 'Excellence Award'. Her result is amongst the top 5% of the girls of her age, and amongst the top 7% of all students of her age in Australia.

2. Melanie Sutton of 10A won the 'Merit Award'. This award was given to only 15% of the students of her age in Australia.

3. Donna Semmens of 9A won the 'Achievement Award'. This award was given to 29% of the students of her age in Australia.

ST.MARYS DISTRICT HOSPITAL SUPPORT ASSOCIATION

St Marys District Hospital Support Association met on Monday 20th, 40 people attended and 11 apologies were accepted.

Three service providers spoke on their specific community operation, a brief summary below:

Michelle Domanska - Community Options - Family Based Care

Michelle has 35 clients with Family Based Care, which was operating prior to the downgrading of St Marys District Hospital. This service is provided for frail aged and disabled and she has 10 clients waiting for this service. Carers and money are not sufficient to cover the needs.

Michelle also works in Community Options, a new service which provides very complex needs (eg. MS, sick babies) for 8 clients in the Municipality. Michelle indicated there is a definite need for Aged Care Beds in the Fingal Valley because of the growing number of fragile aged, some of whom are lucky to be at home now.

Drug & Alcohol- Carol Gunson - relieving Penny Ives

Service started September last year, centred at St Helens, services Fingal Valley, Bicheno & N.E. to Scottsdale. Service is federally funded through N.R.H.B. service was implemented before the downgrading of St Marys District Hospital. This service sees quite a few clients from Grade 7 up to aged.

Day Care Centre Co-ordinator - Liz Guy.

Time allotted 40 hours per fortnight

Provides for frail aged and disabled members to enjoy outings and learn new skills. Clients are picked up, taken to the hospital and returned home by H.A.C.C. bus. Liz has approximately 20 clients who attend the hospital Wednesday afternoons to play Euchre, Bingo and other games. The Day Care Centre operates on Wednesday, Thursday & Friday.

Mrs Lyn Geeves addressed the meeting re Abbeyfield Housing. Mr Salter announced that the Chamber of Commerce has arranged for a speaker representing Abbeyfield Housing to speak at their meeting 22nd June. David Llewellyn said that regardless of such a support house there would still be an urgent need for Aged Care Beds in our district.
