HOME FIRE SAFETY

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO MAKE YOUR FAMILY SAFER FROM FIRE

Put up smoke detectors properly. Keep your smoke detectors clean and test them every week. **DETECTORS THAT DO NOT WORK WILL NOT ALERT YOU.**

Replace your smoke detectors immediately if they are not working properly.

Follow fire safety rules and prevent hazardous situations:

- * Use smoking materials properly. Never smoke in bed.
- * Keep matches and cigarette lighters away from children.
- * Store flammable materials in proper containers. Never use them near an open flame or sparks.
- * Keep electrical appliances in good conditions. Do not overload electrical circuits.
- * Keep stoves, fireplaces, chimneys and barbecue grills grease-free. Make sure they are properly installed away from any combustible materials.
- * Keep portable heaters and open flames such as candles away from combustible materials.

* Do not allow rubbish to accumulate.

* Keep a supply of batteries on hand for your battery powered smoke detectors.

DEVELOP A FAMILY ESCAPE PLAN AND PRACTICE IT WITH YOUR ENTIRE FAMILY. BE SURE TO INCLUDE SMALL CHILDREN IN YOUR PRACTICE.

* Draw a floor plan of your home and find two ways to exit from each room. There should be one way to get out of each bedroom without opening the door.

* Explain to children what the smoke alarm detector means. Teach them that they must be prepared to leave the home by themselves if necessary. Show them how to check to see if doors are hot before opening them. Show them how to use alternate exit if the door is hot and should not be opened.

* Decide on a meeting place a safe distance from your house. **MAKE** sure that all your children understand that they should go and wait for you there if there is a fire.

* Hold fire drills at least every six months to make sure that everyone, even small children, knows what to do to escape safely.

* Know where to call the Fire Brigade from outside your home.

* Provide emergency equipment, such as First Alert fire extinguishers, and teach your family to use this equipment properly.



WHAT TO DO IF THERE IS A FIRE IN YOUR HOME.

If you have made a family escape plan and practiced it with your family, you have increased their chances of escaping safely. Go over the following rules with your children each time you have fire drills. This will help everyone remember them in case of a real fire emergency.

1. DON'T PANIC. STAY CALM.

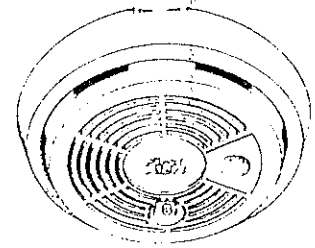
Your safe escape may depend on thinking clearly and remembering what you have practised.

2. GET OUT OF THE HOUSE AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE.

Follow a planned escape route. Do not stop to collect anything or get dressed.

3. FEEL THE DOORS TO SEE IF THEY ARE HOT.

If they are not, open them carefully. Do not open a door if it is hot. Use an alternate escape route.

4. **STAY CLOSE TO THE FLOOR. SMOKE AND HOT GASSES RISE.**

5. **COVER YOUR NOSE AND MOUTH WITH A CLOTH (WET IF POSSIBLE).**

Take short shallow breaths.

6. **KEEP DOORS AND WINDOWS CLOSED. OPEN THEM ONLY IF YOU HAVE TO IN ORDER TO ESCAPE.**

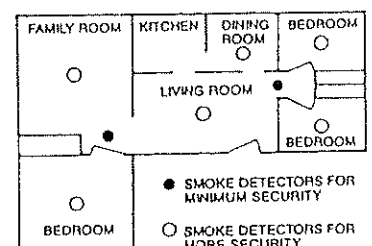
7. **MEET AT YOUR PLANNED MEETING PLACE AFTER LEAVING THE HOUSE.**

8. **CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT AS SOON AS POSSIBLE FROM OUTSIDE YOUR HOUSE.**

Give the address and your name.

9. **NEVER GO BACK INSIDE A BURNING BUILDING.**

Contact your local Fire Brigade. They will give you more ideas about how to make your home safer from fires and how to plan your family's escape.

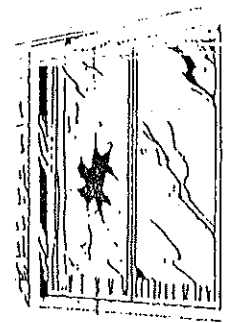

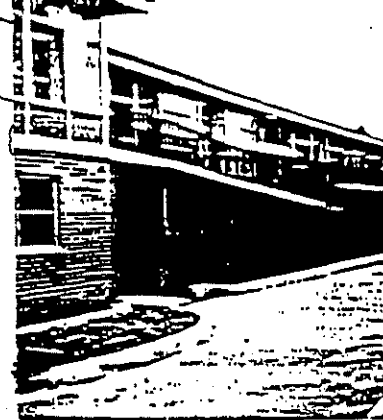

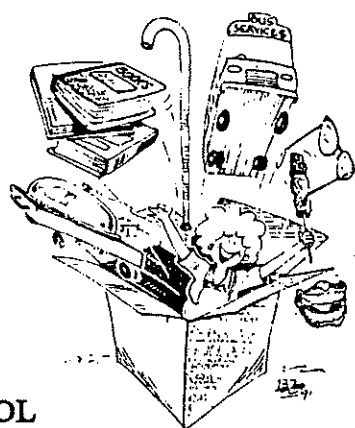
Hospital Happenings

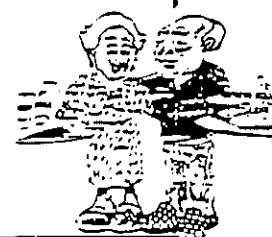


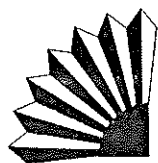

Thanks to everyone who came to the last meeting. We seem to have lots of things to discuss and I apologise to those persons that we kept up.

Before I discuss the School Farm I wish to raise the issue of insurance to students whilst they are at school.

This facility is not provided by the Department and as stated "they are not legally obliged to accept responsibility for accidents except where it can be shown that the Department or its employees have been negligent". It can be reasoned that Medicare will cover most children's medical expenses and for those persons wishing greater cover, private insurance is an option available to those persons that can afford it. Unfortunately medical support does not cover a number of out of pocket expenses; home help, etc nor compensation for a permanent loss.

There is however an option available by the TGIO which does provide a package at a very reasonable rate. There are 2 policies which may be selected. The cost of the package is either \$1.45 or \$2.10 per student per annum. The latter policy is more comprehensive than the former.

The catch with these policies is that all students must be covered and be in the same plan.

Just a couple of weeks ago we had an accident in the kindergarten class. I understand the

child suffered a broken nose when an apparatus in the playground fell on her. If we had this second policy then this child would have received compensation of \$250.00 and an injury assistance benefit. However at present the only recourse the parent now can take if compensation is desired is to prove negligence which requires legal action which at the best of times is tedious and can create a lot of tension. I therefore believe that we should have our children covered as soon as possible. Your opinions are sought.

Lastly I would like to mention the School Farm. As a result of the Cresap report all but three school farms in the state will be retained as farms. In the case of St. Marys District High School it is definite that farm activities will no longer be supported by the Department.

A committee was selected as a result of the discussions at this last meeting. The committee inspected the farm later in the week and aims to report to the P&F at its next meeting on options for the future use of this land.

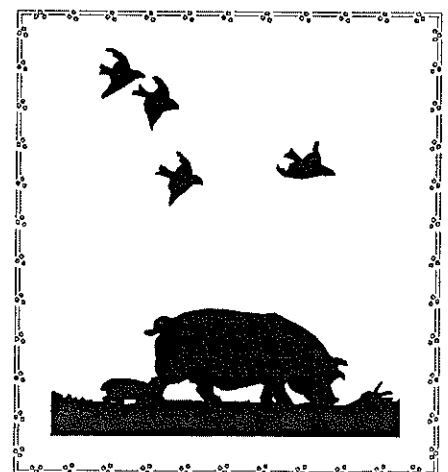
It was noted during the inspection that the boundaries between the school and the so-called Farm land are not as well defined as the Department would like us to believe.

The actual designated 'farm land' in question is 6.75 hectares

which includes the machinery shed areas, greenhouses and chook sheds. About 10 acres of this land is currently useful grazing land. Much of this land occurs as a buffer strip between the creek and the main part of the school. This creek is subject to flooding and is badly blocked in places by willow trees and accumulated debris. It was definitely agreed that a most worthwhile project would be to revitalise this creek.

We will discuss the 'farm' issue in more detail in later issues. Your suggestions and support are important. So speak up.

Information on how to assist crash victims is contained in a booklet titled 'Before Other Help Arrives' prepared by the Federal Office of Road Safety.

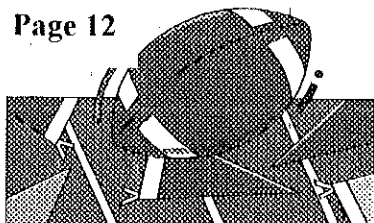
The booklet is a suitable size to keep in the glove box.

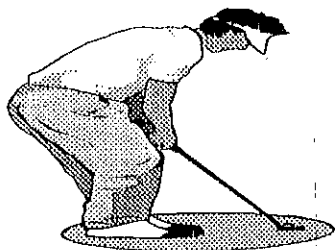

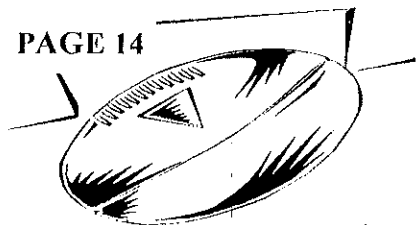
