JUST DOWN THE EAST COAST

The clouds were a bit of a worry, but the day looked like it would be OK for a barbecue and a bit of wandering about, so we headed off down the East Coast. Decided to take along a couple of friends and show them a magic place that we had discovered by chance a couple of years ago.

We stopped for a thermos coffee and a piece of chocolate apple cake just off the roadside on the outskirts of Cranbrook. Those that needed to, took to the scrub before we continued on through Swansea and Triabunna then to Orford where we drove straight ahead on the gravel Forestry W road instead of keeping on the sealed highway which takes you to Hobart.

This road, like most Forestry roads is a well maintained road, and will take you on to Sorell through the WIELANGTA STATE FOREST. We were looking for the THUMBS Lookout and picnic area. Here is a great high spot that looks out across the water to Maria Island. Facilities are good - barbecues, tables and seats, a stone shelter hut, toilets and fresh tank water.

Even though it had rained the previous night, we scouted around and were able to find enough firewood to get a good fire going and the barbecue plate soon heated up to cook lunch. The children explored the area, climbing rocks and logs and were able to spot a few boats and buildings at Maria Island.

After our sausages, more chocolate cake and coffee, we packed up and headed back down to join the W road again. The Forestry W road (W for Wielangta, I guess) winds through some magnificent very tall, very straight eucalypts before we reach the SANDSPIT FOREST RESERVE.



Across the road from the carpark at the Robinson Bridge, we took the path down to the river to get a closer look at the massive log bridge before going into the rainforest. The bridge structure - well how can I describe it - you really have to see it yourself to appreciate the size of the trees used in its making. I just thought it was a pity that there was no information on site about the construction of this bridge.

Upstream from the bridge, a boardwalk winds in and out and around, taking you into some magic rainforest, through tall old tree ferns and Sassafras, often shrouded with long cascades of moss on the limbs and trunks. The undergrowth is a fairyland of spongy moss and colourful fungi. One section leads you under overhanging cavelike sandstone cliffs where I can imagine Aborigines used to shelter.

This walk is only a short one and we walked around it twice and even then were reluctant to leave. Could only get the children back to the car by promising to come again soon.

We had intended to turn around and head back home but instead we

continued south until we came to Kelleve where a "Garage Sale" sign brought us to a stop. Found a couple of real bargains amongst the usual assortment of old vinyl chairs, Tupperware, strollers etc. You really have to look hard amongst lots of junkie stuff to find the little treasures.

Pleased with our purchases, we were in the mood to keep going until we spotted a "Secondhand and Antique" Shop in Sorell. There we spent over an hour browsing through the beautiful old furniture and bric a brac of earlier years. Much of it I could remember in my childhood home.

By the time we eventually emerged from this fascinating shop, it was dark, so we decided to go into Hobart for a meal. The young children were excited by the lights on the Tasman Bridge and the reflections of the city lights in the water. After a meal at Mures on the Waterfront (downstairs!) it was well and truly time to start driving back to St Marys.

It had certainly been a good day, especially as it had been a "spur of the moment" idea to go that way. I can recommend a trip to the WIELANGTA STATE FOREST if you are at all interested in seeing some of the beautiful places that are just a few hours away.

Early History

Although most of the physical changes evident in the Wielangta State Forest relate to timber-getting this century, the first people to settle here were Aborigines belonging to the Portmairremener and Oyster Bay tribes thousands of years ago. These people lived mainly on the coast, but also travelled and camped in the inland forests. There is evidence that they lived in sandstone overhangs near the upper reaches of the Sandspit River.

The name of this forest - Wielangta - was an Aboriginal term meaning tall timber. Thousands of years later, it is still an apt name for this forest. The original pronunciation was probably more like 'wulungta', the original spelling.

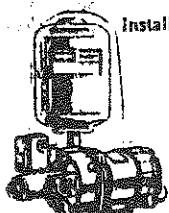
Following my letter in the last issue, thank you to all who commented on and agreed.. People may be interested to know Charlies house was originally the "Stables" for the mine ponies. U.C.

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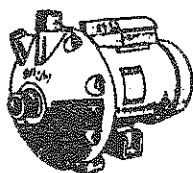

LETS SYSTEM

Workshop

On Saturday 17th June, a LETSystem workshop was held at the St Marys Hotel. Paul Felix representing Tas LETS (Tasmania) conducted the workshop.

Topics discussed included, what is a LETSystem and how to establish and operate a LETSystem. It was agreed St Marys would like a LETSystem.

Here is a brief summary of the subjects discussed at the workshop.

Q. What is a LETSystem

A. A LETSystem is a system which allows people to trade using a new kind a currency - Personal Money.

Q. Who can use a LETSystem

A. Anybody and Everybody.

Q. What can a LETSystem do for your community?

A. The power of personal money is that it allows people to spend money that remains in their community.

To initiate a LETSystem in St Marys a Community Trading Day will be held shortly. A luncheon will be provided and payment will be charged in personal money. Registration forms and further information will be provided. Goods and services traded on the day can be purchases in personal money or a combination of personal money and currency. The community will be invited to attend and everybody is welcome. The date will be advertised soon, so keep a lookout.

HERE ARE SOME COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What about Social Security, does this affect my benefit/pension.

A. The Dept. of S.S. exempts all LETSystem from declaration. It will not affect your benefit/pension. However, do not allow your commitment to LETS interfere with your obligations to be available for work or training courses.

Q. What about Tax?

A. For most trades in LETSystem the Aust. Taxation Office will not expect or pursue payment of tax. however, if you are in business, the same rules apply whether you trade in dollars/personal money

Q. How do I start?

A. Attend the Community Trading Day or come into the Community Contact Centre (old Westpac building) Main Street St Marys.

Q. What can I offer, I don't have anything to trade, services to offer or crafts to sell?

A. Most people have skills they don't realise
Can you read ? yes: Read to the aged/visually impaired.
Can you drive ? Yes: Drive a person without transport to the library on a regular basis.

Q. What if I move away?

A. Try to bring your account as close as possible to being balanced. However in the future you will be able to transfer your account balance to another registry if one is available where you move

Q. Do I earn before I spend

A. No. Every account holder starts with a zero balance, people must spend before others can earn.

ie. Here are just a few suggestions: "Paddy" (St Patrick's Head) "Valley" (Fingal Valley) and an "Esk" (South Esk River)

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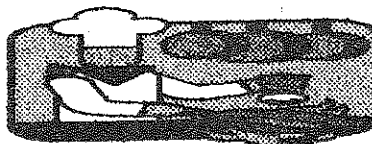

Council intend to request that the upgrading and maintenance of these roads be given highest priority.

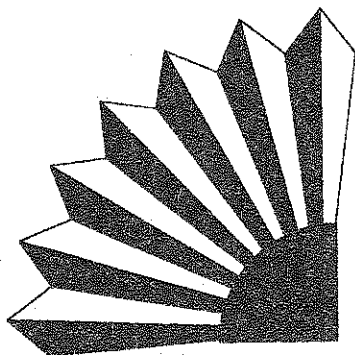


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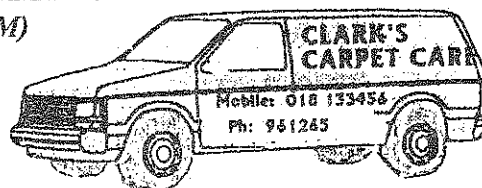
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FINGAL VALLEY AREA?

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Neighbourhood Watch is a concept of crime prevention aimed at improving individual home security. The aim is to make people aware of suspicious incidents in their area and report them to police. It also aims to improve the relationship and exchange of information between the community and police.

The Neighbourhood Watch structure includes an area co-ordinator who is the manager of the area and zone leaders who are responsible for about 25 houses within the area. The zone leaders responsibilities involve making people in the area aware of the scheme and delivering a regular Neighbourhood Watch newsletter. Zone leaders also convey information from residents in their area to the meeting through regular meetings gather information on what is occurring in the Neighbourhood Watch area.

By using signs on streets and identifying plaques on fences within the Neighbourhood Watch area, it is hoped that burglars just looking for a likely house will be deterred.

Also valuable items in the house can be marked with an engraver with the persons license number preceded by 'T' to indicate Tasmania. This number can be traced even if in another State. A sticker is affixed to the item once it is engraved to alert criminals that the property has been marked and will be difficult to sell.

Window stickers, front and back door sticker also let the burglar know that valuable items in the property have been marked. Even if the item is sold, we encourage people to leave the original engraved number on and then add a new one.

Tasmania Police have a procedure in initiating a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

ST HELENS FISH PUNT

The continued operation of the controversial "Fish Punt" on the St Helens waterfront moved a step closer at the Break O' Day Council Meeting on Tuesday 13th June when the Council agreed to apply to the Land Use Planning Review Panel for approval to grant a dispensation.

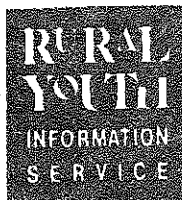
If the Land Use Planning and Approvals Panel give the Break O' Day Council approval to grant a dispensation the public will have a prescribed period to lodge objections. All objections will then be considered by Council before they make a decision as to the actual granting of the dispensation.

The Fish Punt is situated on Crown land and is currently operating under a temporary licence granted by the Tasmania Property Services Group who have leased the area to its operators.

Located on the waterfront, on the reclaimed foreshore area adjacent to the wharf at St Helens, the Fish Punt owners have advised that they intend to sell, cooked crayfish and prawns and other seafood which is live fresh or frozen and tea, coffee, ice-creams and confectionery will also be available. Fresh fish will be directly transferred from fishing boats to the preparation area of the shop.

The shop is currently operating in accordance with requirements of the Council's Environmental Health Officer and the provision of sewerage, drainage, water reticulation and electricity also appear to satisfy Council provisions.

The application includes the provision of three car parking spaces and a landscaping plan has been provided which gives details of the whole site including plan for tables and chairs, advertising sign details and the position and species of plants to be established.



RURAL YOUTH INFORMATION SERVICE

We all know only too well how scarce jobs are, that it's an employer's market out there, so it's really important to give yourself the "winning edge". Many jobs are gained by approaching employers directly rather than responding to ads in the paper or through employment services.

Following are a few points to think about when applying for jobs:

- ❖ Employers consider their time precious and would not be keen to read a five page resume which doesn't link the applicant's skills and experience to the position s/he is applying for. You need to look at your resume carefully and make sure that the skills and experience relevant to the particular job are given prominence. Nor would an employer select someone for an interview based on four or five sentences about them.
- ❖ Many jobs have particular "selection criteria" - find out what these are and make sure your application addresses each one carefully.
- ❖ Employers are impressed by applicants who find out about the company - who know something about the job and what it offers. They might also particularly notice someone who is willing to attend interviews even at inconvenient times and possibly at short notice.
- ❖ It's a good idea to speak to someone doing a similar job to find out more from an employee's point of view.
- ❖ Jobs are often won through persistence and keeping in contact with employers sometimes over a number of months. Chance and luck play a part in life so, of course, they play a part in job selection

too - sometimes being in the right place at the right time lands you the job!

- ❖ Obviously applicants lessen their chances of being offered jobs when they apply after closing dates, or if they are rude and arrogant, demanding the job and being surprised to learn they are not the only one applying.
- ❖ If you do get an interview, be prepared to sell yourself. It's a good idea to rehearse with someone outside of the family who is prepared to ask the difficult questions and to be honest about criticisms they may have of your approach.
- ❖ Don't give up. If you're not getting anywhere and you think you should be at least getting an interview get someone (like me!) to have a look at your application(s) and resume, maybe they could be better. An interested outsider might spot something you haven't.

EARTHWORMS IN TASMANIAN SOILS

Australia's native earthworms generally do not survive after removal from native bushland. Most earthworm species found in soils have been introduced, accidentally, from Europe during the early settlement of Australia.

Earthworms are very important in helping to improve the fertility of the soil. They prefer clay or loam soils to the lighter sandy soils and are usually found in the top 10 centimetres of the soil during autumn, winter and spring, preferring the wetter months to lay eggs. As the soil dries out earthworms burrow deeper to lie dormant till soil moisture increases again and temperatures cool.

Earthworms improve the fertility of the soil by burrowing which improves soil aeration and water movement and so helps roots of plants to penetrate through the soil. Earthworms feed on organic matter and speed up the nutrient cycle. Improved soil fertility from earthworms can lead to increases in pasture production.

Earthworm numbers can be increased in the soil if the surface layers are moist and food high in nitrogen is available eg pea straw, clover residues and animal manures. Minimal cultivation can more than double earthworm numbers.

DRAFT WASTE MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

The Break O'Day Council is presently in the process of releasing a Draft Waste Management Strategy Plan for public comment.

This draft plan, compiled by the Council's Works Manager Mr Trevor Berriman, looks at issues such as garbage collection and kerbside recycling along with tip utilisation and management. The draft strategy will shortly be made available to interested Ratepayers and residents. Any changes or new services will not be introduced until public comment has been received and fully considered and it is expected that a public meeting will be held to explain aspects of the proposal.

NEW PLANNING SCHEME FOR BREAK O'DAY

The Break O'Day Council intend to act with the highest priority to prepare a new Planning Scheme for the entire Municipality.

The Municipality's planning is covered by a number of planning schemes inherited from the amalgamation of the former Municipalities of Fingal and Portland which operated in different ways.

The Mayor, Mr Robert Legge, moved at the last Council meeting to have the new scheme in operation as an interim Order by no later than 30 June 1995.

It is intended that the new Planning Scheme will address a wide range of planning issues such as zoning restrictions, building requirements and state policies such as Coastal Management and Land Use Management. The Strategic Plan for the Municipality will also be fully addressed.

Once the Land Use Planning Review Panel approves the scheme as an interim Order it is open for a period of public submission and hearings before its final approval.

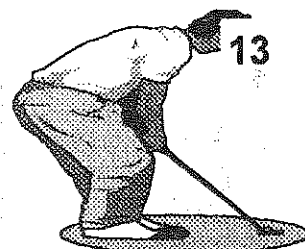

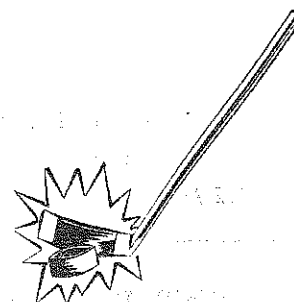
