





A short history of Tasmania Police

The early days of the colony

The origins of an organised police force in Tasmania can be traced to the arrival of Lt Governor Collins at Hobart in 1804. Collins brought with him a body of civilians known as the Night Watch which had been formed at the settlement in Port Phillip Bay to protect 'persons, property and peace of the Colony'.

After two years the Hobart Night Watch was disbanded due to its ineffectiveness and replaced by military patrols. At Port Dairymple (Launceston) which was then separately administered, the Lt Governor appointed Thomas Massey as Chief Constable with three subordinate Constables on 19 November 1804.

In 1825, Lt Governor Arthur appointed 30 convicts as Constables with the responsibility of policing Hobart. The following year a Field Force was formed to hunt the numerous escaped convicts and Arthur recommended that the colony be divided into nine Police Districts with headquarters at Hobart and Launceston, with district headquarters at New Norfolk, Oatlands, Campbell Town, Norfolk Plains, Richmond, Bothwell, Brighton, Great Swanport and Georgetown.

For each district a Police Magistrate was appointed subject to the control of the Chief Police magistrate at Hobs

The Councils

These controls remained virtually intact until 1857 where the municipal Police Act 1857 transferred the charge a control of the Police Forces at Hobart and Launceston their respective councils but under the supervision of Inspector of Police stationed at Hobart. Other municipaties adopted this scheme after the passing of the R Municipalities Act 1858.

Where no municipal authority existed, the areas were liced by the Field Force which remained under the con of the Colonial Government and were renamed Colo Police. The Police Act 1865 saw the creation of Po Districts and the Colonial Police were renamed again Territorial Police.

The existence of two separate bodies invariably led to sension which was not put to rest until centralisation was achieved with the passing of the Police Regulation Act 1898. But change was gradual and it took the recommendations of a Royal Commission in 1906 to see the appointment of a Commissioner of Police in the person of JEC Lord who was to hold the position for the next 34 years.


Times of change

Lord divided Tasmania into five police districts, each under the control of a Superintendent located at Hobart, Launceston, Deloraine, Zeehan and Devonport. The 232 employees in 1908 performed their duties on foot, on horse back and on bicycles. By 1919 the police department still had no vehicles of its own but agreed to pay a mileage allowance to officers using their own motor cycles on duty. In 1935, a breakthrough was made when the department purchased 84 motor cycle outfits, even in 1940, the department possessed only one four wheeled vehicle.

At Commissioner Lord's retirement in 1940, Tasmania possessed three police districts, their Head Stations being at Hobart, Launceston and Burnie. In the period which followed, reform was slow to arrive and it was not until a board of inquiry and a new Commissioner of Police in 1949 that changes were introduced.

A Police Radio Branch was formed in 1950 and there began a period of refinements to the organisation. A Search and Rescue squad was set up in 1960, as was the formation of Police Boys' Clubs.

The late sixties and seventies saw a substantial building program and a massive upgrading in both recruit and inservice training facilities and content. A Crime Prevention Bureau was formed in 1966, a Drug Bureau in 1970 and a Planning and Research Section in 1971.

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



October 22-28, 1995 is National Water Week so here are some very important facts and reasons why we must all get involved in the issues and solutions, and use water more wisely.

In the past 100 years Australia's population has increased from 3 million to 18 million. This 600% increase is expected to rise by another 31% in the next 25 years. Water is the source of life and humans are made up of approximately 60% water. The average daily supply of water to maintain each Australian's lifestyle is 2000 litres! But the supply isn't endless.

Australian lifestyles have changed out of all recognition in the past 100 years - washing machines, dishwashers, swimming pools and many other items that result in more abused/polluted water which requires expensive treatment.

Much of the wealth Australia earns is from the production and exports of primary products. These require water for their production. Without a wiser use of water by all of us our exports will be limited.

More than half of Australia's annual rainfall is below average, and droughts occur regularly, but the supply of water from rainfall has not changed in the last 100 years.

During the past 100 years virtually all reliable rivers in Australia have been dammed and in most cases more than once. Groundwater is being pumped up faster than it can be naturally replenshished, or is "hard" and unsuitable.

Our waste water is effecting the environment very badly and the continuing cost of treating abused water and land will in the future be met by all users.

Australians must use water more wisely and get involved with making wise water decisions now! If not, even higher costs will be imposed on us. There will be restrictions on use of water and reductions in lifestyle due to costs and the need to maintain quality and quantity.

How can we save water, the environment and money? -

- Convert to a dual flush toilet or place a brick in the cistern.
- Turn taps off whilst cleaning teeth or shaving.
- Install water saver shower heads.
- Only buy water efficient white goods AAA rated.
- Install aerating taps.
- Repair leaking taps and pipes.
- Use low phosphorus detergents.
- Water gardens early morning or evenings to reduce evaporation.
- Use a good mulch on your garden.
- Sweep pathways don't hose them.
- Wash the car with a bucket on the lawn.
- Install drip irrigation.
- Install rainwater tanks.
- Don't use drains to dispose of wastes.
- Recyle or re-use water whenever possible.
- Don't over fertilise gardens or farms.
