On Thursday 2 November the St Marys Chamber of Commerce members and a number of local business people participated in mock interviews with 39 Grade 10 students of St Marys District High School.

The students were asked to apply for a job of their own choice and attend an interview before a panel of three employers. Each student was assigned an appointment time and required to bring to the interview their Record of Achievement folders. Each student was allocated a 30 minute time-slot in which they presented their folder, answered questions and received written feed-back on their interview. This year's programme was invaluable to all students who took the opportunity to participate. 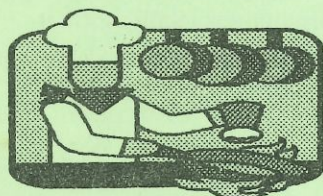

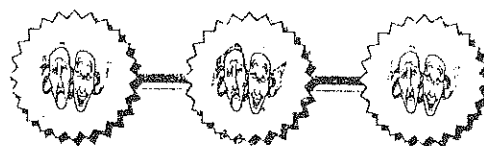

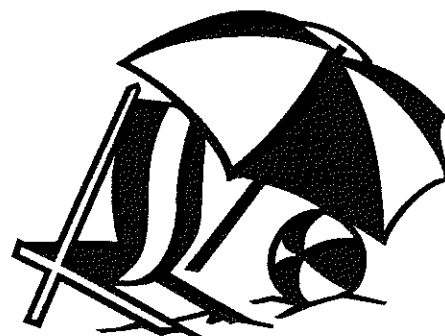

SCHOOL COUNCIL

At the moment a group of parents and staff are considering whether we at St. Marys need to establish a school council.

In the last school newsletter there was some information outlining the essential differences between a P&F and a School Council.

The parent group is a mirror of community opinion and a significant source of input to school management processes. The public forum of open membership that P&F groups provide is one for freedom of expression and debate. This open debate harnesses the strong individual and family influences and resources. It is through this medium that direction is given to school council representatives and informed decision making by councils is made more productive.

The decision of whether to establish a School Council is an optional one.

The decision will be made by our school community based on its LEVEL OF INTEREST and PARTICULAR NEEDS.

ARE YOU INTERESTED?

Education is a task shared among the people in each school community. It is a partnership of all those with an interest in the school: teachers, parents, students, and others.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO BECOME A MORE ACTIVE PARTNER IN YOUR CHILD'S EDUCATION?

The Tasmanian Council of State School Parents and Friends Associations is pleased to support and represent school councils, knowing that local management of schools relies heavily upon the effective representation of community interests. Traditional Parents and Friends Associations, with their public forum and breadth of membership, provide enormous assistance in planning and policy advice to schools: thus the value of P&F groups is multiplied as school councils become more effective.

Julie Roberts, State P&F Council President says "While the Department of Education and the Arts retains its responsibility for the quality of education provided in its schools and principals remain accountable for the educational performance thereof, the community at large must participate actively in the partnership". Mrs Roberts continues, "No single group has all the good ideas and skills related to children's learning. Successful schools are those which recognise this and have principals, staff, parents and people from business, industry, service groups and all other sectors of the school community working together in a school plan. Particularly over the next four or five years, as the new Education Act takes effect".

Schools which have an effective council will be doing better than those that do not.

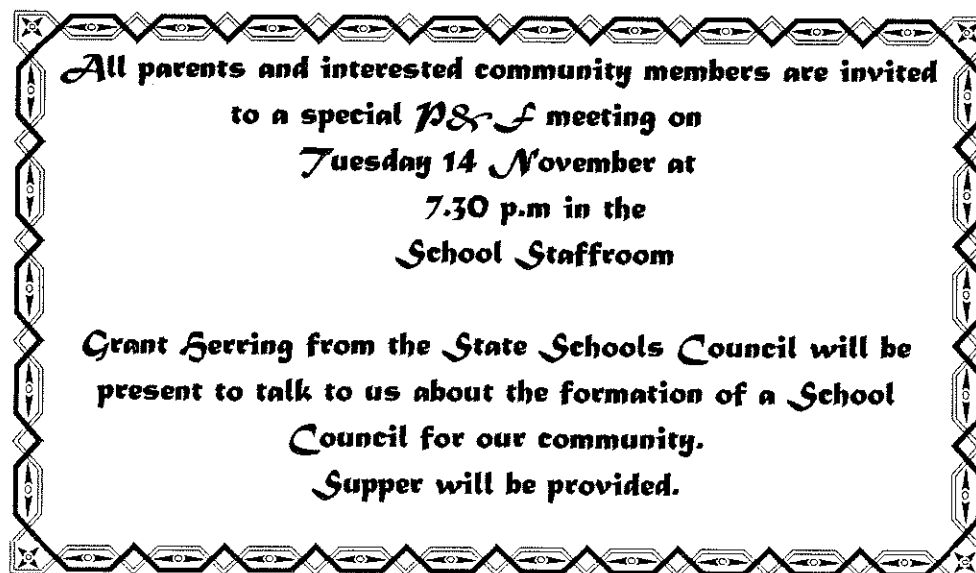
A school council constituted or operating without the support of the parent community organisations is like a car without wheels and without a road map. It would lack both the reason to exist and the pathway to follow.

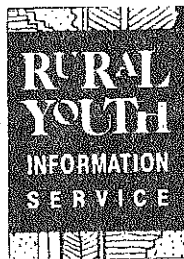

- Have you registered with the CES?
This is really important!
Register as soon as you leave school, so that, after 13 weeks you will receive Youth Training Allowance and be eligible for case management*;
- Do you know how to look for a job?
- Have you got a well prepared resume?
- Do you know how to write a letter of application for a job?
- Are your expectations of obtaining a suitable job realistic? Ask your teachers, parents and friends whether they think your expectations are realistic;
- If there isn't a specific job you have in mind have you got a goal to work towards? Have you thought about what's important to you in life? It's a good idea to list about 8 or 10 things that are important to you in your future eg enjoyment of what you do, satisfaction from what you do, security for the future, money - go on you can think of 10!
- *** Case management is available to young people leaving school when they have been registered for 13 weeks. It means that you can choose the organisation you want to case manage you and you will be allocated an experienced person to work with you in your search for employment and who will provide every assistance to you to become ready to take up a suitable position.**

ASTHMA**Can asthma be serious?**

Asthma is a potentially serious respiratory illness which affects approximately 1 in every 10 Australians. The effects of asthma range from an occasional mild attack to chronic severe asthma. However, most sufferers can limit their experience of the symptoms and also prevent permanent lung damage which may occur with chronic severe asthma.

What causes asthma?

The underlying cause of asthma is still unknown, however an allergic tendency is a common feature in many asthma patients.

Asthma occurs when a person's airways have become sensitive to a particular allergen in the air or in substances they eat or drink. There are many recognised allergens which are common asthma triggers. These include : pollen, certain drugs, animal hair, dust, certain food preservatives or additives and even exercise and weather changes.

What are the symptoms?

Exposure to these allergens irritates the airway walls, resulting in inflammation of the mucus membrane lining the airway and a contraction of the muscles layer underneath. This had the effect of narrowing the air passages to the point where breathing is severely impeded. Wheezing and coughing are outward signs that an attack is occurring.

Can asthma be controlled?

It is important for asthma sufferers to monitor their lung function (using a peak flow meter) to determine when attacks may be imminent. In this way they can take appropriate preventative action - taking medication, avoiding exposure to known allergens and seeking medical attention. Prompt treatment with bronchodilating medication can help to bring attacks under control.

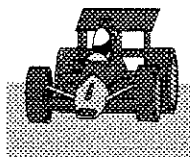

LANDCARE NEWS

Earthworms - anyone of numerous annelid worms that burrow in soil and feed on soil and decaying organic matter. So says my Macquarie Dictionary.

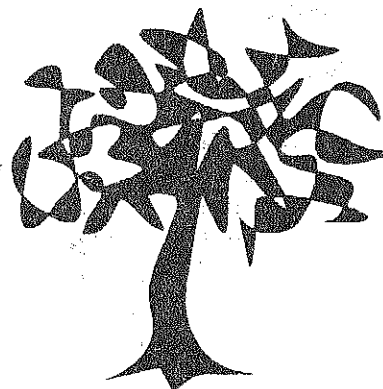
Since the beginning of this term Mrs Lodge's grade 1-2 at St Marys District High School have been involved with Junior Landcare looking at water, soil, air, trees, growing seeds and seedlings and making a worm farm in their classroom. This led to some delightfully illustrated projects on earthworms which I thought I would share with you. As I'm sure you'll agree, Tryone gives us much more interesting and colourful information when he wrote "the worm is a friend of the gardens. It has no back bone. It is soft. It lives in a hole. It digs a tunnel so it lets water into the soil. It has a saddle. If it is cut in the saddle it will die slowly and it has yellow blood."

Brigitte adds, "worms live up to 10 years. Their eggs look a bit like a lemon. Worms have about five pairs of hearts. Their hearts help them pump blood around their bodies. The largest worm is about one metre long and when it stretches it is two metres long." She goes on to write, "worms are very helpful. They dig tunnels and when it rains all the water goes into the tunnels and the plants can drink it."

Another well illustrated project on earthworms, from Lauren, reads "worm information - worms can lay eggs big as little stones from the road. A worm comes up to the surface to breathe and doesn't eat oranges. Worms eat leaves and roots from plants. It can build tunnels. Earthworms are very smart animals. In summer worms tie themselves in knots. Some have yellow blood inside. Worms have legs or arms. Worms have saddles in the middle of them. You can see where their head is if you see them move. Worms eat leaves and they eat the things that are green. DON'T SPRAY IT!"

What else is there to add except worm your way into LANDCARE!

Junior Landcare has been very busy of late. Last week Mr Jones' grade 5-6 spent the day planting some 150 trees and shrubs at Falmouth. Talk about efficient work....Hubert Kluber's LEAP group left St Marys about 7.30 am loaded with mulch, tools, wheel barrows, stakes and prepared the ground for us. The rest of us bussed down later armed with boxes of plants, bread, sausages and drinks. The students planted the trees and the Falmouth fire truck brought us water; really necessary as it was so dry - hard to believe a week later! The LEAP people then came and 'staked' and 'sleeved' all the seedlings followed by another team of students with wheel barrows loaded with mulch. Later we all enjoyed a BBQ lunch and some games on the beach. We hope the trees do well and that the blue gums grow into a forest for the swift parrot.

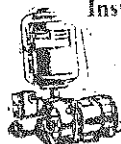

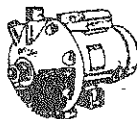

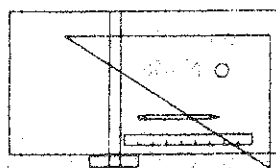
