Who Are They?

On 11 November last, a small group of Trustees organised an onsite gathering of interested persons to officially open the Winifred Curtis Scamander Reserve - dedicated to Tasmania's greatest living botanist. As part of the preparation for this auspicious occasion, Queen Victoria Museum botanist, Mary Cameron, and chairman of Trustees, Tim McManus, name labelled many of the trees, shrubs and plants in this unique piece of dry sclerophyll bushland, so visitors would know what makes it so. It is disturbing to report that already vandals have interfered with or removed many of these carefully prepared labels.

It is something of a paradox that, notwithstanding the excellent work done by a group of young people at the top of the St Marys Pass and along the Waterfall Track, and Annette Wines' praiseworthy efforts towards revitalising the community, senseless, unmitigated vandalism continues to devalue such positive overtures. What a ghastly first impression it must convey to visitors, interstate and overseas tourists in particular.

Every road sign and destination indicator board has been peppered with bullet holes. Not just 0.22 pea-shooter size but great jagged indentations from obviously high powered large calibre weapons. Political advertising signs, part and parcel - albeit unpopular - of any and all elections, have been systematically defaced or destroyed. Trees and shrubs have been wantonly damanged; and so on.

Who are these brainless individuals who demonstrate such little regard for their State? Are they local persons, or itinerant vandals from elsewhere hell bent on destroying everything they see? When do they undertake their acts of defacement? Nobody ever seems to see them. Can any reader recall any person in Tasmania ever being convicted of shooting up a road sign? Indeed the whole charade has become a dumb confrontation between authorities trying to foster aesthetic highway communication and clandestine nitwits determined to frustrate their efforts.

Perhaps the community at large could make a collective 1996 New Year's resolution to do everything possible to climinate mindless vandalism in our Municipality. Make use of the avenues afforded by Neighbourhood Watch. Report any observed acts of vandalism; and how many persons are in it. It would be wonderful to catch a group of such miscreants and punish them by making them repair and paint every road sign in the district. As well, teach your children and your grandchildren to respect the environment, and the rights of individuals. Vandalsim is a dreadful cost to the community. We must make every endeavour to stamp it out!


An assembly was addressed by Mr R B Johnson, Mr Peter Swifte (son of the late Mr H L Swifte) and Mr John Marshall - current Principal.







SAFETY AT HOME CONT...

PHONE CALLS

- * Don't reveal your name, telephone number or address to unknown telephone callers.
- * Never say you are alone at home.
- * Try not to give out personal information of any kind over the phone, even if the caller claims they are from a legitimate organisation.
- * If you have any doubts take the callers name and telephone number and call them back.
- * In case of nuisance calls, say nothing and hang up.
- * Keep police, emergency, relatives' and doctor's telephone numbers written down next to phone.

VISITORS

- * Be careful who you invite into your home.
- * Remember people from legitimate companies all carry identity cards.

Telephone their company (or pretend to if you don't have a phone) if you are not sure about their identification.

* Never tell a unknown visitor you are alone at home.

PROTECT YOUR MONEY

- * Keep your savings in a bank, credit union, building society or invest it. Don't keep large amounts of money at home or in your handbag or wallet.
- * Put your money into a purse or wallet before moving away from the bank teller.



LANDCARE NEWS

Well, a new year has begun and the 1996-97 basic goals of St Marys Landcare Group is to ensure a holistic approach to the management of land and water in our catchment, and so we plan to establish a community driven, community planned, community run "river care" project which will reestablish the health of the area's water system with agreed quality and quantity.

The creeks and tributaries of St Marys Rivulet and the Break O'Day River which drain westward into the South Esk River form the catchment we live in, and St Marys Landcare Group has taken on the huge task of commencing to restore these creeks and rivers.

The aim is to restore the river banks which have been choked by gorse and crack willows, which drop their leaves on the water, blocking sunlight and suffocating the river. The willows will be replaced with appropriate local species.

The project will involve local farmers and as many people in the community who wish to participate, council and business stakeholders and school students. It is part of a whole Catchment Management. National Landcare Programme funding will be applied for over a three year basis to set the programme in action. This is a long term programme, not a quick fix activity

A Catchment working sustainably has:-

- 1 forests maintained on steep slopes to protect the soil and stop it washing into creeks.
- 2 quality water in storage because it is filtered by forest
- 3 pasture is maintained and only grazed lightly on steep


