How she nurtured my love of books and poetry, lending me books of her own which were not available in the library stock.

Now back to the hall for Assembly. What a shame that not everyone could have made a greater effort to attend. The inevitable questions, "Have you seen Elaine/Helen/John/Peter/Margaret?" "Not here?. Oh, what a pity. I'd love to have seen him/her." The regret for those who for reasons of age or infirmity couldn't manage to get here, and the sadness for those who have gone on before us, ready for that Last Great Assembly. Remembering respectfully lining the road way for David's funeral, the first of our number to pass on. That was my first personal encounter with the Grim Reaper and I still recall fighting back tears as the hearse went by. I've always been a sook at funerals.

Time to sing the School Song with Jenifer, as usual, at the piano, so on the feet and, as the second verse tells us:

"....honour now our good old school,

And sing right lustily."

One could almost feel as if the forty years between this and the last singing had never happened. Now to chat with a few more friends until lunch is served. Unfortunately I'll have to gobble-and-go, as I have to be back in

Launceston by 3.00 pm. The day hasn't been long enough and there are people I've barely spoken to.

Thanks so much Jenifer, your committee and the catering corps. I've loved it! When's the next one? I think ten years might be too far off for some of us. After all it will be fifty years at the turn of the century for those who left in '49. So how about celebrating the year 2000?

But whenever - I'll certainly be there, God willing! So please, all those of you who didn't come this time, make a real effort for the next one!



PARKS AND PLACES TO VISIT OVER EASTER

The Tasman Peninsula State Reserves A guide to reserves and walking tracks



The Tasman Peninsula is famous for its intriguing convict heritage set in spectacular natural beauty. Visitors can choose from short easy walks around unique coastal formations and convict ruins.

TASMAN ARCH STATE RESERVE AND EAGLEHAWK NECK HISTORIC SITE.

Upon arriving at the Tasman Peninsula one can visit the historic Officer's Quarters and the infamous Dog Line at Eaglehawk Neck, or the spectacular coastal formations at the Blowhole, Tasman Arch and Devils Kitchen.

Devils Kitchen - Waterfall Bay (2 hrs return) walk along the cliff tops with views of some of the superb coastal features on the Peninsula. The waterfall plunging into the ocean at Waterfall bay is an impressive sight.

CAPE RAOUL STATE RESERVE

There are several walking options in the area. The main walking track leads you to the slopes of Mt Raoul (2 hrs return) with panoramic views of Cape Raoul, Bruny Island, the Southern Mountains and Mt Wellington in the distance. You can continue on to the Cape (another 1.5hrs) making the total return trip 5 hrs.

Another option is to follow the main walking track to Cape Raoul (approximately 30 minutes) then turn off at the junction leading to Shipstern Bluff and Tunnel bay. This is a day walk (5 hours return) taking in spectacular coastal and forest scenery.

COAL MINES HISTORIC SITE AND LIME BAY NATURE RESERVE

In the mid 1800's convicts worked in atrocious conditions in the underground mines to supply coal to Hobart Town. The sandstone remains of the convict buildings, the coal on the foreshore and a mystery convict well are a few of the haunting reminders of Tasmania's convict past.

The Lime Bay Nature Reserve, declared because of the beautiful coastal scenery and the dry sclerophyll forest, borders the Historic Site.

The endangered forty-spotted pardalote, a tiny, rare bird, and the brightly coloured hairstreak butterfly have been found in the area. Lime Bay's peaceful coastal environment with sandy beaches, colourful heathland and rocky foreshores invites you to camp and enjoy the beauty of this place.

An easy walk(2.5 hrs return) starts from the camping area and heads west following the edge of the lagoon to the beach which presents views of Mt Wellington,. Slopen Island and Bruny Island.

The members of Scamander Juniors who recently won the junior grand final against St. Helens included a number of our students.



LANDCARE NEWS

When a few specimens of Australian vegetation, collected by William Dampier, were seen in England in 1688 it caused much excitement. In 1777 Cook's two ships, the Resolution and Discovery anchored in Adventure Bay, Bruny Island and plants were collected and taken back to England. A French expedition in 1792 under the command of Admiral Bruny de' Entrecasteaux, included naturalists Labillardiere and Riche, whose names are commemorated in our flora genera and species. In the "Flora of Tasmaniae" 1860, J D Hooker wrote "The Flora of Australia has been justly regarded as the most remarkable that is known, owing to the number of peculiar forms of vegetation which the continent presents." The early years of settlement in Tasmania were very difficult but of great botanical achievement. In 1801 the naturalist Robert Brown was assigned by Sir Joseph Banks to Matthew Flinders' voyage to survey the Australia coasts. Brown made many collections during his 9 month stay at Risdon Cove and later Hobart classifying 700 species of flowering plants. Robert Brown's work attracted the interest of Dr William Jackson Hooker, Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, England, who made great efforts to get more specimens from Robert Lawrence and Robert Campbell Gunn who collected from Tasmania's mountains, forests and rivers.

Nearly 2000 species of flowering plants are recorded for Tasmania. Many are common and widespread, but most can be seen within half a day's walk from a road somewhere in Tasmania. Tasmania has plants growing from sea-level to mountain tops, temperate rainforest, wet sclerophyll (eucalypt forest), open or dry sclerophyll forest, subalphine, coastal heath and forest. Other plants are common on river banks and wet places.

Endemic species (peculiar to a particular area) which are found in wet places along creeks, river banks and areas subject to occassional flooding are most at risk with regards to their conservation on East-coast rivers, especially in lowland areas where agriculture has changed the land.

As human activities increasingly bring pressure to bear on our natural heritage river banks often become the last refuge for our fauna and flora. Loss of native vegetation and its replacement with exotic plants has contributed to the degradation of land associated with river systems. There is a very urgent need to conserve the native vegetation along our rivers and to rehabilitate degraded areas. Therefore identification of native plant species along our rivers form important information to aid the management of our rivers. If the degradation of our rivers is to be halted, co-operation between land holders, government agencies and conservation groups is essential. St Marys Landcare Group is currently involved in writing applications for funding to assist with Rivercare Projects

for the area and part of the requirements are species lists of native plants. But when we say 'native plants' we mean those endemic to the area, not alien native species which may not be suitable for the Rivercare Project. Removal of gorse, blackberry, hawthorn and willows along our riverways is a must, but clearance of vegetation may lead to flooding and erosion, so we need to plant some species which are quick growing and serve as 'nurse crops' for slower growing or more difficult to grow species and we hope the people of St Marys will bear with us in the first stages of rehabilitating St Marys Rivulet Stage II, it should be very beautiful! but it requires time, patience and care or we may be introducing species which ultimately may have to be removed again!!!


