Australian Kidney Foundation Circle Australia Rally

On June 16, approximately 50 vehicles will leave Sydney and travel through Canberra and Melbourne to meet with another 10 or so vehicles in Devonport Tasmania for the official start of an adventure of a lifetime, to circumnavigate this great continent in which we live.

Ross & June Penney of 160 King Street, Westbury, along with crew, Nadine (daughter) and Ricky (nephew) are extremely proud to be entrants in the inaugural Australian Kidney Foundation Circle Australia Rally in which they will retrace the tyre tracks of legendary 'gelignite' Jack Murray, Jack Davey, Harry Firth and Co. of the 'Redex' Rally days, and pit themselves and vehicles against the best and worst this land of ours has to offer, and all in the name of charity.

Covering about 16,000 klms in 26 days, they will visit all Capital cities, with the exception of Darwin, travel to and through places the majority of people haven't heard of and most of the rest only dream about, to promote the work of the Australian Kidney Foundation.

The Australian Kidney Foundation is a non-government, non-profit organisation chartered in 1968 to research the causes of kidney disease, urinary infection and renal failure. Since then it has adopted the roll of maintaining the ANZDATA register of all organ donors and the suitability of patients as transplant recipients.

Currently there are about 3600 ordinary Australians on kidney dialysis machines and about 1700 of those are suitable and are on the transplant waiting list, and the list grows by 200 - 300 a year. If, with your support we can find just one donor and part of the money for the transplant, then we would consider it a job well done.

Our goal is to make as many people as possible aware of the need for donors and if a decision is made the need to discuss this with the family so they are aware of your wishes. LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I would like an opportunity to try and allay fears regarding the immediate future of junior football in our district. 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

BOATING SAFETY

Safety Equipment

The following items are recommended for carriage by all small craft operating off-shore. It's important you check with state authorities to ensure your boat and equipment comply with current laws. You can increase your chances of rescue by knowing the distress signals and having proper signalling equipment on board.

- * Two compasses, one fitted, one hand-held for taking bearings of points ashore.
- * Marine radio transceiver for communications and Transistor radio to receive weather reports from public broadcast stations
- * Satellite Compatible Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon (EPIRB)
- * Inflatable life-raft or tender
- * Life-jackets or Personal Flotation Device (PFD) fitted with whistle and salt water activated light
- * Orange "V" sheet
- Flares and orange smoke markers
- * Heliograph distress signalling mirror
- * Sea dye marker
- * Lifebuoys with flag marker buoy and strobe light or flashing buoy light attached
- * Man overboard buoyant recovery line and attached float
- * Two strong bailing buckets with lanyard attached
- * Manually operated bilge pumps
- * Softwood or rubber plugs, for blocking hull openings
- * Two water resistant, floating torches with spare bulbs and batteries or one torch and one set of chemically activated light sticks
- * Two anchors with chain (or wire) and warp, one designed for heavy weather and one for fair weather
- * Oars or paddles as appropriate
- * Emergency steering arrangement e.g. tiller
- * Tools, repair & spare gear kits for engine rigging & sails
- Fire extinguishers
- * Emergency grab bag, stowed adjacent to EPIRB, carrying basic survival equipment plus survival rations of water and high energy foods

PLANTING TREES

WHEN TO PLANT

It is best to plant evergreen trees during spring, summer and autumn as most plant-growth takes place during warm weather. This does no mean, however, that evergreens planted during the colder months will necessarily fail, but they do run the risk of being either flooded or frost-bitten and thus retarded.

Plant deciduous trees with bare roots during winter. Bareroot trees are those that are not usually grown in containers in nurseries and, when required, are lifted from the open ground and delivered with moist packing material protecting their roots. When bare-root plants are put out during the cool months, there is less drying out of the roots and there are no leaves to wither.

Deciduous trees growing in pots or plastic containers can, however, be successfully transplanted all year round as the roots are established in soil and there will be no drying out of roots or withering of leaves.

Frost-tender plants are best planted in late spring, when all frosts are over. This enables the plants to become firmly established before winter sets in.

HOW TO PLANT

Trees in Containers

Trees that come from the nursery in pots or containers should be planted out carefully without disturbance to the root system.

Dig a hole before removing the plant from it's container. The hole should be approximately 25 cms wider and 12 cms deeper than the ball of soil holding the plant.

Fill the hole with water and allow it to drain, moisten the soil that is to be used for filling in.

To encourage initial growth, put some good top-soil at the bottom of the hole and firm down.

Remove the plant from it's container and carefully place it in the hole, making sure that the soil around the roots remains undisturbed. Fill in the hole with soil, being careful not to force any soil away from the roots. Tread down the soil around the plant until it is firm but not hard. Leave a slight saucer-like depression all round to assist watering. Give the plant a thorough soaking.

Bare-root Trees

Be sure to keep the roots of bare-root trees moist and protected from drying out before planting. Just a few minutes exposure of the roots to the sun can kill the plant. If planting can be done within a few days of delivery from the nursery, leave the packing untied and just dip the parcel in water for a few minutes and put in a shed out of the wind. If there is to be a long delay unpack and bury the roots in a shallow trench and keep moist until ready.


Overall a very enjoyable day and considering the outstanding performances by all swimmers the future of swimmers at St. Marys District High School looks extremely bright.



SCHOOL FARM

Following advice from Mr Roger McNeice (Senior Executive Officer from Property Services Section of Department of Education and the Arts) and information he has received from the Department of Environment and Land Management and the Crown Solicitor, I have been instructed to publicise the following points for general information and awareness on behalf of the Parents and Friends, licencee of the School Farm.

- As licensee of the land in question the P&F has complete control of it under the Crown Lands Act 1979. No other person or persons have the right of access to the property under licence, including adjoining neighbours.
- Any person or persons accessing the property under licence can be charged with trespass.
- It is illegal to cut or damage existing boundary fences and charges may be brought for malicious damage.
- Animals straying or being deliberately left on the land under licence may be impounded by the association in liaison with the local police.

BUS SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT Mary Beach

Our committee has had a frustrating 12 months, but we are now finally seeing the results of our lobbying and pressuring. A public meeting, articles in newspapers, copious letters and phone calls and the excellent work of Christine Milne on our behalf, has kept the issue "on the boil". This culminated in a meeting with Sue Napier (Minister for Roads) in January at the top of St. Marys Pass. We were not invited and nobody was particularly pleased to see us, but she did listen to our concerns.

The work is now being completed at long last. The Department of Works did not inform our Committee. A report from the Suncoast News contacted us for our comments. Is it cynical to question the timing of the works?

- It started around election time
- It will be completed in time for TARGA

But for whatever reasons, we are thankful that it is being done.

The Bus Safety Committee is continuing to negotiate with the Department of Transport to provide an additional smaller bus for the Falmouth/Four Mile Creek and Scamander route. This smaller bus would precede the larger buses and warn them of large oncoming vehicles. It would also ease the overcrowding on the Scamander bus. We are continuing to investigate other bus safety issues. eg. padding of bars on seats, seat belts, behaviour of students, etc.





COMMONSENSE HINTS To COMBAT THE COMMON CRIMINAL

LOCK IT OR LOSE IT

Whenever you leave your house, make sure that all windows and doors are securely latched and locked. Do not try to relate security of your home to the length of time you anticipate being away from it. Five minute outings have a habit of stretching to an hour or more, and that is more than enough time for any burglar.



KEEP GARAGE DOORS CLOSED

An empty garage usually means no one is home. Keep garage doors closed; keep them guessing.

PROTECT KEYS AND LOCKS

Why do people leave keys anyway? In most cases it seems they are left in case a member of the family or some other close friend visits when the owner is out. If you can trust your family in the house alone, why not have spare keys cut for them - they are, after all, certainly far more trustworthy than any intruder.

Also, when you stop to think about it, how many of your friends would enter your house when you are out? Most would prefer to ring or visit you again a little later than entertain themselves in your house.

Always separate car and house keys when you leave your vehicle in a parking lot or at a garage. It is easy for a person to make a duplicate of your house key and obtain your address.

Don't give keys to workmen, regardless of how long they'll be working in your home. Ask a neighbour to let them in and then relock your home in your absence.

Never leave keys under a mat, in the meter box, or on a ledge above your door. Intruders know all the hiding places.

Don't leave identification on your key-ring. If it is lost, the finder will be able to trace it to your home.

Always change exterior locks or lock cylinders when you move into a new home. Throw away the old keys along with the worry about who might have duplicates.

Do you know where all your keys are at this moment? If you lose one of your house keys, don't wait for the finder to turn up in the middle of the night or when you are all out. Change the lock cylinder immediately.

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Community Contact Centre The Future?

The Community Contact Centre opened its doors on the 1 May 1995 with the assistance of a Department of Social Security, Action Research Project Grant. The aim of the project was to find ways to assist people living on low incomes to obtain a better standard of living. This could be addressed in a number of ways.

The SMACD committee set out to firstly offer easy access to information and to assist in community projects which could benefit those on low incomes, either socially or economically. The Community Centre has been the result of the DSS funding.

Unfortunately that funding ceased this week and although it had been indicated that we may receive further funding to keep the centre going, that unfortunately is not the case.

We will spend the next month evaluating the project. Three groups will be formed to meet with our project officer, one will involve the staff and SMACD members, another will involve business representatives who feel they would like to have a say as to the viability of the centre and the third will be made up of clients who feel they have benefited from the centre. If you would like to participate in one of the evaluation groups please let us know. Each group will be made up of six people only and your input could have an impact on the future of the centre, not only in St Marys but in the establishment of such centres Australia wide.

SMACD also obtained funding to employ an Economic and Community Development officer. This funding has been used to tackle our economic woes at a grass roots level. Hence the shop local campaign, attempting to address Tourism issues in the Valley etc.

One thing that has become very obvious throughout the life of both projects is that both Economic Development and Social Security are closely related issues, particularly in areas of low income like the Valley.

Combining the two projects has, I feel, worked to the benefit of both.

It seems a life time since July 1993 when I called that first public meeting which was attended by some 100 community members who all appeared to share my concerns as to the future of St Marys and the Valley.

The Streetscape project has resulted in the projection of a fine document which has been adopted by Council and while many concerns were voiced when work started on the Cenotaph, one would have to agree that things are really starting to take shape and it looks like we will have a monument and town hall that we can all be proud of.

Consultation with Council is something else which is happening on a regular basis, with serious consideration being given to the footpaths and main intersection.

One would hope that things will continue to happen locally when and if the Contact Centre closes doors.

This is something we the SMACD committee are attempting to prevent but unfortunately our timing could not have been worse. With both State and Federal Governments going through a transitional period the prospects of further funding does not look promising.

While we have contacted all Government departments as well as approached we we will be well as approached we we will come to an end at the end of the financial year. SMACD will hold its AGM later this month. All executive positions will be open. Should we not get the support of the community we will have to seriously consider our future.

We continue to hear people say "We should do this or they should do that", but who are we and they? Of the 100 people who attended that first meeting to share our concerns there are just a handful who are actively involved in SMACD activities.

We are most grateful to those persons who support our activities but we really could do with some new committee members who are prepared to take an cactive role in the administration or projects.

Our aim is to keep the Contact Centre open as long as possible and to continue to find ways of lifting the profile and visual impact our town has on visitors to the area.

We would love to see you are our AGM, the date will be announced in the next Valley Voice.


