Volunteering: Building Community

Canadian Minister and Sydney Olympics Rep to Address National Volunteers Conference Earlybird Registrations to Close on 30th April

The Australian Council for Volunteering today announced the speakers for "Volunteering: Building Community", its National Conference on Volunteering to be held in Launceston, Tasmania from 3-5 July.

According to Conference Convenor and Director of the Volunteer Centre of Tasmania, Mr Nick Toonen, high profile international, national and local speakers have been attracted to the Conference by the opportunity to recognise and explore the importance of volunteering in Australia and throughout the world.

"Our Conference aims to explore all aspects of volunteering in the 1990s and will have community leaders and experts from across the Australian community and from overseas contributing to the debate", said Mr Toonen.

"The Sydney Olympic Games will be the biggest single volunteer supported event ever organised in Australia and we are very excited that the Director of Human Resources for the Sydney Olympics, Mr Ian Clubb, will be addressing our Conference on Volunteer Involvement in Special Events".

"We're also very pleased to have secured the Minister of Health from Alberta, Canada, the Honourable Shirley McLellan, as a keynote speaker to adress Volunteering: the Rewards and Benefits for Volunteers. The Minister is a well known international advocate for volunteering and will be leading Canada's hosting of the 1998 World Volunteer Conference".

"University of Tasmania economist, Dr Bruce Felmingham, will be speaking on Volunteering: Measuring Community Benefits, looking at what government and the community gain from volunteering and whether the value of volunteering can be measured".

Other key Conference Speakers include:

- Margaret Bell AM, World President of the International Association for Volunteer Effort
- Chris Sidotti, Federal Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commissioner
- Ledivinia Carino, University Professor of Public Administration, University of the Philippines
- Justice Pierre Slicer, Tasmanian Supreme Court
- Professor Terry Dwyer, Director of the Menzies Centre for Population Health Research
- Stan Fisher, Executive Director of the Wild Rose Foundation, Canada

According to Mr Toonen the Conference provides an opportunity for volunteers and those who work with volunteers to discuss issues of concern to them with the Conference Speakers and to share their experiences with other volunteers from all walks of life.

"The Conference will bring together over 300 people involved in volunteering from across the Australian community, representing the millions who contribute their time to every facet of community life, from sport, recreation, arts, tourism and heritage, through to health, education, religion, welfare, community services, emergency services, research, the environment and human rights", Mr Toonen said.

Earlybird registrations for the Conference close on April 30. Members of the public interested in the Conference should call (003) 24 3044.

"We urge every volunteer to take advantage of this unique opportunity to explore volunteer issues with the prominent Australian and overseas speakers participating in our Conference.





Running down the track to the beach.


Down at the water hole I covered my self in mud.

What wonderful weather we walkers had in March to visit the Old Dalmayne Mine site.





Why not "Try Hugs Not Drugs"?



DRUGS----NOT FOR ME, by Jasmyn Sharp, District W1 winner of the Drugs Awareness Essay Competition*

In 1992, 26,355 people died as a result of misusing drugs. The majority of deaths were caused by tobacco, which causes many types of cancers and lung diseases. Alcohol was the next largest killer. I'm not against drugs. Drugs can be a good thing. They cure sickness and disease and save millions of lives every year. It is only when drugs are misused by use of the wrong types or overdose that they become dangerous to the user and the

Abuse of drugs quite often results in major crime and violence. Most drug addicts need to steal to support their drug habits. A high percentage of the crime we have today would be in some way connected with drugs.

In 1993 statistics proved that 5% of children under 10 had smoked a cigarette, while 16% of children 12-13 had smoked. It is also proven that 8% of children under 10 had had an alcoholic drink. Obviously the legal drugs, over 18, are the most dangerous, especially since they are easy to get your hands on.

One of the main reasons that teenagers start taking drugs is because of peer group pressure. The really popular people start taking drugs so everyone else follows to try to fit in. Children could also be dared or forced to take drugs.

Some people take drugs for sport, especially when the competition is a major event or money is involved. In the Olympics, many people have been caught for taking drugs and have been disqualified as a result. Taking drugs for sport is a form of cheating as they enhance your performance further than your natural ability.

It costs taxpayers millions of dollars every year to rehabilitate those addicted to drugs. Taking drugs such as alcohol clouds your judgement causing a high percentage of fatal accidents. There are many types of illegal drugs and one is Amphetamines or more widely known on the streets as Speed. It can be sold on the street as a white or yellow powder, capsule or tablet. The high can last from a few hours to a few days. This is one of the drugs that enhances sporting performance. It keeps the body alert and causes inability to sleep. Another illegal drug is Hallucinogens and has the street name of Trips. It comes in the form of a white odourless powder, liquid, tablet, capsule or blotting powder. The high begins within thirty minutes and can last up to twelve hours. Sound, smell, touch and taste can become distorted. If a drug has been made incorrectly or unhygienically a Bad Trip may result causing further trauma or even death. An overdose of a drug can be used to commit suicide. Hallucinogens were widely used by hippies in the 60's.

I would never say - "Drugs not for me" and mean it entirely for all kinds of drugs. Some day a drug may save my life, and maybe already has! But I would never take drugs that are illegal and dangerous. My mind is already made up that I will never smoke or misuse drugs and alcohol. That's why i'll say "Drugs that endanger myself or the community - definitely not for me!!!!"
