Remember when.... "FLAG OF ICE AND RAIN"

I know we now have the very successful Valley Saints formed by the merging of St Marys and Fingal and good luck to them but lately my memories stretched back to 1983 when St Marys fought out the Grand Final with Fingal in the FDFA.

All that week the towns were resplendent in black and yellow and blue and white and the expectation was immense. Everyone was talking footy. Those times even the big stuff like the then VFL took a back seat for a week.

Grand Final Day in late August '83 dawned and the icy and heavy rain belted down. Mum and Dad had to leave for George Town about 8 am but the rest of us weren't going to miss the Grand Final. We sat in the kitchen and sipped on a cuppa and prepared for the day. Traffic even at that time was streaming past out house heading for the ground. We decided that there was no point heading over until about mid morning because we had no hope at all of getting a reasonable parking spot unless a pre-dawn one was secured. I think it was about 11 am when we eventually ventured over. We watched the Reserves battle it out until around 1.45 pm, then we waited expectantly for the Wayne Chugg led St Marys Tigers and the Robert Lowe led Fingal Blues to run through their respective banners. The weather hadn't improved either, water lay everywhere so I decided to locate myself in the dry but numbing cold Grand Stand at the western end.

Fingal rightly deserved favouritism for the game as they had remained on top of the ladder all year. The Tigers had done it the hard way having to win 7 games on the trot just to make the big day. Would the brilliance of Fingal dominate or would the dogged determination of the fighting Tigers win out. One hundred minutes of FDFA battle was about to find out.

I can't recall the differences in the scoreline at the end of the first three quarters but I know that neither side could break away such was the obstacles of weather and pressure. A tribute to each side was the closeness. A typical Grand Final between the teams was taking place. Staying on their feet was an achievement to start with, to take a mark was incredible and to kick a goal was a premium occurrence. Late in the last quarter the rain had let up a little, enough to venture down to the boundary level anyway. St Marys had maintained less than a goal lead and then a late goal came. Try as they might the Blues just couldn't manage to get a reply, turned back each time by the St Marys backline. For us St Marys supporters the last stanza seemed to go on longer than a politician's speech. Then all of a sudden the siren sounded and pandemonium broke loose as Tiger supporters streamed onto the lake (sorry, ground) to engulf the deliriously happy team. The eleven year flag drought was broken fittingly by eleven points. The scores were 10.9 69 to 8.10 58. Don't ask me who kicked the goals or who were the better players because I can't remember but I do recall Chuggy being chaired off the ground to accept from Fingal Municipality Warden, Stephen Salter, the Premiership Cup. Speaking of the Salter family the venerable,

late Mr Gordon Salter, one of the great Tiger identities was so happy and overjoyed it was fantastic to recall his reaction. That night a reputed 37 barrels were drank in celebration of one of the greatest Grand Finals. Over the years Fingal generally had won a couple more Grand Finals over St Marys as my Uncle Tom often recalled so I suppose to get one back off the old enemy was great. Nothing compared with the two towns rivalry. Absolutely nothing.

Now they are as one perhaps sometime soon a joint celebration of an Esk-Deloraine Premiership will lead to another great sporting tradition beginning for the two indomitable Valley towns. Maybe it will take a while to equal the feeling of a hundred plus years of rivalry and respect but certainly for us lucky enough to have known them, the St Marys Tigers and Fingal Blues will just as importantly be never forgotten.



surface so the water cannot "breathe". This prevents oxygen getting in to the water, and other toxic gases produced in the water from escaping. Oil also coats the fur of animals and the feathers of birds, sometimes with fatal results. Insects that live on the surface of the water are also badly affected.

• It may be easy to get rid of cooking oil by letting it go down the sink but think of the disastrous consequences. Always ensure that any oil, cooking or car, is put in a sealed container and disposed of properly. Cooking oil can go on the compost and car oil can be recycled via recycling centres and

some refuse sites. The devastating oil tanker spills that have occurred in our oceans are a larger scale of what households are: doing to our waterways every day. · Household poisons, paints, solvents and the like should not be rinsed or disposed of down drains. Check the label for disposal instructions or contact your local council or the Division of Environmental Management, Many of these substances have a direct and poisonous effect on wildlife. Imagine what could happen if the levels built up in our drinking water supplies?

 A staggering 630,000 plastic items are dumped at sea each day, killing or mairning our birds and sea animals as well as polluting the water. Never dump plastics in the sea; take rubbish home with you from boating trips and discard old fishing nets or lines correctly as they can strangle animals if they are left near waterways.

FESTIVAL AUSTRALIA

BACKGROUND

The Government believes that festivals are an important way of bringing the arts, audiences and whole communities together, and are of significant assistnce in generating increased tourism.

OBJECTIVE

Meet the Governments social justice objectives of giving more Australians better access to high quality arts events.

To support celebrations of place, and to promote a sense of community identity.

To stimulate economic benefits to communities.

Provide regional festivals with increased cultural activity to result in major marketing benefits.

GENERAL PRINCIPALS

Funds are available to festival organisers to assist in the presentation of cultural acitivities, events or programmes, where this would not have otherwise been financially practicable.

Festivals located in geographically isolated, remote and regional communities will be considered a priority for assistance under the programme.

ELIGIBILITY

A festival is a celebratory event organised within a community usually occurring at regular intervals and which involves cultural activities of special importance.

While agricultural shows or field days, sporting events, musical or other competitions are not generally festivals, these may include distinct cultural components which are eligible for assitance.

ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

Evidence of community participation and community support.

Contribution from local sources.



I've been very happy working out of the ACIS office for the past 18 months or so and I've met quite a few people, young and almost young who have found an information service to be of value to them. Thanks to Phil Corby, Steven Salter and the Chamber of Commerce for letting me use that office

Congratulations to SMACD on all the hard work and initiative involved in the opening of the Community Contact Centre. I feel that the Centre is located in the "thick of things" and that hopefully I'll meet even more people.

The importance of information can't be over-stated especially for people living away from the main population areas, who can't readily access services and government agencies. For young people who haven't experienced a great deal outside their local community, information is the key to setting out on their career pathway.

In the employment market it's often easier to approach employers to seek information than to actually ask for a job. From the employer's point of view it's wonderful to be able to talk about her/his business and what is required to continue to be successful, but having to reject a young person is not something to be looked forward to. For the young person at the start of his/her working career it's important to research all the possibilities and to get an idea what a career in different occupation areas might mean. Seeking information also demonstrates a keen interest on the part of the young person and might influence prospects for future employment.

I hope to see you soon in the Community Contact Centre. I'm there on Tuesdays from 10.30 am - 2 pm.



2 tablespoons chopped parsley




