

### THE MIGHTY AFL TRIP

Well it is all over, thank goodness. The excursion of a life time for the the U/10 & U/13 boys was a wonderful success. It is difficult to believe that no one got lost or was violently ill.

We set off on Friday 30th June, travelling to Melbourne with Ansett on three different flights. As usual I chose the wrong flight to go on. On arrival at the airport, on Franklin's Bus, with a raving crew of 39 I was greeted by an Ansett Official with those fatal words "Do you want the good news or the bad news first?" The good news was that the fog had lifted and the bad that our plane had broken down in Melbourne. Eventually we boarded, 2 1/2 hours late and took off. The terrified faces of all those who hadn't travelled by plane made a great start to the trip. Kirk Bean in particular was a little worse for the experience.

We arrived in Melbourne at 5.10, boarded our bus by 5.30pm and set off for the Victoria Hotel. Would we make the organised group meeting at 6.00pm?, not a hope. We were about 15 minutes late which wasn't a bad effort. David Bain and I wondered who would have the first heart attack as we hadn't had a minute's break all day. We literally threw our bags into the rooms at the Vic, met for 5 minutes and headed off to the M.C.G. Beachy led the way, being the only person who knew where he was going. I brought up the rear looking after the dawdlers. The whole party consisted of exactly one hundred and it seemed as though there were probably half of them Vineys. I guess Jack and Damon make enough noise for nearly that many.

The MCG under lights was awesome. Unfortunately, we had to sit behind the goal square with the Collingwood Cheer Squad. For those of us who hate Collingwood if you had seen the calibre of the cheer squad your hatred would have been verified.

The game began at 8.10 and by 8.20 it was all over with the "pretenders" kicking five or six goals straight in ten minutes. At half time the Crows U/13's played the Pies and we licked our lips. Our boys were much better, we thought.

While all this was going on the food carriers took an absolute hammering. Have you ever seen 45 starved kids at a footy match with bulk money and nowhere else to spend it? Hundreds of pies, cans of cordial, orange juices, and violet crumble bars were consumed. The Gillies boys are now famous in Victoria and Tasmania for their eating ability, simply awesome.

We walked back to the Vic with the group becoming rather spread out but still safe. We all needed a good night's sleep but some didn't achieve their aim due to over tiredness and excitement. The big question was could they eat any more? Of course they could, the phone rang hot as pizzas were ordered.

I awoke on Saturday morning to hear a very gruff version of the Melbourne Footy song being sung very loudly by David out our bathroom window. "Shut up!" came a loud voice from another room, luckily one of our crew. Bainy then proceeded to interview Jeremy Oliver on his thoughts about the day's footy.

Have you ever continually visited Hungry Jacks for meals because the boys want to, well try it some time, great stuff. After a visit to Time Zone and the Market etc. we met back at the Vic and prepared for our day of glory.

Another trek to the MCG led us to Gate 8 where we were met by three A.F.L. officials. One was a Match manager and one to help with either Richmond or Melbourne U/13's. The crowd was bigger, about 43,000 compared to 33,000 on Friday night.

Early on we went through the same ritual as the night before: food, drinks and more food. Sammy Seymour had the radio glued to his ear to see if Crackers Keenan would give us a plug. He did, in Tasmania.

At quarter time we met and were taken to the North Melbourne Senior rooms to change. The rooms were enormous, probably five times a normal change room with several rooms.

The hype had begun, we parted, Richmond to one room and Melbourne to another. The boys were given shorts, socks and a jumper for the game. They had to supply their own boots. Aaron Milner, a big boy, had to borrow a pair of shorts from the Richmond Manager. The umpire caused total stress when he inspected the boots and many stops and even a pair of boots had to be changed.

John Miles, Melbourne and Des Faulkner, Richmond gave the final pep talk to the boys, they didn't need much revving up. We all jogged out to the race and were issued with final instructions. Our game was to be the only one on the M.C.G. at half time and we were to play in the area from the goal square to the 50 metre line. Scores were shown on the score board.

he hearts began to beat quickly, the siren sounded and out we ran quickly setting up goals and into positions. The bell rang and the A.F.L. umpire threw the ball up. The crowd roared, they wanted more pies. For the first couple of minutes Bainy and I looked at each other and shook our heads, what a disaster, the boys were overawed and the game very scrambly. Someone had to take the game by the scruff of the neck and show the Victorians how we could play. Luke Faulkner was just the man for the job. He played superbly and the standard lifted enormously. The A.F.L. rep said "My word that boy reminds us of Robert Flower."



#### THE MIGHTY AFL TRIP

Two seven minute halves were played with Melbourne soundly defeating Richmond. The boys had been drilled for that final bell. It rang and they took off tearing over to the race to make a guard of honour for the Senior Teams. When the last player ran through, the boys ran along behind each respective team for half a lap and then back to our race.

They had done it! Our aim was achieved and they had been fantastic. Everyone was terribly proud of them. The umpire said it was the best standard Junior game he had umpired. Much back slapping and congratulations was evident in the changeroom. The A.F.L. thanked us and said they would like us to return soon. Not too soon I replied.

By now you will believe it, as a reward the A.F.L. gave them *another pie* and a can of cordial. The boys changed, thanked all concerned then went back to watch the Senior game from the Southern stand. All the Richmond supporters were now surprisingly quiet as they began their slide down the ladder. Des Faulkner, Chris Davern and Andrew Viney & CO were very quiet. At the end of the game the majority of the boys went to the Melbourne Rooms and had a good talk with Gary Lyon, Stynes, Tingay etc. Photos were taken and many autographs signed. The Melbourne hierarchy was totally behind our efforts and thought our fundraising had been fantastic.

That evening the boys went to Luna Park, Time Zone, the pictures or the basketball and a great time was had by all. Of course they all ordered more Pizzas for a late night supper.

The next morning, we packed, had breakfast and walked to the M.C.G. for a tour. Beachy again led the way. Nobody can ever say he is boring, we had six trips and went a different way every time. The tour was very interesting and the time went quickly even though we were tired. After a bite of lunch we met, said our thankyous and boarded the bus to go to the airport. Our two flights home were fairly punctual. The other Bean family member Kyle was a little green by the time we landed. We grabbed our gear and boarded the bus, being much quieter on the way home than we were on Friday.

The boys received a medallion and twenty dollars pocket money and will in the future get a Melbourne or Richmond footy jumper. Not bad for a price of \$70.00.

We had a great time, the boys played and behaved fantastically and everything went smoothly. Congratulations boys, you were a delight to take away.

Mr Bain, Mr Marshall, Mr Beach, Mr Seymour, Mr Oliver and Mr Walley all did a magnificent job supervising the boys. Mr Beach and Mr Bain in particular deserve the highest praise for their initiative, orgnisation and professionalism. Many people don't realise that Mr Bain was responsible for thinking of the idea and approaching the A.F.L.

Finally, to you the community there is a video of the trip being developed and I hope you get a chance to view it. There are hundreds of people to thank and this is not the ideal publication to acknowledge your efforts individually. Thank you for your wonderful gestures. To raise \$20,000 in a small area shows how much you cared and worked to provide a unique experience for children.

I believe a highlight of the whole venture has been the way in which all the towns have worked in unison to achieve the best possible result for the boys.

Thanks everyone, we will do it again in about 20 years time.

### BREAK O'DAY COUNCIL NEWS

### IOINT INVESTIGATION RECOMMENDED FOR DIE BACK.

The Break O" Day Council have decided to approach the State and Federal Government to explore the possibility of a joint venture to properly research the reason for rural tree decline, or Die Back, in Tasmania.

The council feels that although work is being done in this area it requires a more concerted and co-ordinated approach involving Forestry Tasmania, National Parks and Wildlife, Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, the CSIRO, private companies and interest groups.

Die Back is not as prevalent in the Break O' Day Municipality as in some other areas but the Council feels that a unified and urgent approach must be mounted to halt the problem before it reaches disaster proportions.

It is suggested that the fungal disease Pytophthora Cinnamoni also be included as a subject of investigation by the proposed joint venture.

#### FRENCH NUCLEAR TESTING

Another voice has been added to the outcry over the resumption of French Nuclear Testing. The Break O' Day Council moved at it's last Council Meeting an expression of concern over the French Testing Programme in the Pacific and reiterated a former decision which declared the Municipality a Nuclear Free Zone.

### LACK OF CONSULTATION BY PARKS AND WILDLIFE.

The Break O' Day Council have criticised the Parks and Wildlife Service for lack of consultation when drawing up a Draft Management Plan for the Scamander Coastal Reserve.

While the Council are not critical of the contents of the document they feel that consultation should have occurred with the Council and the local community prior to the draft being released as it could have repercussions for residents. holiday makers and the municipal Planning Scheme.

The Draft Plan addresses such issues as day use, camping, parking, traffic control, dune erosion, the creation of walking tracks and the eradication of exotic plants and feral animals.

The Scamander Coastal Reserve covers most of the foreshore area in Scamander including Wrinklers Lagoon. Several other areas are under consideration for inclusion in the Reserve including Crockers Arm, Paddys Island and a large piece of private land adjacent to Henderson Lagoon.


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

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### BREAK O' DAY COUNCIL NEWS

#### DOES YOUR PROPOSAL NEED APPROVAL?

Council frequently receives building applications for work when the proposal also needs separate approval under the Planning Scheme. Any building which is to be used for something that is not a permitted use in that area requires Planning Approval first. As with a lot of things, it is wise to check with Council first.

#### MOBILE TELEPHONE NETWORK

The provision of mobile telephone facilities in the Break O' Day area moves another step closer when Telstar start installing optic fibre cable at St Helens later this month. Auxiliary sites for the antenna poles are to be situated at Parnella Exchange at St Helens, Bear Top Hill at Binalong Bay. South Sisters near St Marys and Rajah Rock near Avoca.

The sites will have 30 metre tapered poles which, along with the small masonry buildings to house the equipment, will be coloured to blend in with the surrounding areas. Although the provision of these facilities and the operation of Telstar is outside the Break O' Day Council land use planning system Telstar is required to consult with local government as part of its national code.

#### RURAL ADDRESSING

Break O' Day Council are currently sponsoring a rural addressing program within the Municipality. system, which is being adopted by all councils within the state is a simple and permanent means of identifying, locating and addressing properties in rural areas.

Property numbers are allocated in a logical sequence based on the distance of the properties from the start of the road, odd numbers on the left, even numbers on the right. The number 327 refers to a property on the left and 3,27 km from the start of the road.

The program will start along the Esk Main Road near Avoca, working towards St Marys and staff undertaking the numbering will be issued with a letter of authority from Council.

#### EMPLOYMENT AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Break O' Day Council are currently investigating the merits of forming an economic development committee for the municipality after the General Manager, Mr John Brown, presented a discussion paper at the last Council meeting. It is envisaged that the proposed committee would be broadly based with incorporating council, community and industry representatives.

Council recognise that it is vital to have a strategic plan which must be acted upon to tackle employment and economic development in the area.

### LANDCARE NEWS

The Australian bush is one area that makes Australia an unique country. A large section of Australia's population still sees the Australian landscape as alien, unattractive or more often as vacant land to be tamed, used or exploited. Because Australia is such an urbanised society most people's knowledge of bushland is of the remnants, often degraded, that survives in and around our towns and cities. Bushland conserves our unique flora - trees, shrubs, grasses, ferns, herbs and mosses.

For the first white colonists in Australia "Englishness" was the only yardstick by which civilisation was measured. The rugged and unruly Australian landscape seemed alien, ugly and dangerous. Homesick colonists introduced foxes, rabbits, Scotch thistles, willows, gorse and broom, blissfully unaware of the havoc they would cause.

Only the early botanists realised the uniqueness of our plants and by the end of the 19th Century many hundreds of Australian species were in cultivation in England.

Australia's forest birds have also been isolated from those of other continents for millions of years and this means that many of our bird species are unique. We have a high proportion of the worlds' honeyeaters and parrots and our tree creepers, warblers, robins, flycatchers, thrushes and wrens are also unique to Australia.

It has been shown that a garden with a large number of Australian plants attracts native birds. For birds to be retained in a garden, food, shelter and suitable nesting sites must be provided. Food in the form of nectar produced by flowering shrubs and trees, seeds and the

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insects that feed on the leaves and bark. Birds also require shelter from severe weather and from predators. It is perhaps less obvious that trees also need birds. Honeyeaters and lorikeets are the major pollinators of many species of eucalypts, as well as banksias, bottlebrushes and many other native shrubs. Birds also help to disperse the seeds of many plants.

Wattles which grow quickly, provide shelter for other plants, enrich the soil and encourage the birds. Bottlebrushes, grevilleas, teatrees and banksias will attract honeyeaters. Winter flowering species are especially valuable as they encourage nectar feeding birds to stay when insects are scarce. A variety of species of flowering shrubs should be planted, with some dense prickly clumps to provide safe nesting sites. Some dead trees and branches could provide nests for tree creepers, pardalotes and parrots. If these are lacking, nesting boxes can be used. A well sited water bowl or pond will provide drinking and bathing facilities for your feathered friends.

With thought and care a variety of birds and flora should lead to a healthy, interesting environment for all


