## MY YEARS AT PICCANINNY

I spent many very happy years on our 'little farm" at Piccaninny Point. My husband and I had a dairy herd and a few hundred sheep of which we worked early morning and late at night on some occasions. I remember Geoffrey, my husband, working at the Dalmain Mine for some time.

The old aerial transporting of the coal to the coast passed over our back run and of course was a failure from the very beginning. Open sea made it impossible to put coal into the holds of the ship from the hopper.

The mine, after many years, re-opened using transportation with a lorry so Geoffrey became the lorry driver and walking up the ridge each day - the extra few bob was very handy starting out on the farm. We also grew up to 9 tons of pumpkins each year for which we received the colossal sum of threepence per pound at that time.

We also had many happy moments out in the boat catching "couta" for the market for which we also received threepence per pound. In those days during the war it was considered a fair price. Shark catching was also done on a line with hundreds of hooks and it was no mean job baiting all those hooks. One morning on the line was one huge grey nurse shark and it was the length of our boat. Fortunately it had drowned itself and made it easier to handle. After we cut the head off this tyrant and secured the liver, of which we had one and a half kerosene tins, and delivered it to St Marys depot we received threepence per pound for the flesh and the same for the liver. The liver was very important during the war for medicinal purposes. It was all very 'hard yakka' cleaning, boxing and transporting but we took it all in our stride and can safely say enjoyed it.

I loved the spring on the farm - all the

calves, chickens, lambs and loveliest of all the little pigs, not forgetting the ducks. The little ducks were a great favourite and I spent many hours watching the antics of these new offspring. I was made sad when the



mother of the tribe of ducklings would have them out "walkabout" and a crow would come and pick one up and fly away. It really made me wish I had my trusty 310 gun with me. Springtime was also a busy time harvesting until fairly late each day. We'd cart in until milking time - dash down to our little creek and dive in and have a beaut swim then come home ready for the onslaught of milking forty cows. It was also a busy time picking tomatoes - we picked hundreds of cases each year and I really believe all the "tomato sauce" on St Marys was made from our coast grown tomatoes and didn't they have a beaut flavour?

Really, one has beautiful memories of work on the farm. Geoffrey and I were keen golfers and never missed going to our recreation - my introduction to the game was by Mrs Jean Lohrey. Every



golfer was to bring a 'newey'. Jean was right handed and I was left - although it was not known on that day. My contribution was a display on its own, trying to use a right handed club was really funny - I had better success hitting a rabbit out of a squat with a lump of wood. However I've had many enjoyable years after it was all sorted out. We never missed our Saturday at golf and Geoff enjoyed his few beers with his mates and I really feel it gave us a different outlook on life.

We were never short of visitors on the farm and every Saturday night our dear friends, the late Basil and Ivy Lehner, would come down and play cards until the very early hours of the morning. Of course it did no good for the early hours of getting up to milk at five but that was our life on the farm and we enjoyed it. On one occasion we were planting our tomato plants down close to the beach and noticed this cream car and people walking about for such a long time on the main road. Thinking they were having a cuppa, and for not one minute thinking they were broken down, we went on with our work and went home to milk and by this time realised they were not there by wishes of their own. I immediately made a huge batch of scones in my faithful Rayburn oven and called them in to the beautiful big log fire and devonshire tea. Were they happy! It was a hire car and full of tourists. We formed some beautiful friendships and from



### BREAK O' DAY COUNCIL NEWS

### TRANSMISSION AND BRAKE FLUID, COOLANT AND WASTE OIL.

The Councils Environmental Health Officer has recently been made aware of the inappropriate disposal of waste liquids resulting from vehicle maintenance. In one case this involved tipping radiator coolant into a stormwater drain. This is not a harmless action. Radiator coolant contains a toxic compound.

Stormwater drains ultimately run into natural waterways. In coast areas it may finish up in bays or lagoons and in the Fingal Valley into the South Esk River or its tributaries from which water is drawn by communities downstream.

The Environmental Management and Pollution Control Act 1994 provides for councils to take legal action against persons who engage in acts of pollution.

Many service stations will accept sump oil and other waste automotive fluids should be stored in a clearly marked container. These containers can be disposed of at a tipsite and council is currently considering other means of disposal in its Waste Management Strategy Plan.

### RODENT CONTROL AT ST MARYS TIP

The Council workforce is in the process of carrying out a rat control programme using "Talon" bait at the St Marys Tipsite. The bait is an anti coagulant which is available "off the shelf" in supermarkets and hardware stores. It will be laid in clearly marked lengths of sewer pipe to protect the bait from weather and interference by non target species such as native wildlife.

Members of the public are requested not to interfere with the bait stations and not to allow their pets access to the tipsite. Warning signs will be posted. For enquiries contact the Break O' Day Council Environmental Health Officer, Richard Mason on 761281





### What is AVTS?

### It is the acronym for AUSTRALIAN VOCATIONAL TRAINING SYSTEM.

### So what does that mean?

It is an integrated entry-level training system that is now the major focus of vocational education programs provided at senior secondary colleges in Tasmania.

### OK, but what will it do for students?

It will provide a broad range of articulated pathways; combine education, training and experience in workplaces and give students national accreditation from industry for the workplace skills they will gain whilst still attending school.

### When will this happen?

It's happening now. In the Forester District, two highly successful AVTS programs operate at Alanvale College. They are in the industry areas of Hospitality and Forestry. In 1995, plans are current for at least three more programs at Alanvale and one at St Mary's District High School.

### Why is the DEA committed to this change?

For many years there has been a growing realisation that we can better prepare young people with the skills they need to cope with the changing economic needs of this nation. This is an attempt to address some of those needs and has been instigated by the Federal Government through the Training Reform Agenda and the broader philosophy of Working Nation. The DEA has therefore taken up the challenge and adopted various methods in implementing this positive systemic change.

### What else do I need to know?

Heaps! The systemic application of AVTS into senior secondary colleges is part of the Career and Work Education Policy that applies to all Tasmanian schoolchildren from K-12.

### BREAK O'DAY COUNCIL NEWS

#### RATES

The Break O' Day Council has been able to hold its rate increase for the forthcoming year to 2.13%, a figure approximately half the current rate of inflation. The new rate structure is 7.75 cents in the dollar. Some individual properties will see significant variations in the amounts payable as general revaluation has seen some properties increase in value and other decrease.



### THE ST MARYS LANDCARE GROUP JOINS **AUSTRALIA'S ONE MILLION TREES** CHALLENGE

Members of the St Marys Landcare Group are working hard this week as part of Australia's largest concentrated revegetation activity. The group has pledged to plant 450 trees before the end of November as part of A Current Affairs Angry Anderson Landcare Challenge.

July 29 marked the beginning of the seven days national effort to plant one million trees along the Murray River and across Australia. Up to eight thousand volunteers will turn out around the Murray River and thousands more will be planting their own trees across Australia.

Landcare groups, schools and community groups around the country are working overtime to meet the target. Organisers are aiming to plant one million trees and shrubs on fourteen official planting areas (180 sites) in the Murray River catchment. They have challenged schools and community

oups around Australia to match that total with another one million.

Colin Loane, Chairperson of St Marys Landcare Group said, "We are pleased to be part of the challenge and we want to show that the St Marys Community is doing its bit towards revegetation activities".

"Planting trees and shrubs is important in addressing a wide

range of issues such as reducing groud water levels, increasing biodiversity, preventing soil erosion, improving water quality, creating wildlife corridors and creating bushland areas for the enjoyment of the community".

"We will start planting on July 29 and everyone involved will be working to try to get our target of trees and shrubs planted", said Colin Loane.

The Landcare Challenge is being filmed by Channel 9 at official planting sites along the Murray River. The tally of trees, including those planted by the St Marys Landcare Group will be announced on the programme.

The Angry Anderson Landcare Challenge will go to air on Channel 9 on Friday September 1 which is National Landcare Day.

The farm was not that big and every bit of grazing land had to be free of unwanted trees and rubbish and provide fodder for our stock. For the little place that it was, it was indeed fairly well organised and every bit of ground used. I recall one of the incidents which at the



time was not funny but has since caused unite a bit of humour. Geoff brought the pit pony home for the weekend and of course he had his big gelding and one afternoon put the saddle on him and then commenced to do so with the "little girl". I'd never been on a horse in my life - we made it down to the beach alright then Geoff went into a canter and the little one followed. I sate almost speechless with the little girl just keeping up. I didn't know what to do and it

was absolutely in a frenzy hanging on. We came to some rocks and I was never so pleased in my life. If Geoff had only told me to be ready and what to do but I think it was his way - you teaching yourself the hard way.

Another lovely memory was I made many pounds of pork sausages, cured all our bacon and grew all our own meat and had just on one hundred chooks and I'm proud to say I built my own chookhouse with an outside laying box and a feeder, swung from the roof inside, always Ifull of pellets or grain. Butter and cream was always in plentiful supply and I remember an Agee jar cost 5 shillings. My pantry was a dream. I had that many jars of preserves of every description. I had curry, irish stew, lamb and mint sauce to name a few of the meats. You never knew when you were going to have visitors and I was always ready. I did many jars of vegetables, pickled onions by the crock full. I won many prizes for the preserves at the local show each year and it was very interesting doing exhibition work. Yes! it was all very handy for a good [ farm feed. Everything could be grown much easier and sooner on the coast. One thing you could not do was run to the store if you ran out of anything nor could I borrow from my neighbours as each one was a mile or so away. Such a lot of the necessities of life were grown on the farm and it did make life so much easier. Eventually we bought the grocery store at St Marys and moved up and this ended my very happy days on the farm.
