DRIVER FATIGUE

Driver fatigue is a major cause of road accidents.

Up to 30% of fatal accidents on country roads involve driver fatigue.

Driver fatigue accounts for 7% of general accidents and about 30% of accidents involving heavy vehicles such as buses, trucks and tankers.

These accidents can happen at any time, but the times when you are most at risk are between 10 pm and 8 am, and early to mid-afternoon. Accidents caused by driver fatigue are more likely to result in severe injuries than other accidents.

MYTHS

Winding the windows down, pinching yourself, talking loudly, singing or turning the radio volume up will NOT keep you safe once you've started to feel tired.

The only solution is to Stop Revive Survive.

RISKS

Driver fatigue is caused by:

- · Lack of sleep and rest.
- Driving for a long time without a break.
- Driving when you would normally be asleep (eg late at night or early in the morning).
- · Drinking alcohol.
- Some medicines (ask your doctor or pharmacist).

Certain problems such as sleep apnoea can cause driver fatigue. Sleep apnoea is linked with snoring and causes you to stop breathing for short periods when you are asleep. It stops you getting a good night's sleep and can make you tired and drowsy the next day. About 10% of males between 40 years and 60 years may suffer from sleep apnoea.

SIGNS & SYMPTOMS

- · Nodding off at the wheel.
- Slower reactions and responses.
- Driving faster or slower than normal
- Not seeing traffic lights or road signs
- Not being able to tell how fast you are driving.
- Driving all over the road. Not staying in your own lane.
- Difficulty keeping eyes open, tired eyes, aches and pains, lazy steering.

NEW HABITS

- Take a break from driving every two hours.
- Share the driving on long journeys. This breaks the boredom and gives you time to
 rest.
- Only short distances if you've had a tiring day.
- Know how your medicines will affect your driving. Ask your doctor or pharmacist.
- Have fresh air coming into the car. A stuffy car makes you sleepy.
- Plan your journey to include stops along the way at places of interest.

 Watch for signs that you are getting tired such as aches and pains, tired eyes and not concentrating. Stop and rest.

At first sign of being tired, pull over at the nearest safe place to rest. Stop for as long as it takes to feel fresh and wide awake.

You may like to:

- · Have a nap.
- Stop for a meal or a nonalcoholic drink.
- Read a book or magazine.
- Get out of the car and take a walk.
- Stay somewhere overnight.

RESIST

- Driving late at night or early in the morning.
- Drinking alcohol and the driving. Even one drink can make you drowsy.
- Taking caffeine or other medicines to keep you awake.

ENJOY

- Having a fatigue free trip.
- Knowing you are driving safely

BREAK O' DAY COUNCIL NEWS

PUBLIC PHONE AT AIRPORT

Following vandalism to the public phone at the St Helens Airport, Council is to approach Telstra with a request for them to replace the facility.

1996 AUSTRALIAN ORIENTEERING CHAMPIONSHIP

The 1996 Australian Orienteering Championship which is to be held in the Break O' Day Municipality has been supported by Council who have offered assistance towards the production of a brochure to publicise the event.

To be held between the 28th September and the 6th October next year organisers expect the Championship to attract approximately 830 competitors. Official events start at Royal George with the final days at St Helens which will be the base for the duration of the event.

It is estimated that competitors and visitors will inject almost \$750,000 into the region and the advanced mapping required for the championship will result in high quality maps being produced which could be used for future events.

Organisers say that this event will maintain Tasmanians excellent standing in orienteering circles with St Helens in particular being identified as a venue for major international events in 2000 or 2003.

ART GALLERY AND HISTORY ROOM

The Break O' Day Council will seek funding from the Federal Department of Tourism to help build extensions to the St Helens History Room which will also incorporate a Community Art Gallery.

The St Helens History Room, one of the most important tourist assets on the East Coast has very much outgrown its present building and some time ago vested some adjacent land with the Break O' Day Council with a view to future expansion of the building.

The Suncoast branch of the Arts Council of Tasmania have also identified a need for a public gallery space in the area. The East Coast region has a large number of resident artists and artisans and currently there is no public space to exhibit their workt or to host travelling art or craft exhibitions.

It is hoped that the proposed building could also incorporate an area suitable for theatre, workshop and meetings.



SCHOOL PROJECT

The Break O' Day Council has decided to sponsor the St Helens School to paint garbage receptacles around the town. Council will supply the material to allow the students to paint the receptacles using cultural/heritage themes.

The St Helens Street Theme Committee is also supporting this project which will be carried out by the students from mid September to mid October.

WASTE MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

□Dear Sir

I read the article written by Patsy Crawford in the "Sunday Tasmanian" on May 14 this year. Robert Legge commented 'that St Marys often looked tired and that many of the business houses drift along without lifting their image'.

I shop at St Marys often and must admit that most of the shops on the main street have done an excellent job of painting murals and their shops beautifully.

I worked in window display for many years and advertising as well as a long or sale of Third World crafts across Australia which involved mammoth weekend exhibitions in various capital cities and volunteers set about the task of displaying the goods. We used boxes etc all covered with hessian, folded and draped. Excellent effect.

Some of the shops at St Marys are not aware of display work especially in windows. One shop has completely blocked off the interior of the shop with various items of clothing which stops people seeing stock inside. One of the rules of display is to let people be enticed into the insides. However, will they buy if they can't see what you have. Blocking off windows only causes people to walk past.

I would suggest clothing hung from ceiling on fishing wire which is attached to clothes hangers, clothes hung in this fashion and pegged back with fishing wire to floor hooks with only one or two main items and displayed. The base of window could perhaps have dried spagnum moss (available from your lovely craft and garden shop at the Railway Station) then a few wooden or cardboard boxes covered with hessian with smaller items showing. This would entice people inside. Maybe spring, summer, beach or country themes for appropriate times of the syear.

Shops around the town have numerous notices plastered all over the windows, again blocking off the premises. Perhaps these could go around one or two sides only of the window.

The town of Sheffield has made a name for itself with 'Flo's Pumpkin's Scones'. Perhaps, Devonshire Teas might be a good idea. Who doesn't like hot scones with jam with dollops of cream - blow the diet. We are all weak when it comes to food. Once people are aware of Devonshire Teas available it will be a stopping off place for many if a sign is prominent.

Trying to find a magazine is a marathon task, wending ones way around the various nooks and crannies. A bit disconcerting to say the least because there's no 'steady flow'. Perhaps the long counter might be the answer with the cash register nearer the door. Trying to find a video in the dark interior is another hard task. Maybe I need glasses, or new ones?

I have not been into the new community centre as yet. Again, the counter running across the front and various notices posted all over the window 'blocks off' entry. Wouldn't a few easy chairs, coffee table and counter moving at least to one side be more enticing 'to go in and have a chat'. The noticeboard is fine to one side for viewing from the street. You never know if anyone is in there or not.

I didn't realise that St Marys had a shoe shop till the other day because its set back from the rest of the shops. Again perhaps 'hot pink' paint on windows and hessian draped in window over various heights of shoe to be above displaying goods might attract the eye.

I suppose by now a lot of shopkeepers might be saying 'who is she to say what we do with our town'. All I can say is that these are my be sobservations and probably many others but I write this to help, not to be shinder. If you require any advice on display I will be pleased to assist.
