

It proves the writer does not shop locally.



ST MARYS JUNIOR LANDCARE GROUP EMBARKS ON AN AMBITIOUS PROJECT

Following from a pledge to plant 500 trees as part of the Angry Anderson "Plant a Million Trees" challenge, St Marys Junior Landcare have become involved in the Swift Parrot Project.

BACKGROUND

The Swift Parrot travels from the mainland to breed in Eastern Tasmania from September onwards. Its principle food tree here is the Tasmanian Blue Gum and partly as a result of a 2/3 reduction in Blue Gum numbers, the Swift Parrot has slipped from a precarious "vulnerable" to be on the <u>endangered</u> list.



Making the most of your petrol

Fancy foot-work

Automatic transmissions will shift up more quickly and smoothly if you ease back slightly on the accelerator once the car gathers momentum. Never rest your foot on the brake as this wastes petrol, increases brake wear and decreases braking efficiency.

Don't rest your foot on the clutch as this also causes waste and wear. If you stop on an upward incline, use the hand-brake to hold the car, not the accelerator and clutch.

Make sure that the hand-brake is fully released before you drive off.

Switching off

If you're stopping for a lengthy period, switch off. Restarting uses less petrol than idling. Since the engine is already warm, you shouldn't have to use the accelerator to start the engine again (unless the car maker recommends it). Don't pump the accelerator when idling; it squirts petrol into the engine instead of the correct vaporised mixture.

Drive economically

Good driving habits are among the easiest ways to save fuel and money. You can prove this for yourself by keeping a log book (refer to the pages at the back of the *Guide*). Driving economically will also reduce wear and tear on your car, and improve road safety.

Tyres

Inflate your tyres to the highest pressure recommended by the manufacturer. This will save fuel and improve your car's handling, although you may notice a slightly firmer ride.

Information on tyre pressures can be found in the owner's handbook. Cars made since 1972 also have this information on a plaque fixed to the body, usually inside the glove box or on the edge of the driver's door.

Under-inflated tyres cause an increase in fuel consumption. Surveys have shown that two thirds of motorists have their tyres under-inflated. The effect of this under-inflation, based on running radial ply tyres at 140 kPa (20 psi) instead of 190 kPa (28 psi) is three per cent extra fuel consumption.

Pressures should be checked weekly and only when the tyres are cold.

Look out for uneven wear. This may be due to incorrect wheel alignment. Make sure it is checked when your vehicle is serviced as tyre wear costs you money for both tyres and extra fuel.

LANDCARE NEWS

We have heard the acronym LEAP regularly, but what is LEAP? The Landcare and Environment Action Programme (LEAP) is a training programme for young unemployed people aged 15 - 20. LEAP is a Federal Government initiative aimed at improving the long term employment prospects of young people.

Earlier this year St Marys Landcare Group was contacted by Northern Group Training to enquire if we would sponsor a LEAP programme.

A project was drawn up which required DEET approval and names of unemployed youth was issued by CES.

Following interviews, seven trainees were appointed to work on Landcare projects in the area under the supervision of Hubert Kluber. Northern Group Training, a LEAP broker, is responsible for arranging training and safety clothing.

The courses studies are:-

- 1 Senior First Aid
- 2 Occupational Health & Safety
- 3 Chainsaw Operation and Maintenance
- 4 Workplace communications
- 5 Business calculations
- 6 Aussie-host Workshops
- 7 Conservation Studies

All this leads to a Certificate of Conservation and hopefully full-time work for these young people from Avoca, Fingal, Cornwall and St Marys.

Leptospermum rotundiflora -large pink flowers with green centres. Tea tree will grow under a wide range of conditions. They make excellent garden specimens, or as a hedge.

Albizzia iophantha - closely allied to Acacia. A shrub to 8 feet. Flowers yellow and fluffy, feathery leaves. A native of WA, is naturalized in Eastern States. Suitable for coastal areas.

Callistemon citrinus - crimson bottlebrush, a bushy shrub to 6 feet. Worth a place in any garden. Will grow under a wide range of conditions. Sunny position. Flowers spring, summer, autumn.

Callistemon Sieberi - erect shrub to 10 feet flowers yellow from Vic and NSW

Eucalyptus globulus - Tasmanian blue gum. Very large tree to 90 feet. Seeds food for many birds and swift parrot. Frost tender. Coastal areas.

Melaleuca squamea - paper bark to 9 feet. Will accept poorly drained positions. Most hardy - can be used as specimen planting, garden shrub, wind breaks & hedges. Mauve flowers.

Melaleuca erubescens - erect shrub to 9 feet. Small spikes

of mauve flowers. Hardy in most soils and aspects. Good screen plant.

Melaleuca incana - pendulous shrub to 9 feet. Cream flowers in spring - summer. Excellent folliage plant with graceful weeping habit. Very hardy in most soils and aspects.

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Making the most of your petrol

In recent years there have been growing concerns about the threat of global warming caused by greenhouse gas emissions. Our motor cars are responsible for nearly one fifth of Australia's emissions of these gases. You can play an important part in helping to protect the environment by choosing the most fuel efficient car to meet your needs and driving it in a fuel-efficient manner. These measures will also help you save petrol and money.

Choosing your next car

If you're planning to buy a new car, think carefully about your motoring requirements. Remember, the price you pay the dealer is only part of the story. Don't buy a car which is bigger or more powerful than you need.

Car weight will have a considerable effect on your petrol bill. On average, every half tonne of car needs around 700 litres of fuel just to pull that weight around for a year. Large luxury sedans and station wagons, weighing over one and a half tonnes, add up to a lot of petrol powering a lot of vehicle you possibly don't need.

Servicing

While you may feel confident of performing a number of maintenance jobs yourself, some require specialised training and equipment.

Regular servicing to the manufacturer's specification by trained staff may result in your car using up to 9 per cent less fuel than similar cars maintained by owners themselves. Cars serviced regularly may use up to 5 per cent less fuel than those serviced irregularly. Some of the cost of a service may therefore be recovered by a reduction in your petrol bill.

Speed kills economy

High speeds result in high fuel consumption. At 110 km/h your car uses up to 25 per cent more fuel than it would cruising at 90 km/h. On the open road drive according to the road conditions and within the posted speed limits.

Drive smoothly

Avoid hard braking and acceleration, and drive smoothly. Heavy acceleration just delivers more fuel to the engine than it can efficiently handle. Heavy braking also wastes fuel.

You can minimise the need to brake suddenly by scanning the road and traffic conditions ahead and maintaining a safe distance between your car and the vehicle in front.

Make a good start

When starting your car for the first time each day, revving to warm it up before driving off is unnecessary and wastes petrol. However, avoid higher speeds, and rapid acceleration until normal working temperature has been reached.

If your car has a manual choke, use it only for as long as it takes for the engine to run smoothly.

Select the correct gear

Driving in a gear lower than you need is a waste of fuel; so is letting the engine labour in top gear on hills and comers. Change up through the gears and into top gear as soon as possible, but without accelerating harder than necessary.



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PROBUS? What is PROBUS??

It comes from the words PROfessional and BUSiness. Simply meaning that, as in ROTARY, the professional and business people (plus others) come together to share one and others company.
