I am a believer that the Fingal and Portland Councils were not the greatest of marriage partners by the powers that be when amalgamations were forced.

One reason that came from the rhetoric at the time was increased efficiency and a reduction in costs. No one will convince me that either has improved markedly in the western half of the new municipality (formally the Fingal council). What of the capital cost of the revamped St Helens Chambers to the detriment of the Fingal building. Because of its location a large number of Valley residents will not realistically be able to use the new building and probably some time in the future Fingal Chambers will not be staffed full time. What a waste that would be.

Also abolished in recent years is the ward system whether this was done by Council or by State Government I don't know but it surely is a retrograde step. At least under the ward system you knew for sure that your area would have a voice on Council. That cannot be guaranteed now. Like it or not we are quite parochial so equal representation will only be gained to a fairer degree with Wards being used.

And while we are at it why do we need a voting system similar to State Government. Why can't it be a simple straight forward first past the post

primary vote so that the top nine or so candidates are elected. I'm told a preference system is utilised. What for? I challenge a Council Officer to explain the benefit of that if it is correct.

I also believe that as ratepayers it is possible to watch a Council Meeting and introduce a topic for debate if adendered however apparently no debate can be entered into by anyone else. Why couldn't Council consider a short question time from interested parties prior to a decision being made instead. Future Councils sould be very specific with their projects and be accountable for accurate timescales when these projects are implemented. For example St Marys or Fingal water treatment plant. Instead of us being told it could be in two or three years time, I suggest that Council budget now for a DEFINITE and advertised project date and advise ratepayers well in advance of rate rises to cover works. I believe this is called Forward Planning.

I commend Council on asking for submissions to do with Strategic Plan. This is a good thing provided that a list of Priority jobs are evenly dispersed among the community and not simply done on a population basis. Every community is equally important.

I trust that this forced amalgamation will one day transcend the perceptions of many residents of the Fingal Valley. Right or wrong you can't help how you feel on the matter and a lot of questions should be asked on all issues.

I wish all intending persons seeking election in the forthcoming Council Elections the very best of luck.

I hope you remember where the majority of the vote to elect you comes I know St Marys, Fingal, from. Mathinna, Cornwall, Mangana etc haven't got an ocean on the back doorstep but we are very important just the same. Stick to the principles of fair and hard work and no one will have a gripe.

I fully realise and anticipate that some comments in this article will be strongly disagreed to but we are all entitled to express our opinions and I responses will that hope We need varying forthcoming. opinions to find a majority decision and force reviews.

Pick up those pens and express your views to the Valley Voice on all council matters. I ask you because we all deserve the chance to have a say on local government and in the coming years perhaps the future Councils will prove to me we are better off now than before.



At a special meeting of the Break O' Day Council today a new and innovative planning scheme was endorsed for submission to the Land Use Planning review Panel where it will be released for formal public consultation before final implementation.

The Mayor of Break O 'Day, Robert Legge, said that he is delighted that the new planning scheme has reached this stage.

"Council have now adopted a single planning scheme for the entire municipality which will be of tremendous benefit to the community. This is the first performance based planning scheme to be implemented under the new resource management planning system" he said.

"It is based around coastal management and councils settlement strategy and strategic plan"

"The new planning scheme is the result of an extensive public consultation and public awareness exercise. We wrote to every landowner in the municipality seeking their comments and suggestions" Mayor Legge said

MORE GOOD NEWS FOR THIS AREA

More exciting developments have been announced for Tasmania's East Coast. The proposed Tele Trak project at Chain of Lagoons has now been expanded to include a 200 room five-star hotel and 18 hole golf course of international standards.

The plan was put forward by the famous Bill Schier, one of Australia's foremost resort and tourism pioneers. A founding director of Travel Lodge who established the acquisition and development of the Lenna in Hobart and the Shearwater Country Club at Devonport Mr Schier also built Australia's first capital city motel in Melbourne.

He made the announcement last week which was enthusiastically received by Break O' Day Councillor Stephen Salter who has worked closely with Tele Trak since their initial approach. Councillor Salter firmly believes it is a tremendous opportunity for this area. "This is something the Council have dreamed about," he enthused. It's great to see his vision for the development of the region.

But the resort plan depends solely on Tele Trak proceeding. According to Mr Schier, only then would a need be generated for this kind of development. Decisions from the Government are being awaited eagerly as a special task force has been assembled to investigate the Tele Trak proposal and is expected to report by the end of the month.

The Community/Economic Development Officer for the Break O' Day Council, Steven French, who described the plan as a "once in a lifetime opportunity" has called upon all political parties to give Tele Trak and an associated \$40 million luxury hotel a fair go. He said that it was estimated Tele Trak and the proposed Hotel would inject approximately \$60 million into the East Coast region and could create an extra 1500 to 2000 jobs in an area hard hit by unemployment and with very little job opportunities.

"The employment this development would bring to the region is large by any-standard, but huge on a Tasmanian scale," Mr Salter was quoted as saying. "There would be no cost to the government as it would be funded with private money. It will halt erosion in local services like hospitals, doctors and banks, and probably bring about their increase. That can only be good news for the area."

Mayor Robert Legge said no plans had yet been submitted to Council but that they would certainly look forward to an application of this magnitude being presented.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir.

Eighteen months ago I had the privilege of standing in the by-election for the Break O' Day Municipality and because of municipal rules, it will probably, be the only by-election held in the Break O' Day Council.

October brings us to the full election, in which all seats are up for grabs. Nine Councillors will be elected to make the decisions, which will determine the way our council is run for the next six years. Unfortunately, my present position will not allow me the time needed to be a good councillor. I do, however, feel the need to put pen to paper and show my concerns in the way my area, the Fingal Valley, is being over-ridden by St Helens and the coastal areas of the municipality.

My anxiety, at this time, is the representation the Fingal Valley is going to end up with after October. As I see it, the current councillors re-standing are not all that popular and with the quantity and quality of candidates standing from St Helens and the Coast, two, or perhaps three, is all we can hope for in the Valley. The population of St Helens and it's outlying areas far outweigh the people of the Valley. Then there is the General Manager's roll (people who own property in the municipality, but live elsewhere) most of whom, are shack owners from the coast. I believe, in this election, people will vote for the candidate they feel will be best for their area, or their issue.

Whilst, I'm sure, candidates will campaign, putting across the view, they will be looking after the whole of the municipality. Don't believe it. It is my opinion, the majority of the St Helens and the coast people don't give a hoot about the Fingal Valley. We are, I feel, their "Poor Neighbours" and if a majority of councillors come from the coast area, I am sure, we will only get the "left overs". What's left after

all has been done on the coast.

I am not sure who is standing from the Valley, but we must all get off our bums, look at the candidates and vote 1 2 3 4 etc. for our local people. LANDCARE NEWS

Late last year and early this year Mark Neyland, Rural Tree Decline Project Officer, Forestry Tasmania Hobart conducted an investigation into aspects of tree decline in Tasmania. The results of this work have been published in a report entitled "Tree Decline in Tasmania, A review of the factors implicated in tree decline and management recommendations for its control". The report is available from Forestry Tasmania, Private Forests Tasmania and from Greening Australia offices throughout the state.

As a follow up to the publication of this report, Mark Neyland will be addressing us in St Marys on Wednesday 30 October at 8 pm at St Marys District High School - all interested people welcome.

The talk will be illustrated with slides and overheads and will cover issues such as tree decline, climate patterns, possums, insects and diseases, land management practices and remnant vegetation.

TeleTrak what it could mean for us

The opportunities that would be created by TeleTrak and the building of a five star, 200 room hotel and an eighteen hole golf course on the East Coast are the most lucrative and exciting that could be hoped for.

TeleTrak is a labour intensive environmentally friendly, pollution free rural development.

TeleTrak meetings will be at night, to avoid clashes with traditional meetings. This new form of racing will complement traditional racing in the way night cricket complements day cricket.

Because TeleTrak is geared for television, not spectators, the tracks will be built in regional areas, away from capital cities.

At the commencement of each TeleTrak telecast, an eight minute documentary about the region hosting that night's race meeting will be screened. The documentary will give overseas audiences context about where the race meeting is being conducted, and is a chance to showcase local tourism, agriculture, industry and other unique characteristics of the region.

Each TeleTrak is estimated to generate 1000 to 1500 direct and indirect jobs at each location. Industry estimates show 1000 stabled horses require \$350,000 worth of goods and services each week. This will provide a massive boost to any regional area where TeleTraks are established. Beyond this, extra opportunities will be generated in the stud breeding industry, for horse feed suppliers, veterinarians, and in every facet of the horse industry.

In the area of television production, 100 permanents and casual jobs would be created.

All this relates to TeleTrak and the hotel proposal would produce many more job opportunities for the large number of unemployed people in our municipality.

The employment and economic benefits from such a clean green industry as TeleTrak must surely be welcomed to our region.



They were, as most families were then, very hospitable and always had a drink, be it either a cup of tea or a drop of the various homemade wines that they Some were pretty used to make. potent. Neither married, they had no power on, but coped pretty well. Bill owned Judy Derby who was the mother of Peter Dovell who won a race for Fred Triffett. He was turned out for two years, brought back into training by Bill and won a double at St Marys aged 13 years. He had numerous others, but none much good. Brother Jim had a few, also not much. Another brother Jack owned Lucy Globe who was a non winner. She produced Cahoo, a very good horse raced by Lionel Bullock winning twenty four races. Double Barrel a full brother to Cahoo, also won a couple for Lionel. Jack also raced All Gold who won at St Marys, driven by his son Ian. She opened up a huge lead early and just managed to hang on to win. She was later raced by Max Semmens of Upper Scamander. One of her foals, Chamfer Gold won for Geoff Storay of

Launceston. Les lived most of his working life in the North East and returned to St Marys after Jim's passing. Les owned Lorraine Derby who produced Black Currant. Jack Stamford had him first then he was trained by Colin White. He won at St Marys 1962 and finished third on the same day two races later, driven by Colin White, Arch Rowbottom. besides being a hard working member of the local Club, also has been involved with some pacers some good. some not so good. He raced Gentle Chamfer on lease from R Andrews of New Norfolk. She won a few races for him and was later raced by D McHenry. She later bred a couple of very good horses namely Sassafras and Dromicia and others. Colin also trained Falcon Scott for his father. he won once and was sold to Whites of Devonport who won quite a few races with him, later racing in Queensland with success and also in the heats of an Inter Dominion. Colin also trained Blue Todd for Cros Davern winning at Westbury and three at St Marys.
