

#### Dear Editor

One of the main criticisms with the teleTrak proprietary racing proposal is the lack of information. The facts as presented to me are that approximately 1500 people will be employed, with a thousand horses in work and the remainder of horses agisted on other properties. This is many less employees than the current industry employs per thousand at work mainly because of the economies of scale. The total capital cost of teleTrak International Hotel and Golf Course is estimated to be \$80 000 000. There has been suggestions that there is not enough horses to meet teleTrak's needs. There is no lack of brood mares in Australia, there is a lack of owners.

The federal, state and local governments are not being asked for any financial assistance, they will however receive many benefits taxation, commissions, rates, taxes and employment, the bulk of which will be funded from monies received overseas.

Because we extract as many gambling dollars as possible from people in Tasmania there appears to be no moral issue involved. If we are concerned about the social problems created by gambling, here is an opportunity to use money generated overseas to assist with those problems.

A main criticism has been that it will harm the existing racing industry. Entry to the VIP stand is by invitation only, races will not be broadcast or telecast in Tasmania so you cannot go to, see or hear and outside entries (horses) are not accepted, how can it be detrimental? Incidentally there has been very strong support from those who are in the industry, breeders, owners, jockeys, strappers etc, a joint venture appears to be the answer.

TeleTrak is a clean, green environmentally friendly labour intensive industry which will give us the opportunity to promote this state for eight minutes prior to each race telecast into dozens of countries and millions of homes. It would be difficult to calculate what that would be worth in dollar terms suffice to say it is the greatest opportunity ever to promote Tasmania.

# LANDCARE NEWS

MARCH IS LANDCARE MONTH and this year's topic is "Veg Out with Landcare", so plant a tree or better still regenerate some remnant bush.

Management of Remnant Bush

Native bush can form an integral part of the resource base of agricultural properties. By diversifying the environment, native bush helps a property remain environmentally sustainable. Appropriate bush management helps to maintain the economic value of properties by:

- 1 providing shelter for stock and crops
- 2 stabilising the soil
- 3 providing a reservoir of predators of pasture and crop pests
- 4 helping to maintain water quality and
- 5 the preservation of native flora and fauna.

#### FENCES

### Why fence off an area of bush?

The aim of fencing off a piece of bush is not to lock it up and make it a fortress but to help manage it. Fencing serves to control grazing and facilitates the re-generation of native plants. Fences should be strong enough to withstand pressures from stock run in adjacent paddocks. Gates or other access points should be installed to allow for appropriate management, for example, controlled grazing.

It is far simpler and cheaper to fence off and manage existing stands of bush than to re-establish trees for shelter or other purposes. Even re-established areas of native bush require management. If the area is left unmanaged, it is likely that problems will occur. If there are weeds present they will very likely spread further. Both native and exotic grass species can grow large enough to shade out other smaller species, thus preventing tree regeneration as well as creating a potential fire hazard.

### Once an area is fenced off, what then?

What you do once the area has been fenced off will depend on the condition of the bush area.

To assess it's condition the things to look for are:

- how much of the ground cover is composed of native species, (such as kangaroo grass, tussock grass, native heath, native herbs)?
- are there any understorey trees. For example, Silver Wattle (Acacia dealbata), A. mearnsii, prickly box (Bursaria spinosa) or native honeysuckle (Banksia marginata).
- are there any young eucalypts present and are they of different ages (you can tell this by the difference in their height and girth)?
- how healthy do the trees look. (One way to assess this is by the amount of dead wood in the crowns)?
- the number of weeds species present and the proportion of area under weeds?

If you find if difficult to make an assessment and cannot tell what is native and what is not, then there are people available who can help you in the Parks and Wildlife Service, Forestry Tasmania, Private Forests, University of Tasmania, local landcare groups, Tasmanian Field Naturalists Club, Tasmanian Conservation Trust and Society for Growing Australian Plants.

If there is very little in the understorey, and the ground cover is mainly introduced grasses (ie Yorkshire or Barley grass), and there are few, if any eucalypt saplings, then it will be important to encourage some regeneration.

If there is good understorey and the ground has moderate cover of native species, and there are young trees growing to replace the older ones, then it is important to ensure that the present stock of species is maintained.

In many cases some weed control will be necessary.

There are a number of reasons why areas of bush may have difficulty regenerating naturally, for example:

- if the ground is covered by a dense sward of grasses, tree seeds will have difficulty germinating and those that do may be smothered by the grasses.
- there may not be any seed in the soil to germinate.

  (Check the trees and other native plants to see if they are producing flowers and fruit.)
- the seeds of some species need fire to either stimulate germination (eg some Acacia species) or prompt seed release (eg Banksia, Allocasuarina and Eucalyptus species).
- the seedlings may be subject to grazing by possums, rabbits, deer or other animals (eg sheep).
- the conditions may be too dry.
- weed infestation may be choking regeneration.
