# Appreciation Luncheon for Drivers

"They are the silent people of the Meals on Wheels service" said Mr Bob Yates, the President of the Fingal Valley Meals on Wheels Association, when he welcomed a gathering of 66 volunteer drivers who enjoyed an appreciation luncheon at the Old Tasmania Hotel Fingal on Saturday 15 March. Mr Yates spoke of the good response for drivers from Four Mile Creek, Falmouth, Scamander, St Marys, Fingal, Cornwall, Mangana and Mathinna. At present 20 meals are being delivered to people in their homes Monday to Friday and this service has been continuous for over 25 years. When speaking of his special respect for "Mr MOW", Mr Yates was referring to Mr Jack Miller who is Secretary and has the unenviable job of working out the rosters and who tries to please everyone and give them the day to drive which suits them best and asks to please let him know if he doesn't get it right and as always, new drivers are most welcome.

Mr Yates thanked Vicki Woods for her work as Treasurer and said how pleasing it is to have a young person get involved with MOW and hoped to have Vicki on the committee for many years to come.

The Director of Nursing, Allison Smith, and her kitchen staff were given special thanks for the preparation of meals and

Mr Yates made the comment that unlike many places where frozen meals are used, St Marys District Hospital prepares the meals freshly cooked on the day for the drivers to deliver. As the President said, it is sometimes worrying when you deliver meals to an elderly and frail person in their home and you can imagine yourself in the same position one day and that we are performing a Christian act in looking after our neighbours.

Mr Yates paid tribute to State Secretary, Jackie Dermody, then welcomed Mr Roy Preece and Mrs Preece from Longford. Mr Preece who is the Tasmanian President of MOW spoke of the high

regard in which Mr Yates and Mr Miller were held on the State Executive and assured those present, that they represent our area well.

Mr Preece told the MOW drivers that volunteers are very important people who carry out their work without fuss and without seeking rewards and that a community can be judged by the number of volunteer services it has. A great luncheon (especially the salads, apple crumble and meringues!) was catered for by the Fingal Parents and Friends and I'm sure all MOW drivers appreciated a most enjoyable afternoon.



#### REMINISCING

Over the Christmas break I had some very interesting conversations with people, some were holiday makers and others were just acquaintances.

One such, was a young man talking about things he could remember about Cornwall and are no longer there. This young man was born in the district and lived at Cornwall, went to school at St Marys then finally going to the mainland for about 10 years.

One of his memories were the pine trees around what is known as "The Flat". These were planted as a memorial to the men who went to the First World War. These were mistakingly cut down, all that was needed was some of the boughs lopping. Still on trees, the oak tree and pine tree planted in the school ground to celebrate Marlborough's victory. These trees have gone but it would have been fitting that something was put in their place. He could remember the German machine gun that was in the Hall - we know where that is now - in the war museum in Hobart. He spoke of the shops(now gone), of the bread being delivered, also the meat and paper to the door. On "The Flat" there is a cricket pitch and after school and in holidays many a cricket match was played. In winter time it was football, now days if a football is kicked it is on the tennis court - ves we had a tennis court.

This was presented to the people of Cornwall by the Cornwall Coal Company, it would not take a lot of money to re-surface it.

In the day time the ladies would play, babies in their prams and later the kids would play.

He spoke of the Churches pow been removed.

The shopping bus, paid for by E.B.L. Dawson every Wednesday so people could do all their business, banking, dentist and doctor.

Then there was the bonfires on Empire Day. There was usually about 7 fires and they would be lit one after the other.

Of course when talking about Cornwall the topic of the burnt houses always comes up. What a pity because there were some typical miners cottages.

One thing this young man said that is very pleasing - it was good to be back, even weather wise, close for fishing and the friendly people.

Management of Remnant Bush continued from last issue. REGENERATION

How do I regenerate my bit of bush?

- fence the area off, and exclude stock
- give smaller plants a chance by not giving stock uncontrolled access.
- every 6 months or so, take a walk over the area and see if you can find any seedlings growing.
- if there is regeneration, keep stock excluded until the seedlings are at a height which will ensure that the stock are unable to reach up and graze the crown (approximately 1.5 metres, this may take 3-5 years).

If after two or three years no regeneration has occurred then the area may need some assistance from you, for example you could:

- o create a suitable seed bed by either disturbing small areas of soil (light ripping) and/or burning small patches of ground. This practice should be avoided if there are any invasive weeds within dispersal range. Never disturb too large an area of bush as this will leave the ground open to erosion and invasion by weed species.
- ◊ re-seed by hand. Collect your own. seed from nearby or obtain seed which has been collected from your area (for further advice contact Greening Australia, Forestry Tasmania or private Forests Tasmania).
- try to minimise grazing by native and/or feral animals by undertaking a shooting program (permits must be obtained) until such time as the trees are old enough to withstand some grazing pressure.


How do I maintain regenerated/ healthy bush?

Once an area of bush has regenerated and/or the existing bush is in relatively good condition there are various techniques which can be used to help maintain the bush in a healthy condition and to ensure that a diverse range of native species is maintained. For example, fire and grazing can be used to help manage areas of the bush.

#### GRAZING

The controlled grazing of bushland using light stocking rates may assist in the control of weeds, the promotion of species diversity and the reduction of fuel available for fire. When is the best time to allow grazing?

• the best time to graze is generally late autumn through winter

- stocking rates should only ever be light. This will reduce grazing pressure ensuring that some species are not selectively grazed and that areas of ground are not left bare.
- · the duration of grazing in an area should be judged on the amount and health of the vegetation at ground level. Overgrazing will damage small trees and make an area of bush more difficult to manage in the future.

A good rule of thumb is to keep stock out during:

- the spring when smaller plants (eg some grass species, heaths, orchids) are flowering and seeding. This allows for a constant supply of seed for regeneration.
- the summer and periods of drought. Grazing on areas where the plant ground layer has dried out can result in bare ground. Bare ground may be vulnerable to erosion and invasion by species of weed which compete with the existing native plants.

Sensibly controlled grazing has the added benefit of facilitating both: 1) the maintenance of native vegetation and 2) its re-establishment. Native vegetation provides shelter and food for sheep which is particularly valuable during the colder periods of the year. Degraded areas of bush will not fulfill this function as effectively.


