Early in December last year I was lucky to be given the opportunity to work at the St Marys District High School as a cleaner. It was virtually the first time I had been back since the 1970's when I left grade 10 except for an occasional visit for photocopying.

Now after six months back in the school environment I can reflect on those days when Mum and Dad kept telling us that our school days were the best of our lives. If I'd listened then maybe a fair bit more attention would have been put to study. But that's what teenagers were like, and probably still are.

We were fortunate in the formative years in primary school to have Mrs Heather Lodge, Mrs Dulcie Binns, Mrs Yvonne Saunders, Mr Harry Camplin, Mrs Pauline Berwick and Mr Ken Williams. These high had people expectations of us OF rudimentary skills in reading, comprehension, handwriting. bugbear, english and my mathematics. I remember vividly many a lunchtime with Mrs Berwick drumming into me the principles of long division. Many, many "rubbish, rot and twaddles" were uttered to me until she was satisfied I had it right. I hated stopping in then but I reaped the benefits later and eventually quite enjoyed maths except for algebra.

Nowadays Mrs Berwick and I joke about those rows but it was pretty serious at the time. I have a lot to thank her for. Similarly Mr Williams in Grade 6 was tough on most aspects except for homework. He believed in schoolwork at school only. At times I wished that our high school teachers

had a similar philosophy. Unfortunately not. I also remember cuisinare rods, milk at playtime, and the obligatory visit to Dr Lim the school dentist. Oh how we hated the call up on the PA "Mr Williams could you send 10 children to the dentist please?"

Late in grade 6 we spent a day looking over the high school section with future classmates from all over the district including then St Helens. Most of us would become friends over the following years. To us St Marys kids it was strange to be separated into 7A and 7B after being one class right through Primary School. The same applied to the

the rest of the district.

The first few days in High School were a little daunting particularly with much older students all around, coming to terms with different teachers for the various subjects, class periods, and home room. Each morning we

others from

the various subjects, class periods, and home room. Each morning we would head to Home Room. There were four houses consisting of Esk, St Pats, St Pauls and Jubilee and our home rooms were their base. Those four houses were colour coded, Red, Green, Yellow and Blue respectively for sports purposes mainly. Our Esk house was located in today's Block 3. Our home teachers included plaid coated Mr John McCrostie, Mr Brian Forsyth and Mr Jim Larby.

Thursday afternoons were sports days and believe me there was a great deal of pride in beating the pants off the

opposition houses in whatever sport was played. Esk's biggest rival always seemed to be Jubilee for some reason, even if most of us were all mates. Each year's special event was the Athletic Carnival where an almost Olympic feel was evident right down to the parade of teams. It was always a great day. Still on sport, we also looked forward to the Cressy and Campbell Town encounters. All the best equipment was used, proper clothing was expected and impartial umpiring was important. Let's not forget the school social the first night of the visit. That is still done to this

In my time I can only remember four headmasters as they were called then. Mr Hunt, Mr Barnfield, Mr Williams then Mr Stubbs in our final year. All were strict on uniform as was the general rule everywhere. Mr Denzil Williams really served it up to us in our secondary years if we were caught out of uniform.

Boys clothes consisted of grey shirts, grey trousers or shorts, grey socks, green jumper (V neck), green and lemon tie and black shoes. The girls wore lemon and green striped summer dresses, dark green tartan check winter pinafores, green jumpers, long white socks and black or brown shoes. Sandshoes for all were not allowed and Mr Williams only let us remove our ties on very warm days. In grade 10 we didn't then have work experience but a two day trip to Launceston for careers indoctrination where we about eight different visited workplaces. 



CHEAP EASY RECIPE

SAVOURY CHICKEN RICE

PLANTING TREES

MOVING ESTABLISHED TREES

The best time to move trees that have been planted in the wrong position is just after winter when the soil is beginning to warm up. It may be necessary to move a tree because it has outgrown its present site or because it may look and grow better elsewhere.

Where the specimen is large or is of a species that is difficult to transplant, it is better to "wrench" it first. This is a simple operation consisting of cutting round the tree with a sharp spade. The purpose of this operation is to encourage fibrous roots, enabling the moving to be done in about six weeks time with as little check as possible. With small specimens, or where it is decided to risk the move without wrenching first, it is essential to transfer as much of this fibrous root system as possible.

Always prepare the hole at the new site before moving the tree, make sure that the hole is somewhat larger than the root ball of the tree. It is a good idea to have some peat or rooted leaf-mould available to mix with the soil when filling in. This helps to ensure a good start.

TREES THAT WEEP

When weeping trees are mentioned most people think of weeping willows. They are a good example, but there are others more suitable for the home garden. Weeping flowering cherries, weeping birches, weeping elms, weeping and horizontal golden ash are the most popular.

They are all budded or grafted on high stems so that the top is well above the ground, and the branches droop. This makes them ideal lawn specimens, as the clean trunk does not interfere with mowing and lawn maintenance.

These special trees are naturally much more expensive as the stock must be grown to the required height first and then the buds, or grafts, inserted and then grown on again for a year or two before being ready for sale. They are, however, well worth the price if you want certain special effects.

When planting these long-stemmed trees, be sure to stake and tie them well to prevent any movement until they are well established.







DID YOU KNOW?

In most countries in Europe when buying everyday consumer goods like fridges, freezers, tyres, car batteries etc. an environmental surcharge is imposed.

When the items are no longer useful the owner must take them to a recycle depot where CFC gases from fridges and freezers and battery acid is removed and all other material sorted for recycling.

The environmental surcharge is then refunded

To some extent rubbish is still dumped, but fines for litterbugs are in a range to make these idiots think twice next time round





term there were twelve students complete with gear accompanied by a rather large teacher touring all over the Fingal Valley streams in a 1946 Oldsmobile Hearse. You see Mr Summers collected and restored old vehicles one of which was that black machine. Let me tell you there were some strange looks as we passed by. Mr Summers reckoned we were all brain Some years later Mr dead anyway. Summers was nearly killed in a car accident and spent a long time recovering. I believe he now lives at St Helens.

Some other teachers included Mr Charles Halmkin who taught Technical Drawing and Drafting, Mr Johnson for Maths and English, Mr Hoare for Woodwork and Metalwork, Mr Meyer in Science, Beverley Mitchell (now Rubenach) as a science aide and Mr Muggeridge, although I can't recall what he taught. There were other teachers that I've forgotten at the moment but as the years slip by so does the memory.

One other person I cannot forget was, the long serving groundsman, Mr Peter Pilgrim. He was a wonderful and valued member of the staff and never missed a trick

In closing I will recall two parts of the old school that have advanced

enormously from the seventies. Firstly the swimming pool. When we were there it was affectionately known as "the ditch" because for weeks at a time it was unusable due to a green algae build-up but at its best it would never come near it's successor. The new one, thanks mainly to the hardworking Organising Committee, is a brilliant facility that all should be proud of. Every morning at around 10 am, I join the other cleaners for a cuppa in what was originally the library, now the staff room. The new library is fantastic and has quickly reestablished the facilities after the terrible fire some years back.

Again it is a quantum leap on ours but the old rounded end one had a bit of character.

New altogether from our time is the computer room. This wasn't even part of the curriculum then and even a calculator was taboo except for teachers demonstration purposes but I suppose you never miss what you never had.

I haven't even touched on a myriad of characters in the student body of that era but maybe that's for later.

It was then, and still is, a marvellous school and I was very privilleged to attend there all my school years and Mum and Dad were right when they said your school years are the best. They really are.

got off the bus. I'll never forget the response our girls got from the Brooks students when they saw the long white socks. They were just amazed for some reason and comments came thick and fast as bags were unpacked.

That evening we enjoyed tea at the Charcoal Grill restaurant then on to Cinema One to see the Towering Inferno. I think I neglected to mention the importance stressed of the Prefects to wear the maroon school blazer particularly when representing the school away. They all honoured the tradition.

Now some memories of our High School teachers spring to mind. Generally speaking they were perhaps a little older then to what they are now but still managed to keep us in touch.

Social Studies was taught to us mainly by Mr Mallinson and Mr Cossins. The latter was nicknamed "Parrot Phil" due to the predominent bendy proboscus he had. He was a good bloke and a fine teacher as was his wife who I think taught Maths and English.

Science was a favourite subject with most, even though we gave our teacher David Hamilton a scare or two with bunsen burners and acid mixes and the like. In Grade 7 he made a special effort to introduce us to astronomy by setting up the school telescopes at night so anybody interested could check out the heavens after dark in the quadrangle. He gave up his own evenings to supervise.

The sports store as it was called then was located in a little room under block 3 currently now just a storeroom. Mr "Bloodnut" Dobson, so named because of his thick mane of red hair and temper to match, was our initial physical education teacher later followed by Mr Oosterloo.

These days the school has a fully equipped gymnasium which is a great asset. It beats the heck out of what we had and I hope future students will never take it for granted.

Back in those years only one foreign language was taught which was French. It was compulsory until the end of grade nine. Everyone from that era will remember Mr Lynch. Once again he incurred a nickname that came into being from his rather rotund stature. He was known to us kids as "Yum, Yum". At times he would recount his years living in Paris but mostly French classes were hard to cope with. One test day in Grade 9, two of us arrived back late to double French after getting drenched in a Mr Lynch was sudden storm. unimpressed to say the least and made us sit at the back of the class. I scored 11% and Steven not much better, needless to say that we gave French a wide berth the next year.

Mrs Lynch, wife to our French

teacher, was our excellent Art teacher who loved to let us experiment with pottery, sketching and my favourite, enamelling. She became very popular

One of our English teachers was the slightly casually dressed, Jim Larby. A big jumper, corduroy trousers and a pair of thongs to go with his shoulder length hair, was a little away from the suit and tie brigade but he really was a Ian "Hendo" fantastic teacher. Henderson also would be well remembered as a good English teacher. I missed out on Sally "Snortin" Norton so I can't comment of her prowess suffice to say she lived up to her nick name pretty well. Mr Brian Forsyth and Mrs Margaret Forsyth also drummed in the knowledge through some very wooden skills at times usually managing to get the message

Mrs Mary Targett had the awesome task of teaching us typing. mandatory piece of foolscap over the keys of the Olivetti machines so we could learn the base key technique was important and a key chart was essential. Mrs Targett kept a close eye on us for cheating and very few managed to get away with it.

The famous Ian Summers took us for Friday Activities class. One of these activities was trout fishing. For one full

LANDCARE NEWS

June 5 is World Environment Day and

so it is timely for us to be thinking about our roles and responsibilities in relation to the environment. We all have roles and responsibilities whether as individuals, the community, industry or government and these roles and responsibilities are determined through a combination of legislation, government policy and informal and voluntary arrangements.

So where does landcare come into this? Landcare is about people working together to ensure that the use and management of land and water resources is sustainable both ecologically, economically and socially.

It is about recognising that our natural resources are a complex system of interactive elements on which we all depend for our continued well being and that sustainable land management is about planning, whether at a property, local catchment, regional or state level.

The term 'landcare' came from a group of farmers in Victoria during the 1970's who tackled local land degradation and management problems through an integrated approach.

In 1989 the National Farmers Federation and the Australian Conservation Foundation presented a joint submission to the Federal Government with the objective of moving towards sustainable land use.

This resulted in the decade of 1991-2000 being declared the Decade of Landcare with the preparation of State, Territory and Commonwealth Decade of Landcare Plans to show the mechanisms by which the objectives could be achieved.

Landcare is about how everyone can help their environment.

Everyone individuals, community, industry and

government taking local action to solve

local problems.

Land soil, water, plants and animals and the

complex relationship that exists

between them.

Integrated considering the ecological, economic,

and social aspects of land management

and use.

Sustainable long term protection of the land

resource while meeting our physical,

Landcare has now been accepted as the primary strategy to control and prevent land degradation on all land in Australia. Landcare is becoming an essential part of our lives with everyone becoming involved.




