EDITORIAL

THE AVOCA SHOOT

The Avoca annual wallaby shoot is once again over but discussion about the event still lingers on. This is especially so on the mainland where the repercussions are taking longer to fade away.

If nothing else, this shoot has each year brought quite a deal of fame, or more to the point notoriety, to this otherwise sleepy Fingal Valley town and especially to the Avoca Football Club who runs it.


This notoriety has even reached Federal Parliament where one of the members has called upon Tasmanian Senator Reg Wright' to organise a party to shoot Avoca football players. Senator Wright very appropriately ignored his fellow member. And in Melbourne one writer in a letter to "The Age" saw the shoot as 'a beginning of the end for all the wallaby in Tasmania'. A Sydney newspaper commented that the shoot was 'a sadistic and organised mayher of our native life.'

But what was most significant about this adverse and almost hysterical condemnation was the general lack of factual material used. What most of them neglected to mention was the very simple fact that the Tasmanian Animal and Birds Protection Board condoned the shoot as a necessary culling programme of the wallaby in that area. Neither did anyone mention the R.S.P.C.A. were in attendance also and raised no objection.

Cruelty, inhumanity, sadistic, indiscriminate, were the four words used most frequently by these critics and it seems hard to imagine that these two bodies would stand by if in fact the words were appropriate to the shoot. Especially as in the past the Tasmanian Protection Board has been considered by many to be the most enlightened body of its kind in Australia.

The truth is, one suspects, simply that these critics of the shoot don't know the first thing about it, and often do far more harm than good for the cause of conservation. These "Bleeding Hearts", a term coined by the late Mona sh Zoology professor (Jock Marshall), should perhaps consider the alternatives to an organised shoot, i.e. 1080 poisoning, some similar disease to rabbit myxamatosis or the slow starvation of the species from excess numbers.

Are these methods more humane?

LOOK, NO RAILS

JAPAN, the country of modern railways, plans to construct an ultra-highspeed train system which would whisk passengers between Tokyo and Osaka in about an hour. Using a linear motor, the train will have a maximum speed of more than 250 miles an hour. The present new Tokaido line super-express train covers the 345 miles between Tokyo and Osaka in three hours and 10 minutes at a maximum speed of 155 miles an hour.

Using the linear motor system, the trains will run along tracks receiving successive increments of energy through a series of electrodes placed at intervals along the rails. The trains will have no wheels and will actually fly along the tracks at a height of about a foot. Railways engineers have been experimenting with the new system for about a year. have found it possible to float their trains in the air and consider it likely that top speeds of 310 miles an hour will be achieved.

Engineers of the Japan National Railways have conducted the first test runs of the prototype and a project team will be organised soon to study the safety and riding comfort. Construction costs have not yet been estimated in any detail, but basic designs already are scheduled to be completed during the next three years. Operational tests probably will be made before the end of 1975, and senior officials of the JNR believe Japanese passengers will be using the new super-trains by the beginning of the next decade.

> FOR THE BUSH BANQUET

Roast Porcupine.

When porcupine is treated as follows, it makes a delicious and appetising dish: Skin, and wash well in warm salted water. Stuff with a rich forcement and then roast. For the forcemeat, take 2oz. of finelyminced ham and 4 oz. of suet, 4 oz of breadcrumbs, 1 teaspoon of parsley, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of mixed herbs, the grated rind of half a lemon, a good pinch of nutmeg, mace, not intentionally, nor maliciously, persalt and pepper, and I well beaten egg added to a little milk. Mix well. Stuff into the porcupine, sew up, and roast with slices of bacon across it.

Kangaroo Tail Soup Take one kangaroo tail, 2 quarts of stock, 1 glass of port wine, 2 onions, 2 carrots, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of flour, pepper and salt, 6 cloves, 6 peppercorns, parsley and thyme, a small piece of ginger, I teaspoon of brown sugar, stop preaching the glorious truths of the and one lemon. Chop the tail into small pieces, boil it in a small quantity of water for 2 hours, then strain. Add the stock to the liquor, then the vegetables (finely cut up) and the other ingredients, the spices being tied in a muslin bag. When the vegetables are cooked, thicken the soup with a little flour.


Roast Bandicoot

Kill in the same way as you would a pig; then scald and pluck the hair off just as you would pull the feathers from a fowl. Clean and put in strong salted water for 2 hours. Wipe dry and stuff with breadcrumbs onions and seasoning. Sew up and roast in the oven. Do not have the oven too hot, or the skin will crack. A few slices of fat bacon laid across is an improvement. Bandicoot is delicious when cooked this way.

WILL TRADE.

Some concern is being felt by the motoring public because of a number of vehicular accidents during recent week ends, and it may be as well to again bring to the notice of readers the seriousness with which the Government views such occurrences, particularly where they are the result of, or are contributed to by, the consumption of intoxicating liquor by those involved.

Amendments to the Traffic Act provide for penalties of up to \$500 for persons convicted of driving under the influence of liquor, as well as lengthy periods of disqualification from driving.

Fortunately, offenders in this category are a small minority, but it were better that they realise by their foolish actions that they attract attention to their particular district, and will before long find that they, and all other drivers, will become the subject of close scrutiny, and consequent attention by the operators of modern mechanical aids such as breathalyser units, amphometers, and radio equipped vehicles.

The Government has been reluctant to introduce random breath testing, but the appalling road toll over past months could well be the turning point for the introduction of such a measure, to the inconvenience and embarrassment of many otherwise law-abiding persons.

The recent amendments give wide powers for blood testing of drivers, and there is every indication that this aspect will be more often used, particularly with drivers involved in accidents.

It would be well therefore that all drivers who intend imbibing should firstly give serious thought to the consequences, should they over imbibe. Not only may they suffer serious or fatal injury, but the damage they cause, and heavy penalties they may incur, could be to their disadvantage for a lengthy period, even the rest of their life.

The authorities have no desire to prevent the public from their enjoyment of life and what it offers in these days of prosperity, but it does expect that all citizens, and more particularly road users, accept their responsibility to their fellows, by moderation in all things.

- Always treat quickly and carefully.
- Send for a Doctor if a serious burn.
- DO NOT apply ointment, oils, butter, egg-white, baking soda, or cornflour to the burnt area, as this only makes it harder to treat when seen by a Doctor.


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
