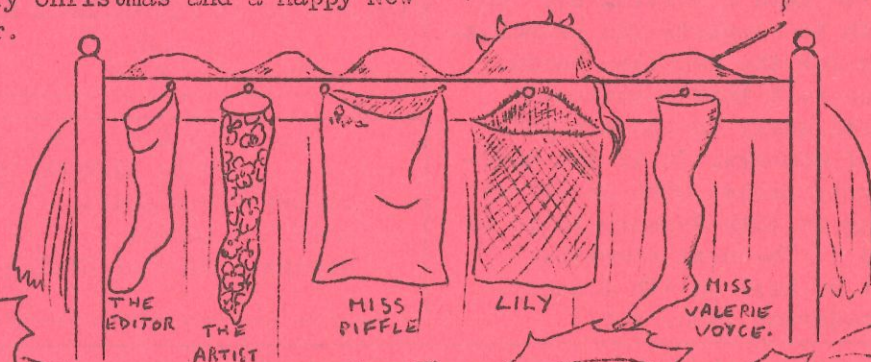

# HERITAGE CORNER

## CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

HOLLY was in token of the Crown of Thorns placed on Christ's head at the Crucifixion, the red berries being symbolic of His blood. But long before Christianity there was a tradition of bring evergreens into the house in winter. The gods and goddesses were believed to take refuge in evergreens in the cold weather, when all the leaves had left the other trees, and to bring them into the house was kind to them and of course brought good luck to the household.

MISTLETOE was held sacred by the Druids the priests of a very old religion which was widespread in the British Isles. But it has its own story that explains why it must always hang in the centre of a room and never against a wall. This story comes from Norse Mythology. Baldur, a very handsome, young and very popular god, woke one morning after a very bad dream. Even when he woke up he was not free of it and felt a very heavy pain on his heart. He went to his mother, Frigga, the Queen of the gods and told her about it. She was greatly distressed, for she knew it meant that Baldur would be badly hurt by something, but she found a way of avoiding this. She called everything to her... metal, stones, lightening, fire, water, anything that could possibly harm her son and made them promise not to hurt him. Then she and Baldur ceased to worry. The other gods invented a new game, hurling stones, spears, sticks and everything they could find at Baldur and shouting with glee as all the weapons swerved to avoid him. But an evil god, Loki who was jealous of Baldur, went to Frigga disguised as an old woman and asked if everything there had promised to spare her son. Frigga said that everything had promised except



for little plant which grew on an old oak tree and she had not asked it as it was too small to do any harm. Loki went and cut off a sprig of mistletoe. Then going to where the young gods were playing, he spied Baldur's twin brother wistfully standing to one side, unable to join in because was blind. Loki asked if he would not like to throw something too, and he told him he had a little stick and would guide his aim. The young god agreed and took the mistletoe shot through the air and struck Baldur and killed him. And today, although the story maybe forgotten the evil that may lurk in the mistletoe is not forgotten and must be hung in the middle of the room where it is not harmful.

SANTA CLAUS is a corruption of Saint Nicholas, a good and kind saint, who is the patron saint of children, sailors, merchants and bakers. He is reported to have helped many people and one legend is that three girls could not get married as they were too poor to have dowries; he threw purses of gold through their windows. This may account for the belief that he comes down chimneys. But this tradition does not hold good in Germany and Scandinavia. There his feast is the celebration held on the 6th December, when he comes armed with a list of children who have been good or naughty. The good ones are given sweets and nuts and the bad ones are whipped.

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
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#### SPEECH NIGHT - ST. MARYS DISTRICT SCHOOL

On Friday last, the Headmaster, Mr. Denzil Williams gave his summing up of the year. Mr. Williams told the audience he was extremely pleased with his school ... Its physical environment is excellent, he said, both the surroundings and in the buildings and for the first time in his teaching career, he was in a school that has adequate class rooms. This reflected the government's attitude of increased spending for schools.

He congratulated local residents on their generosity and the Parents and Friends for their efforts in purchasing the new swimming pool. This pool cost \$3,200 and its acquisition is a triumph to those responsible; the work has been done without any real assistance from the Education Department.

Mr. Williams also thanked the ladies who gave their time in running the canteen.

On the subject of staff he expressed confidence for the future. The strength of any school is entirely due to the strength of its staff. We are a good school and a strong school because our staff is very keen and they work well together. This is also evident in the attitude of the children; the school being small and compact, each child gets individual attention. Mr. Williams said, it is too often the case in larger schools that it is only the very good and the very bad who get the attention. In the coming year it is hoped to expand this attention with the addition of a music teacher and a physical education teacher.

Mr. Williams reiterated the remarks of previous headmasters when he outlined the need for a school hostel. If we are going to bring in children from farther afield we will need a hostel, he said. Sports activities for the year had also been very successful, as had a conference attended by some of the senior pupils and activities had been enjoyed by the children. "I've got a stitch," Suzy said, clutching her side, "Let's slow down."

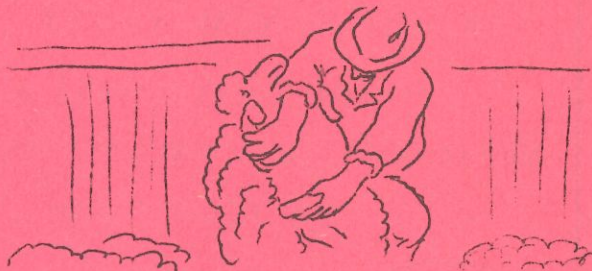
Bill who was still holding Joey in an iron grip, said, "We seem to be well hidden in the crowd now anyway. I wonder where the shearing pavilion is?"
