St. Marys District Progress Association has won \$100 in the Cosgrove Parks Award for 1970-71. A very pleasing financial bonus.

All such prizes and Government donations are a great stimulus to any volunteer body which sets out to beautify its town and district.

Unfortunately such money is often too little and too late. Recently Scamander Progress Association received several hundred dollars for one of its projects but it had to battle for years to get it. St. Marys Progress Association has also spent a considerable amount of its time and energy acquiring adequate money from the Government. Swansea, another go ahead town, has many times in the past been restricted in its tourist projects by the lack of Government support.

The present Government has demonstrated its interest in the tourist industry by a continuing policy of up-grading the industry but if it is going to stint its spending when others are willing to do the work in a voluntary capacity, its proclaimation of encouraging all bodies in the State to work for a common cause, begin to ring hollow.


Surely if a voluntary project is approved by the required authority then the Government should step in and back it to the hilt financially.

The present \$ for \$ for such projects is miserly enough without voluntary bodies have to fight tooth andnail to get it as well.

These people want to get on with the job of beautifying their towns and districts and not spend their time and energy writing begging letters to the Government for financial aid.

Under such conditions it is no wonder that so many progress associations in the State exist in name only.

WOODCHIPS START NEXT SPRING

The Director of Northern Woodchips, Mr. Alan Rice has told a representative of this paper that woodchip activities will begin in the Fingal Valley and a section of the East Coast next spring.

The first shipment of chipping timber will leave St. Marys next December.

Mr. Rice also indicated that it was likely the timber would be transported by rail to Launceston then off loaded for the short road haul to the chipping plant near Longreach.

In St. Marys district alone nearly 400,000 tons of standing timber had already been signed up or was being negotiated.

Mr. Rice said he was somewhat overwhelmed at the amount of timber available in the Fingal Valley region.

On the prospect of a local satellite chipper to be installed, Mr. Rice said, if and when it was financially warranted this would be done. At the moment it hinges on the Bell Bay rail link and if this line is put through then it was almost certain a chipper would be installed at either St. Marys or Fingal or somewhere in between.

Mr. W. Meadows, Tamar Region manager for A.P.P.M., has also indicated that his company intends to cart timber from these aistricts next year; July at the latest.


