EDITORIAL

Oh Those Conservative Young

Recently New South Wales decided to reduce the voting age to 18: but before anybody makes the mistake of thinking this will give the vote to nearly a quarter of a million young revolutionaries, lets take a look at some figures released by the Bureau of Census and Statistics.

Contrary to outward signs, a majority of the young support Australia's commitment in Vietnam. Generally they are less ecumenical than their elders but keener on Aboriginal Welfare and the compulsory wearing of seat belts.


In terms of party allegiance they tend towards the Liberals and curiously enough, the one group that is especially hostile to the A.L.P. is the 14 to 17 age group where only 37 percent supported the ideals of the A.L.P. (The only other age group to come anywhere near that figure was the over 70 group.)

So it seems, that by giving the vote to the young we will, rather than create a new radical society, most likely become a little more conservative.

THE HUNTER LIVER VALLEY RESEARCH FOUNDATION has now made known its findings and as expected these findings have been met with a certain amount of reservations from many sectors of the community. Some of the critics say the document is rather ordinary and something that could have been gathered by any State Department at less expense.

Maybe so, but as no one has done it this report will have to be accepted as a valid estimate of the financial and social discrepencies of this State. One important statement to come out of the report is the one implying that in the past Tasmania has not been discriminatory enough in encouraging industries into the State which would most benefit and make the most use of Tasmania's natural assets.

One good example of this must be the recent installation of Thermal Power at Bell Bay which is to be fired by imported oil.



Also closely related is the recommendation of the Foundation for a Tasmanian Nuclear Power Station to offset any further threat of drought.

But why not extra Thermal power stations as a less expensive alternative. Or at least a full enquiry into the Fingal Valley coal to see if it is a feasible alternative.




