## EDITOR

We have been requested to publish the following article on a very important subject by the Hobart Head Teachers' Association. The article was prepared by E.T. Smith B.Sc., Acting Superintendent of High Schools (Science).

At first our world was completely inorganic with no living matter. About two or three thousand million years ago a new process, that of life itself, began to appear and superimpose itself on the inorganic world. An extraordinarily complex and diverse system of living arganisms evolved which changed the earth's surface tremendously. Then, about two million years ago there began the processes of human culture which in the extent and power of its technology, especially, threatens a change of our earth's surface even greater than the original processes of life itself and certainly most threatening to the life of man and the other animals.

The threat is real and terrifying according to Dr. Stephen Boyden of the Australian University.

The threat lies partly in the extraordinary recent growth in world population which in itself just cannot continue at its present spiralling rate without dire consequences. But the threat lies more in the behaviour of man himself. His ever-thrusting technology is rapidly making impossible demands upon the available natural resources, energy supply and living space of this earth. This belief in increased production, expansion, growth, industrial progress and such are deeply ingrained in our nature and our behaviour. Speaker after speaker at the Canberra conference stressed the urgency of a change in such belief. As Prime Minister Trudeau of Canada has reminded us Governments must change their emphasis on and concern for such traditional matters and direct their efforts towards "the maximising of human dig ity, human welfare, environmental quality and minimising violence in human behaviour". Political parties, as pointed out by our Minister for the Army, Mr. Peacock, must review the validity of a private enterprise system if it disregards the effects of a rapidly





expand g technology on the quality of life.

As Dr. Stephen Boyden exclaims "Bigger and better means extinction!" He and many others are convinced that nothing short of a great wave of new thinking must rapidly spread through all sections of our community, if we are to survive.

What has brought us to a seemingly sudden realisation of our danger? Perhaps the atomic bomb? Or DDT residues in Antarctic molluscs.

Today, we are using up in urban development approximately 780 sq. miles of our countryside each day. In eleven or twelve years this engulfs an area equal to the Australian continent!! There are more people living in America today than have ever died in that country - and already the graveyards of that country cover an area equal to the state of Connecticut. Fingal Municipal Council Fiasco FROM THE DAILY TELEGRAPH 1902 (approx)

Fingal, a prettily situated rural town on the North-Eastern line some distance from Launceston has just had its sensation,\_ though it is of no very startling charac-

There is, however, presented the unusual position that this prosperous little municipality is at the moment without a council to control and guide its destiny. All the trouble arouse out of the refusal of the ratepayers at a poll taken to sanction the borrowing by the council of £100 for the purchase of an up-to-date road-making plant, which is deemed to be an absolute necessity if the municipality is to benefit to any extent from the considerable sums of money, both state and Federal, flying round for the purposes of road construction and maintenance. When councillors assembled at the last periodical meeting, they were seething with indignation at what they considered to be a gratuitous insult by the ratepayers. They regarded the result of the poll as an expression of lack of confidence in the council and asserted that the ratepayers had been misled by statements that us. But we watch him closely. And isn't the proposed loan would involve an increa se of 2/- in the £ in the rates. The State Attorney General (Mr. G.G. Becker) That is why the Christian must be as good is a member of the council, andis largely interested, of course, as a member of the Government in the roads scheme the effective carrying out of which is considered to be dependent upon the use of modern

Mr. Becker's name is amongst those of the eight councillors who have resigned "with a view to giving the ratepayers the opportunity of electing a council with obsolete ideas of roadmaking and maintenance." The warden (Mr. J.E. McKenzie) is another of the number, and although two others were absent from the meeting, it is stated that they, too will adopt a similar course. Councillor Fred Williams is the only member opposed to the purchase of the plant, and he remains in all his splendid isolation as the one municipal administrator still in office.

It is expected that the Government will shortly take steps to remedy a position which, of course, cannot be long allowed to remain.

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#### IN THE EYE OF THE LAW

It is observed that there are quite a number of dogs at large again, and this could be an opportune occasion on which to bring to the notice of dog owners the importance of keeping their animals under proper control.

The lambing season has commenced and all dog owners should make themselves aware of the provisions of the law with regard to dogs found straying on property where sheep and lambs are kept.

The law provides for severe monetary penalties against offenders convicted of allowing dogs to stray, while the probability of a civil action . \* always present when a dog is known to attack

It is common knowledge among property owners that even the most trustworthy sheep dog has been known to attack and injure or kill sheep, particularly young lambs, and in a matter of a few hours a dog or dogs may cause havoc, to the extent of causing the dog owner serious hardship should he be compelled to pay the cost of such damage.

We therefore urge all dog owners to make a determined effort to maintain control of their dogs, and by so doing they could well prevent an unfortunate situation for themselves, and reduce the possibilities of prosecution.

The law requires that a dog should not be at large at any time unless under proper control, and an improvement in this respect would be appreciated by the community in general.

devoid of fish life! Many miles of streams are aquatic deserts; and Tasmania is naively participating in such destruction as witness some miles of the South Esk River below Avoca; the Queen River below Queenstown; the Ringarooma from Derby to t e sea; the Pieman below the Savage; the Blythe at its entrance to the sea; and heavens knows what is happening to the Tamar and the Derwent.

But it seems that quite subtle and unseen, and maybe as yet unsuspected, developments are at work. By their very nature these could be the most catastrophic to the eco-system of which man is a part. One wonders of course about the final effects of radiation drop-out, increasing carbon-dioxide in the atmosphere, the decrease of oxygen in air and water; the rapid reduction of our forest lands; the effect of pesticides in evolutionary trends; super rats etcetera.

We are warned that increasing technological know-how is  $\underline{\text{not}}$  the answer to  $\bullet$ ur problem. Education we are told holds most hope for some alleviation of the threat. Educationists are already producing materials and devising courses in an attach on the problem. It seems we m must hurry for the pessimists tell us we may already be too late!

In education we must start with the young, Dr. Earle Hackett of the Institute of Medical and Veterinary Science, Adelaide, insists. Others at the conference agreed and great stress is laid upon the need for actual encounter with nature and with problems of the environment. The Australian Academy of Science is taking immediate steps to organise a concerted approach throughout Australia. Our first step in Tasmania is to make sufficient people aware of the threats to our quality of life and maybe to life itself and to encourage rational and properly devised programmes that will make all Tasmanians aware of man's effect upon the environment.


