EDITORIAL

The MORITORIUM - TOO MANY STIRRERS?

On the 18th of September the second Moritorium March is to be held throughout the country. If there is increased enthusiasm for the march, Moritorium organisers can consider their efforts a justifiable success, as their main aim has been to change public opinion about Australia's involvement in South East Asia.


But it seems unlikely this situation will occur. Indications are that past enthusiasm has been difficult to maintain. If this is the case, on the 18th then, the adherents of the Moritorium will have to admit their philosophies are still not in accord with the majority.

All along, these people have been skating on very thin ice. No doubt the bulk of supporters for the Moritorium have a genuine concern about the issue, that is, humane rather than political, but a few militants have, by words and deeds, shown more doubtful motives. Ironically, it is perhaps the stirrers who have caused the observed lessening in enthusiasm; for it is in their stupid and unsubtle efforts of purporting to support such groups as the Liberation Front and the Viet Cong that has had an opposite effect to the one the Moritorium sought to achieve. It has hardened general opinion against the Moritorium Committee.

Had the organisers of the Moritorium gone less for direct demands of immediate troop withdrawal and non-comittment (which incidentally, is not a legitimate demand if it is not yet a majority demand) and more for a call of a Federal referendum on the issue, it may have worked better.

The fact they did not call for a referendum couldperhaps, be interpreted as being a lack of confidence that the majority of Australians were with them.

Excerpt from the Newspaper 1905 to 1945. Does this still hold today?

SOME UNUSUAL RECIPES

Hang All Night Pudding: - 3½ cups flour, 2 ditto brown sugar, 2 pieces candied peel, 3 teaspoons carb.soda, packet mixed spice, 1 cup raisins, 3 tablespoons dripping. Mix with boiling water. Tie in cloth and hang all night, then boil for three hours.

Some Unusual Recipes cont.

Beetroot Leaves: Choose only the youngest leaves, wash thoroughly, and boil carefully in skimmed stock to which a little lemon juice has been added. Thicken some of the stock with a little flour with a little flour and the yold of an egg, and pour over the leaves after they have been dished up.

Beetroot Pickle: Use thick slices of cooked beetroot and an unsweetened batter. The best batter is made from the following ingredients: To each egg, allow ½1b of self raising flour, and add a little milk and pepper and salt to taste. The beetroot slices should have a fairly thick coating of batter and be cooked in deep boiling fat.

Another way to pickle beetroot, quite easily, is to obtain equal parts of cold cooked beetroot and raw onion. Slice both fairly thinly, and place in layers in a jar. Cover with vinegar, and allow to stand for three or four days, when it is ready for use.

ANTI POLLUTION EXHAUSTS

CO-OPERATIVE

An inexpensive manganese-dioxide catalyst developed by Mitsui Mining and Smelting Co. of Tokyo is said to remove virtually all poisonous substances from automobile exhaust gases. Mitsui claims that the new catalyst converts carbon monoxide to harmless carbon dioxide, absorbs all the lead content in fuel and reduces hydrocarbons to water and carbon. The catalyst can be produced at a cost of about \$330 a ton and is a more effective antipollutant than platinum, the material heretofore most commonly used to decompose the harmful substances in exhaust gases. Japan's Ministry of International Trade and Industry will subsidize Mitsui Mining and Smelting's development of a carmounted filter containing the new catalyst, and the firm hopes to have the filters ready to install on cars before the end of the year.
