Education outside the classroom

A GROUP OF FORTY STUDENTS from St Marys District High School accompanied by Phil Walker, Umesh Pratap, Uma Pratap and Susan Miles left on 30 August on our first bus to Devonport. The students were amazed at the size of the Spirit of Tasmania. The overnight trip to Melbourne was enjoyed by all, except the teachers who ended up supervising students from another High school as well as ours! The food was superb especially the seafood. We were met by our coach drivers and headed straight to the Melbourne Market. Only had 45 minutes to shop and most students managed to find something to buy in this time.

We set off on the first of our big bus trips, 22 hours to a beach near Coolangatta. We jumped off the bus and quickly set up our 3 man tents so we could head off to Seaworld. The students immediately dispersed to the rides while we watched the Water-skiing show. Highlights were the Corkscrew, the Viking ride, Bermuda Triangle, the Pirate Ship, the Dolphin Show and the Monorail. Dinner was cooked by the coach drivers and the

evening was spent at the pictures - a choice of Conair, Austin Powers or Face Off. A stroll from the Coolangatta Theatre back to the Caravan Park. Breakfast at McDonalds then to Movieworld. Highlights were Matthew Newell in the Police Academy Show, Loony Tune ride, Batman ride and the Gremlim ride and of course the Lethal Weapon. Shopping at Pacific Fair shopping centre. Not

Dinner then more shopping in Surfers. Mr Pratap took several students to the doctor, Mr Walker steamed on ahead with 3/4's of the students and Mrs Pratap and Mrs

Everyone appreciated sleeping in a real bed for the first time in four nights!

Miles were left with the "stragglers".

Packed up camp (some students 'slept in' and little time to disassemble their tent and also make themselves look beautiful!), MacDonalds brekkie then went straight to Dreamworld. This was voted the best theme park amongst the students for the "most excellent rides". Highlights: the staff and students on the Tower of Terror, Wipe Out, the Mine Ride, the Log Ride (some people ended up very wet including Mrs Miles,) Helicopter rides for some students and again the bus waited for Jacob Hyland. Left late afternoon for an overnight trip to Canberra. By now everyone was sleeping much better on the bus with all the "mod cons" like sleeping bags and pillows. Viewed more choice videos selected by Mr Walker! Canberra was the educational aspect of the trip. We visited the Mt Ainslie Lookout, Parliament House and Questron. Our guide at Parliament House commented on the exceptional behaviour of our students and said we were the best school she had had all year! The students debated a "mock" bill on "people from the age of 16 should be able to vote". This starred Sally Lehner, Timmy Hall, Luke Freeman, Josh Brinkhuizen and Jarrod Bean. Senator John Watson came to meet our students and donated a book on Parliament House for our school library. Highlights included: Mr Walker counting 40 students on the coach and actually leaving Jarrod Bean behind momentarily in the city centre. We arrived in Devonport on Saturday 6 September and were very pleased to see Kerry Franklin and his luxurious coach. The students were very pleased to see it was still raining in St Marys while we had enjoyed some glorious sunshine in Queensland. Everyone had at least a week's worth of sleep to catch up on.

Although this trip was great fun and very enjoyable, it showed that education is much wider than in the class-room itself. The students were faced with new experiences, choices, and given the opportunity to develop their social and management skills (time and finances). For rural students in particular, it is important to see the ":outside: world. The cost of the trip was \$352 per person with a subsidy of \$85 per student from the Federal Government. On the whole, we were very proud of our students behaviour, cooperation and presentation.


MATHINNA CHURCH CENTENARY

About fifty to sixty people attended the Centenary Mass celebrated by Father Paul Connolly, Parish Priest of St Marys District. The service was followed by a barbecue lunch in the grounds of the old church.

The parish wishes to acknowledge the help given by the Mathinna community, especially Max Ellis, Gordon and Gary Lowe, Mr and Mrs Wayne Bishop, and Mrs June Hall Fingal, who played for the hymns at the ceremony, on the original organ in the church.

Thanks also to Henry and Pauline Biggelaar of Scamander and Aub Oliver of Fingal who assisted with the arrangements.

Church history. The Church of St Scholastica and St Roch, Mathinna, was built by Father Martial Mary, who at the end of 1878 had begun a twentyfour year apostolate to the isolated North

East and East coast of Tasmania.

Archbishop Delaney laid the foundation stone on February 14th 1897 and it was officially opened on 12th September 1897.

In November of the same year, Father Mary began sixteen years of outstanding pastoral service in the St Marys and Georges Bay district. The roving missionary visited isolated settlements as far afield as Derby, Lottah, Pioneer, Branxholm, Gladstone, Ringarooma, Boobyalla, Mathinna, Mangana, Fingal and Cullenswood.

The legendary pioneer still continued to minister to the North East when his base moved to Campbell Town in 1894.

In 1905 the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart sisters, escorted by Archbishop Delaney, arrived by train from Hobart to Fingal and then went by coach with the Parish Priest, Father Gressian MSH, the last seventeen miles to Mathinna, to Maher's Hotel.

The next day they moved into a four bedroomed cottage which had been built by the Catholic community of Mathinna, as a memorial to Father Henri Chetail MSH.

Mathinna's Catholic school did not survive long. After three years of steady progress the owner of the Golden Gate Mine died and the field began to fail. Many of the miners left for more steady work in other parts of Tasmania. The nuns stayed on valiantly for a few more years.

In 1975 the Mathinna church was closed but reopened again in 1979 for services, but only on the fifth Sunday of the month.

Two Mathinna families gave to the Sisters of St Joseph, Dorothy Burt who became Sister Chanel and Lucy Jarvis who became Sister Justin.





Perhaps this piece will get me into a little trouble but that's too bad.

There is a real need for not just 40 or 50% of the immediate population of the Fingal Valley to make a big push for our hospital retention. That figure has to rise to near total 100% in the next few weeks.

The simple fact is that a financial plan and blueprint has to be put together by the Hospital Support Association that then has to be presented to the Minister and the Health Depart-

ment by the end of November.

This financial plan with the ultimate provision being acute, respite, hostel and aged care within a few years

for our citizens depends wholly on the outright support by the vast majority of the community. I have hardly met anyone at all POWER

who want to see an inferior and potentially risky Health Centre concept get up and running by the Government but also there are about 3000 in our catchment area that need to pledge support in some kind to make absolutely certain that our message doesn't fall on deaf ears.

WE MUST BE PEOPLE OF ACTION NOT JUST OF WORDS

A simple fact is that once the hospital is gone it will be near impossible by any government

to re-establish it to its former glory.

The Association needs immediate support in a range of ways over the next

few weeks to keep the battle to save the hospital in front and running.

We, as a community right

through the Valley and Bicheno and yes even St Helens must be prepared to offer our services in some way. An occasional \$1 or \$2 coin in the fighting fund tins won't go astray either.

That's how Yeoval NSW in 1988/89 began and their case was virtually identical to here. Mr Col Francis outlined this to the town in a recent meeting. In fact he was certain that given our district advantages over his area in those early years that we can succeed.

It comes right down to the most necessary ingredient of all -PEOPLE POWER

It's a straight forward question to everyone:

- ⇒ Show support and we go forward as a community
- ⇒ Don't show support and it's another major defeat to our Valley
- ⇒ Let's not give them the satisfaction




