
A weekend at the races

Motor cycle road racing is definately addictive, says David Evelyn

I remember the first time I ever raced, it was at Calder Park around 1986. It was raining and I fell off twice, smashing both sides of the bike and later on in the day blew the engine up from over revving. I arrived home that night with my crashed and blown up bike in the back of my ute, but I had a smile from ear to ear and knew I had to have another go.

Over the next few years with a lot of persistance, luck and money, I got to a stage where I was fairly competitive with the class I chose to ride in which was 250cc Grand Prix Class.

Here is a typical weekend at the races.



The weekend would really start the Monday before as the bike would have to be stripped down during the week, rebuilt with new engine parts and the frame set up from previous information kept from last time we were at that track. This included suspension settings, tyres, tyre pressures, gears in the gearbox (they were interchangeable) and gear ratio's to the back wheel.

We had combinations from about 8 different rear sprockets and 3 front. This was all in aid of having the bike best suited to the track to gain even a

tenth of a second per lap. Also during the week we would have to organise race fuel, new tyres, motel accomodation, confirm entry acceptance, etc.

Friday afternoon would come around and we (meaning the family, which consisted of my wife Terry and the kids and always my father as team manager) would hit the road in the van which was already loaded with bike, tyres, spare wheels, parts, fuel, tools and hopefully nothing forgotten, oh and also the kids!

If the meeting was interstate it was nothing to drive all night to get from Melbourne to Sydney. We'd arrive at the track early hours of the morning and we'd sleep in the van amongst the bike and other bits just to get a couple of hours of shut eye. As soon as the track opened, usually about 7.30am, the work would begin. We would set up the annexe on the side of the van as our pitshed, position everything where we wanted it and then have breakfast. When the kids were young we also had to set up a playpen in the back of the van.

We even had a fold up work bench which we sat the bike on top of to work on. Before the bike goes on the track it has to pass through scrutineering which means it gets checked by officials to meet all safety and technical requirements, then its off to riders briefing which is all riders gathered to listen to officials describe the days program, etc Finally they would call my class out to the track. The heart rate would instantly double, and this is only practice or qualifying. I would warm the bike up then go onto the track. Dad would go to pit wall with his time clock and lap board which he would hold up for me to see my lap times as I went.

My wife Terry would push the pram with the kids to a spot in the spectator area to watch.

The session would end typically after about 20 minutes and there might be about 3 sessions allocated for the day. When I returned to the pits we would analyse and discuss how things were going. Dad might say 'Well you're going pretty good but you need to go a second a lap faster".

These particular bikes are so fussy as to how they run that a slight change in weather required a carburettor jet change to make it run leaner or richer. The colder the weather the richer on fuel it had to run. Too rich and it wouldn't perform 100% and too lean the engine would seize up requiring rebuilding.

We had about 50 different jets and settings to choose from so by the end of the day you had the bike tuned and set as best you could, usually going faster each session.

Typically we might have ended up third overall qualifying which isn't bad, still in front row, this ends Saturdays session, phew, pressures off till tomorrow. We'd pack up, head back to the motel and go out for a meal and maybe a couple of beers, (never too much) and head back for an early night.

Sunday morning: As soon as I awoke butterflies would set in as I could only think about the outcome of the day. What would it bring? We'd get to the track early and have everything set up as soon as possible.

Sometimes we'd be in a panic to be ready in time if we had to change tyres or wheels due to weather etc.

(we'd use different tyres in the rain as we would in

the dry) we also had electric tyre warmers which covered around the tyres to warm them up before going onto the track. Cold tyres are slippery and work better as the temperature goes up.

Finally race time. In the warm up area I'd feel sick with butterflies as we lined up on the grid. As

oh well, I'll go for a practice at the local track during the week in between".

I didn't fall off this time".

The Bike I rode in 1990 was a Yamaha TZ 250, the engine was 250cc capacity which had 6 gears and put out about 80 horsepower. It had a very strong and light aluminium frame with lightweight wheels and special suspension.

The whole bike weighed just under 100KG and could easily reach speeds of 240 - 250 KPH.

You had to concentrate and try hard for typically 20 laps which might take 30 minutes or so. The protective gear worn included a helmet made of fibreglass and kevlar. Full length leather suit which had added protection built into the lining and plastic or leather blocks that would velcro to the knees for scraping on the road when cornering. Full leather boots with plastic scrapers, leather gloves which were fairly thin to feel the handlebars and controls, and a back protector to put inside the leather suit which consisted of high impact plastic pieces which locked together but could move with body movement (like a lobster back!).

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AN HISTORICAL EXTRACT FROM THE CYCLOPEDIA OF TASMANIA 1899

ST MARY STATE SCHOOL Mr Herbert James Smith, teacher.

The school house is an old fashioned building, divided into two fairly large rooms, and the teachers residence is a detached four-roomed cottage standing in it's own grounds. The number of scholars on the roll is ninety-five and the average daily attendance is about eighty. When Mr Smith took charge of the school, about seven years ago, the number of pupils on the roll was only about sixty, so that good progress has been made, and it is evident that Mr Smith's abilities as a teacher are recognised, and that confidence is felt in the general management of the school.

Mr Smith was born Kingston, Brown's River, in 1864, and was educated at the Battery Point (Model) State School, where he gained the distinction of being the first student nominated to the Model School, which carried with it the means of obtaining a thorough equipment for his future profession. His first appointment was to the State School at Mangana, and from there he was promoted to his present charge. Mr Smith is W.M. of the Lord Carrington Lodge, Fingal, Lieutenant in command of the Cornwall Company, 2nd Battalion Tasmanian Regiment of Infantry, and takes an interest in most local matters. He was married in 1896 to Miss Harriet Viney, daughter of Mr Robert Viney of Fingal.



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

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AN HISTORICAL EXTRACT FROM CYCLOPEDIA OF TASMANIA 1899.

MR GEORGE WILLIAM OLIVER

was born in the Fingal district on the 22nd October, 1841 and has resided there ever since, spending the first twenty years of his life with his father in the different branches of farming. He then entered into the employment of Mr Robert Clarke, who was managing the estate of "Malahide", taking charge of the "Black Boy" and "Font Hill" sheep and cattle stations, where he remained for six years, and then left at his own Mr Oliver after this entered into instance. farming pursuits on his own account near St Marys, renting the estate of "Balaclava" for five years. When his lease expired he purchased "Balaclava" from the late Mr John Storey for 1200, and carried on dairy farming there, producing cheese, butter and bacon successfully for twenty five years. He also purchased the estate of "Morning Side" for 1000. He always took a keen interest in church matters, being a church warden for many years, also a member of the choir for the last twenty five years. Having bought various other small properties in the neighbourhood including "Fair View Cottage" at St Marys, where he now lives, he retired from active life. At the age of twenty two he married the youngest daughter of the late Edward Newman, of White Hills, near Launceston, and has reared a family of six children - three sons and three daughters, all of whom are grown up. The eldest and youngest sons are now renting "Balaclava". The second eldest son is a teacher in the State School at St Marys.

Variety of topics discussed at March meeting of St Marys and District Chamber of Commerce

Some economic development opportunities may arise from the use of the effluent for irrigation.

The swimming pool has also been used for Learn to swim and water safety instruction and after school classes as well as much use by parents and children during the summer holidays.



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
