### **East Coast on the Internet?**

Hope is renewed for those on the East Coast and Fingal Valley who are keen to see the creation of jobs for our unemployed. Teletrak talks will resume with the Premier Mr Rundle being presented with an independent consultants report into this proposal.

Councillor Stephen Salter believes that the existing racing industry, who are at present having financial and structural difficulties would strengthen their position if they were to negotiate a deal with Teletrak and therefore assure them of expansion and a long term future.

One particular statement in the STATE GOV-ERNMENTS DIRECTIONS STATEMENT said "to make Tasmania a demonstration site showcasing the potential of new technology to transform the economic and social life of regional and more isolated communities".

The proposed use of the internet for Teletrak transmission fits in well with the above Directions Statement criteria.

"This statement appears tailor made for the Teletrak proposal. The employment opportunities of Teletrak and associated develop-

ments of Teletrak at Chain of Lagoons, maybe the only thing that will halt and reverse the erosion of services in our region", Mr Salter said.

### St Marys Hospital New Maternity Block Opened

### THE MERCURY MONDAY JANUARY 9, 1939

"A new wing of the St Marys Hospital was opened by the Attorney-General (Mr E J Oglivie) on Saturday.

The president (Mr R W Legge) said that during its 10 years of existence the hospital had treated 1,319 patients. The commercial benefit of the hospital to the district was indicated by the fact that provisions cost £210 a year, wood and coal £26, repairs £27, and wages and salaries amounted to £535. The new wing, primarily for maternity cases, had been built during a year in which no appeal had been made to the public. The wing was built with £1000 from the Jubilee Fund, £500 from the Hartnoll Bequest and £400 from the E B Bromley Request. The Government's annual subsidy was £310. If the people of the district contributed more by becoming members the Government would consider allocating a larger grant. The hospital was a district institution and it should be supported by the Fingal and Portland municipalities.

The Attorney-General congratulated the Board members on their achievement. He said a fine community spirit existed at St Marys considering the effects of industrial troubles.

The Director of Public Health (Dr B M Carruthers) said the Hospital was efficiently furnished, and the maternity block was as good as any in the State. Messrs C S F Hood and C F Salter appealed for greater public assistance"

It should be remembered that the service provided by the St Marys District Hospital has been on-going ever since this article first appeared, a period of 58 years!

Our Ambulance is very rare indeed providing free service and operated by a dedicated group of volunteers who give up their time willingly and without discrimination.

We should all try in our own way to protect what is ours, and do what-ever we can to try and ensure these treasures remain, to give assurance to those who work in dangerous industries around us (coal mine, forestry) knowledge that they will have at hand hopsital care in case of accident with a trip "JUST DOWN THE ROAD". (sic!)

### LEGACY BADGE DAY 1997


Legacy Badge Day is held on the first Friday of September. this year being 5th September.







### "UNITED WE STAND - DIVIDED WE FALL"

Without doubt by now all would be aware of the unbelievable. This is of course the imminent closure of the St Marys District Hospital on September 26th.

Despite a truly magnificent and protracted fight by all those comprising the Hospital Support Group, a select committee Legislative Council Inquiry involving 82 testimonies plus submissions and countless heartfelt requests from the public. The Health Minister Peter McKay seems hell-bent on sanctioning this ridiculous decision. Together with the Mayor Mr Bob Legge, Health forum delegate Mr Stephen Salter, Legislative Council stalwarts Mr George Shaw and Mr Colin Rattray, local M.H.A.'s David Llewellyn, Michael Polley and Liberal candidate Russell Anderson, the Support Group Executive candidates Len Miles, Cheryl Hendley, Rona Gatty, Dr Ian Naidoo and Doris Bullock with over sixty financial members help can be very proud of their efforts. They can hold their heads high whatever the outcome, for a job well done.

This decision is at odds with various recommendations forthcoming on this issue in recent years.

These parties surely must have an intimate knowledge of our needs and requirements in the area, yet the Health Ministry have treated them with utter contempt, with callous insincily and with little respect for our elderly citizens most of whom have made major contributions to the hospital viability for seven decades.

Let's face it this hospital is much more than just a hospital. It is a haven and security blanket for our citizens. It is a life line and a monitoring station every day of the year for all who need constant attention in a controlled environment.

The hospital is not a luxury, it is a basic necessity for all of

Let us be totally blunt, about the issue.

St Marys and the Fingal Valley is now in crisis and this test of resolve regarding the removal of a basic right to full health services is the most serious we can suffer, perhaps ever.

As a community we MUST now vent our complete disapproval to the State Government in the strongest possible terms. We MUST never let is be forgotten or forgiven through the bureaucrats and treasury.

Additionally we MUST unbendingly rally around the Hospital Support Group and be prepared to sacrifice some time and effort to fight this abominable situation right to the last with them.

We must also all contemplate a future without the 24 hour hospital and almost certainly and ultimately without resident doctors as has been recently documented. Imagine not having a good General Practitioner easily available like it is now because of the eventual ramifications of the closure. Another matter on similar lines is that of the faithful staff up there. This must be a debilitating time for them, perhaps for most they will be forced, at best, to seek and gain transfers elsewhere and at worst made redundant or unemployed.

What about the community economy that will be once again bashed over the head and left to fend for itself by the political rationalists and treasury officials more interested in saving dollars rather than lives. Makes your wonder that perhaps they need urgent surgery themselves because it's patently obvious a heart transplant is needed. No heart at all seems to exist at the moment, well perhaps a cold one.

What say we fight for our hospital like we've never fought before because lives are almost certain to hang in the balance.

United we stand - divided we fall.


