
These are a few of the questions that have been asked by 'new locals' and visitors to St Marys.

### Removal of car bodies



wrecks on the Crown Land about 3/4 of the way up Alexander Street.

Council has organised for Sims Metal to bring a mobile crusher and set it up on this land to crush and remove the offending wrecks. Local residents are requested to assist in the clean up by dropping any disused car bodies or wrecks onto this land where Sims Metal will then deal with them

We anticipate that Sims Metal will be on site around the 21st September. Residents who are able to do so are asked to co-operate in this venture to both improve the visual environment of Cornwall and to remove a potential danger to local children.

This action is essentially a one off so we ask that people respect their town by not allowing old car wrecks and components to remain on their land any longer than is necessary to strip useful parts. Once finished with, scrap cars can be disposed of, free of charge, at the St Marys Waste Transfer Site.

## Fingal Valley Meals on Wheels Annual Report 1997/98

This year has been marked by the downgrading of the St Marys District Hospital to that of a Community Health Centre.

Prior to and at the time of the change-over we were very concerned as to whether the preparation of meals would continue.

Thankfully our fears were unfounded and the meals have continued, for this we are extremely grateful.

One can imagine the changes that would be necessary if we had to rely on chilled or frozen meals from the Launceston General Hospital.

The price of meals was increased this year to \$4.20 as a standard price. The price has increased over the years, twelve years ago the price was \$1.40 so that the cost to recipients has increased by 300% in that time.

I am of the opinion that the 'powers that be' will have to carefully monitor the price of meals so that they do not become too expensive for recipients to cope with, if that happens their health will suffer.

### We have delivered 4,538 meals this year.

For me the highlight of the year was my attendance at the Federal Conference in Adelaide last October. This provided me with great insight as to how Meals on Wheels operates in other States.

An added pleasure for Tasmanian Delegates was to have our own State President, Mr Roy Preèce of Longford, elected as National President. Roy is a very popular and capable person and will serve Meals on Wheels well during his time of office.

Now for some domestic matters.

The Fingal Valley Group has been operating for 28 years, providing wholesome meals for all who need them in this area.

Our financial position is sound as the Financial Statement will show.

Among our dedicated officers are Secretary Jack Miller and Treasurer Vicki Woods. These two people look after the day to day running of the service and the efficiency of it largely depends on the good will and interest of these two.

The members of the committee show great interest and reguarly attend meetings and offer a willingness to undertake various tasks as required and give their unfailing support.

We also express our thanks to the Staff at the St Marys Community Health Centre for their every day assistance in providing meals of excellent quality.

Jeff's jottings from W.A.

Jeff has caught up again after his influx of visitors and we will be flat out trying to keep up with his latest jottings as he is doing so much looking and learning around his 'ranch' up north.

It seems as if the economy of Crossing Falls/Kununurra could well revolve around melons! Rock melons, honeydew melons, watermelons, champagne melons. At the largest melon farm picking goes on 24 hours a day. Large road trains leave the farms daily taking melons to Perth, Adelaide, Sydney and Melbourne. Being a farmer, Jeff checked on land prices and got a bit of a shock, \$10,000 per hectare, the crops every 3 months really drag in the money. The best 50% of the melon crop is picked and the rest ploughed in, rot down quickly in the heat and with irrigation, then the next crop goes in.

Jeff has also had the opportunity to meet some beekeepers. The honey is only a sideline as the farmers pay the beekeepers to put the hives amongst their crops for pollination. Jeff was surprised that the big 44's of honey are sold for stock feed - fed to race horses. Talking of race horses, Jeff was doing his community stint on gate keeping duties at the Kununurra Race Day.

The day was most interesting, not in the races but in the people he met, visitors and packpackers who he had talked to. About 800 turned up and they hope to get more at the Kununurra Cup the following week. Horses, trainers, jockeys and others all came from near and far such as Broome, Derby, Wyndham, Darwin and Katherine. He thought that by the look of the old Bedford and Inter floats, the racing industry is not really booming.

It was a good day, take your own chair along and find a spot under the shadecloth areas on the green lawns. Jeff thought Eric Bean would be in his element up there, but doubted if the gallopers could trot! After the five races came the '2 UP' games, money flying everywhere!

One couple that Jeff met were driving a truck loaded with bananas from Tully Queensland, right across Australia to Perth in W.A. When asked why they did not take bananas from the Kununurra area, he was told that there was more money to cart them the longer distance—no wonder fresh fruit is expensive.

Jeff's next visit was to meet and talk with Bill Withers, a frontier pioneer politician. Just get 'Frontier Dreaming' and read it, this is a sample: 'It's the smile which counts. He was a tribal man with a magnificent smile and engaging personality, he wanted to sell two boomerangs and a woomera. He attracted everyones attention, a fine specimen of a man with rows of tribal scars across his chest.' Another example, dire threat, 'it had been said of the man that he wouldn't work in an iron lung.' It was the day for social security payments and for the third successive time he did not receive a cheque. His local M.P. was near the Post Office when the irate perpetually unemployed man approached him and said "You tell them gov'ment fellas, if I don't get my money next time..... I'm going to get a job with the Main Roads!"

Adverse weather conditions were responsible for the unsuccessful show held at St Marys last Wednesday. It was distinctly unfortunate for the society and the district that one of the worst rain storms of recent years should have come along on the very day set down for the show.

The executive had arrangements well in hand, and the secretary, Mr L.N.Wright, had worked unceasingly in an endeavour to bring about a record fixture. A number of visitors from a distance put in an appearance on the day prior to the show and had the weather remained fine many more would have come along. As it was, only the very hardiest spirits ventured out.

Despite the fact that it was teeming 'cats and dogs', the entire ring programme was persisted with. Those who had the courage to visit the ground were treated to the spectacle of equestrians of both sexes, splashing through deep pools of water and negotiating fences from take-offs fetlock deep in mud.

As is usual in these cases, the horses jumped carefully and safely and no accidents occurred. The riders however could not have had one stitch of dry clothing on them. Hack races and trots were also run.

The Governor, Sir James O'Grady was present and performed the opening ceremony. There is no doubt that in the person of Sir James the primary producers have a real champion. His investigation of their position is no superficial one, for he probes their problems with a thoroughness that has won the admiration of the farming community. Few men in official positions have given the time and thought to the troubles of the man on the land that has been willingly undertaken by Sir James O'Grady.

He visits nearly every agricultural gathering in the state, and his address is always on the subject of advancement along organised and scientific lines. He made a special appeal at St Marys for increased support for the St Marys Farmers Pastoral, Agricultural and Dairying Association. In doing so, he stressed the point that it was only by organisation that success could be obtained.

There is no doubt that in a locality such as St Marys an agricultural association should be developed second to none in country centres of Tasmania. Devoted as it has been for some years to dairying, sheep-raising and coal mining, the locality must be in a very prosperous condition. Dairying has been of late years a most profitable undertaking while those who have been sheep-raising have been coining money. The good prices ruling for butter and wool have been responsible for this.

Mining provides a very valuable secondary industry and what is so necessary for the primary producers 'a local market'.

The display of pigs and dairy cattle was indeed good and testified that the residents are alive to the need for high class animals. In the dairy breeds Ayrshires, milking Shorthorns, Fresians and Jerseys were all well represented.

A considerable financial loss is likely to result due to the wet day, but with the determination to succeed which was expressed by the President Mr L. Eugene Ransom, there is little doubt that in a few years the deficit will be completely wiped out.

Thankyou to Mr Jack Miller for this bit of local history from a 1929 newspaper.





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

Hello once again. We have got something a little different this week in that the majority of CD's reviewed are re-releases from the '70's. The late '70's saw a backlash against stadium type rock bands and through this grew a brash new raw sound known as PUNK. Bands rejected the traditional guitar and keyboard solos for a more power based sound. The punk movement was cultivated by one Malcolm McLaren in '76 from his London boutique. He was unashamedly honest about his intentions for nurturing punk music and the band he managed the infamous Sex Pistols, these intentions were to make big money. Which brings us to the first three CD reviews this week, when the phenomenon of punk hit there was immediately a shortage of true raw punk bands such as The Clash, Ramones, The Damned and of course the Pistols. So record companies and record shops who could not immediately find enough product to push turned to any up and coming bands and hung a punk label on them, such artists as Elvis Costello, Patti Smith, Blondie etc. all sadly found their way into the punk category.

CD REVIEWS: New York Dolls - "Rock 'n' Roll", The Stooges - "Self Titled" and Television -"Marquee Moon". These three bands all hailing from the USA were thrown in as punk pioneers or in the case of The Stooges being a '60's band a major influence on the punk movement. Unfortunately as with the bands above they don't immediately come across that way. New York Dolls were a rock'n'roll outfit headed by the singing talents of David Johansen and '70's guitar hero Johnny Thunders. They had a sound not unlike The Stones around the "Exile on Mainstreet" period, raw sometimes sloppy but always aggressive rock'n'roll. This CD contains 20 tracks, more than enough to give you an indication of the bands repertoire. Stand out tracks "Looking for a kiss", "Who are the mystery girls" and the brilliant "Personality Crisis". The Stooges headed by Iggy Pop or as he was known then Iggy Stooge released this CD in the '60's but they were not touted as innovators till the '70's. Sharing the same record label as the Doors they were allowed the same artistic freedom and pushed a lot of boundaries with their rough edged rock'n'roll. Stand out tracks "I wanna be your dog", "1969" and the much covered "No fun". Television headed by Tom Verlaine released this CD in 1977 when punk was at its money making best. 

### A PLEA FOR DALE

The hope with every deaf child is that eventually, through correct management, he will be able to communicate with and integrate fully into every day society. This is not always possible and there are many reasons for this, the most obvious being the extent of deafness I.e. mild-moderate, severeprofound and total. This is also dependant of whether the hearing loss is acquired or congenital.

For the majority of the hearing impaired there are many forms of help available to assist with communication e.g. hearing aids, Ausian and cochlea implants. reading can be used with all of these. Hearing aids are used to amplify sounds, they do not distinguish between foreground and background sounds, therefor it's uses are limited for the profoundly deaf although excellent for the majority of the deaf community.

Auslan is a combination of fingerspelling, signs, facial expressions and gestures and is a recognised lan-

guage in it's own right.


The cochlea implant (often referred to as the bionic ear) is an artificial hearing device designed to produce hearing sensations by electrically stimulating nerves inside the inner ear (cochlea). It consist of three components, the receiver-stimulator (worn internally), the speech processor and headset (worn externally). The cochlea implant is only used for the profoundly deaf who must meet strict criteria. recipient must have little or no hearing in both ears and gain little or no benefit from the use of hearing aids. The implants do not return the hearing 'cure' normal o r t o deafness. Adults and children can benefit from the cochlea implants but children are generally not implanted until twelve months of age although assessment can begin as early as three months.

Unfortunately Tasmania does not have the medical facilities to cater for such a procedure and any person contemplating the operation must travel to Melbourne or Sydney. habilitation is so intensive that it required the recipient to be at the hospital for therapy not less than once per week for twelve months. The State Government only has a budget of \$2000 per person per financial year.
