Heart Award for St Marys Centre

Jenny Purtell from the Heart Foundation presented Staff of the St Marys Community Health Centre with the 1998 'Heart Health Week' award, last Wednesday.

Christine Field and Lyn Taylor were leading the team in heart health promotion from March till May.

A total of 276 people attended Heart Health Community sessions. Persons under 50 years represented 53% of participants and males were 33% of the overall attendance.

More news for the Centre was the announcement that the St Marys Community Health Centre will become a Rural Health Teaching Site.

This will be managed and coordinated by the University Department of Rural Health which has been established and funded by the Commonwealth Government to act as a catalyst for the development of a comprehensive and coordinated approach to rural health education, training and research across the State.

TELEHEALTH for St Marys

The proposed Launceston General Hospital Telehealth hub has the potential to deliver a wide range of services to rural sites. Remote sites will be able to conduct consultations with staff at the LGH using Telehealth facilities, avoiding the need to travel to consultations and providing timely access to specialist care in emergencies. The Telehealth facilities will provide vital face to face links between the LGH specialist areas and the spoke sites to:

- * Improve access to health services and enhance health outcomes for the communities serviced by these sites
- * Contribute to improving community based health
- Provide professional support and development opportunities for the rural health workforce, thus having the capacity to improve staff retention and recruitment.
- * Enhance the sustainability of rural and remote health service centres and their value to the communities they serve.

The Community welcomes Dr Shah and his family and look forward to a long association with them.

Dr Shah is expecting to commence work next week. Appointments may be made at the Community Health Centre. Phone 63722111

Report from Fire Captain Michael Aulich

St Marys Volunteer Fire Brigade received a message via pagers and Mornington alarm that a fire was burning in gorse just out of St Marys. It was 2pm on Saturday 24 October and after some confusion about the location of the fire, due to the report given to the communication centre in Hobart, it was soon discovered the fire was just out of the town boundary on the way to St Marys Pass.

A quick assessment of the situation suggested there was little cause for concern at the moment, as the fire location was inaccessable and the adverse weather conditions



made firefighting difficult and dangerous.

Peter Vantilburg, a local property owner, appeared from the bush to say that his family was camping directly in the path of the fire.

Peter had purchased the block of land and moved in with his family and a number of animals just the week before.

While some members of the brigade left to get the fire trucks, it was decided a bulldozer would be needed. The fire was approaching fast, burning up hill and being fanned by wind gusts in excess of 80 kmh. The biggest problem was obtaining a suitable machine quickly enough to get a fire break around the Vantilburgs belongings. After trying for a local dozer, it was found that one could not be on site for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours and this was too long as it was estimated that it would be less than $\frac{1}{2}$ hour before the fire reached the camp site.

With 14 personnel and both trucks on site, the only way was back burning, an extremely risky task considering the direction from which the wind was blowing and the possibility of the fire getting past the crew and blocking off the only exit

A back burn was started and shortly after the fire reached the campsite, the front was burning fiercely, forcing the brigade to evacuate the area so lives and equipment would not be placed at any further risk. Later due to the backburning, a truck was able to get back in and most of the family's belongings were saved.

It was soon discovered that a fire was rapidly approaching the property of Nick and Fiona's new house at the foot of St Patricks Head and a call had come in reporting smoke at Elephant Pass which was later found to be of no concern.

Harry Nolan and myself went to the new house to investigate the situation and discovered that a totally separate fire was rapidly approaching the house.

The fire unit that had attended the Elephant Pass site was immediately recalled to try to stop this fire at a cleared fence line, but soon discovered that this could not be done because of the speed the fire was travelling. The only thing left to do was proceed to the new house, set up there and wait for the fire to arrive, with full knowledge that before the fire reached the house it would block off the only truck access track. The second St Marys unit was pulled away from the Vantilburgs, leaving fire fighters at the site with knapsacks. This unit arrived on location only minutes before the truck access road was cut off by the fire.

The Falmouth brigade had been called earlier and their arrival was very welcome. They were able to get in by using a back track off Irish Town Road.

The fire was fast approaching, the house was dampened down and the fire crew successfully assisted the fire front to pass the house. This was only achieved because there was plenty of water available from a nearby dam

At the same time several fire fighters continued to check on the Vantilburgs property and several other houses in the bush along Irish Town Road.

It was close to midnight when the weary firemen headed for home

I had already organised support from Parks and Wildlife and Dave Wagner's dozer for the morning with final placement being arranged after surveying the situation.

Next morning, after checking weather forecasts, organising personnel and the dozer, it was back to the map to devise a plan to stop the fire spreading further

The temperature and wind speed had dropped in the early hours of the morning, slowing the fire's spread. It was now a matter of putting breaks around the fire and burning all unburned ground near these breaks, then keeping a watch on the breaks to stop the fire crossing them and to extinguish any long time burning stumps, wood and trees.

There were two main sectors in which this needed to be done. Sector 1

was along Gillies Road to prevent the fire from spreading towards the houses at the top of St Marys Pass and stop the fire from entering the Pass Reserve.

Sector 2 was at the foot of St Patricks Head. The aim was to contain the fire in a small area and to stop the Head burning.

There were other fires burning in the Eastern Tiers District and a central control room had been set up at the Fingal Forestry on Saturday night. It is easier to pool resources and equipment from a central location.

On Sunday afternoon relief crews from Scamander, St Helens and Avoca arrived, allowing the current crews to be replaced with fresh people.

I handed over the control of the fires to Tony Gee and the relieving crews continued to fight the fires until they considered them safe to leave at around 10pm when the wind had finally calmed down.

This fire alone cost the taxpayer in excess of \$8,000 and burnt 400 hectares of land. Indirectly, the cost to the community is much greater with several repair bills to be added to this price, which could amount to quite a few thousand dollars.

There were 41 personnel directly involved in fighting the fire and apart from Parks and Wildlife and Dave Wagner, the fire fighters were volunteers, giving hundreds of man hours free of charge to the community, with no questions asked!

Community spirit and willingness to help, allowed the fighters to get on with the job and saved the day. Many thanks must be given to the community and in particular the following:

- * The many locals who offered their support, especially those who gave their support at a minutes notice.
- All shops, Health Care Centre and the wives and mothers for supplying food and drinks.
- * Dave Wagner for supplying the dozer, Dave Evelyn and the Police.
- * All others who assisted in any way over this hectic weekend.







GRADE 9/10 LAKE ST CLAIR WILDERNESS TRIP











The long weekend in October saw a group of 8 intrepid grade 10 students (Upasna Pratap, Marcus Salonen, Brendan Saunders, Mark Spilsbury, Scott Wilson, Eva Witton, Jenny Brown, Emma Tamiaans) and 2 grade 9 boys (Kai Linfoot and Joshua Poole), head off to Lake St Clair with Mrs Kelly, Mr Ennis and their families and Mrs Jones for a fantastic three days of wilderness walking.

Our first day took us to Lake St Clair via Great Lake. On the way a few people were ambushed by snow ball throwers, but apart from that the day was relatively calm! A side trip to Donaghues lookout (approx. 60k east of Queenstown) was a great stopover. The 20 minute stroll ended in a high lookout from which Frenchman's Cap (mountain) and the Franklin and Collingwood Rivers were the panoramic backdrop.




Day 2 and the party walked, sloshed, slid and climbed over 15 km of track, mud and snow to conquer the summit of Mt Little Hugel. On top there was ideal clear windless weather conditions that enabled us to enjoy the spectacular scenery of Lake St Clair and its surrounding snow tipped mountains. Once again snowball fights and ambushes, a few mud dives (Kai) and lost shoes in the mud (Upasna) were the order of the day. The end point however, made every step worthwhile.


Day 3.. 9.00am we were all packed and on the ferry to the other end of the lake. Fourteen kilometers later and we arrive at Narcissus ready to set up home for the night in a bushwalkers hut – Mr Ennis the only one having sense to set up his tent a few metres away.,


