TRAFFIC CALMERS RECYCLED

The traffic calmers outside St Marys Bakery were removed from Main Street earlier this week by a decision of the St Marys Street Theme Committee.

The calmers had been installed for a trial period as part of the new foot path development, but had attracted considerable adverse comment, mostly about the reduction of street parking

A member of the Committee, David Clement, said that it had taken early public comment into account, and had obtained a revised design for the calmers which would have reintroduced 3 street parking spaces and provided a safe pedestrian crossing. However, at last Monday's meeting it was decided that it would be a mistake to introduce these calmers as an isolated element of the comprehensive street plan to reduce traffic speed and improve pedestrian safety in the town.

It was also agreed that off street parking facilities needed to be developed and inegrated with any traffic engineering work to achieve the simultaneous objectives of better pedestrian ac-

cess, slower traffic and easy parking.

Mr Clement indicated that a proposal at the last Break O'Day Council Meeting to remove the calmers had been rejected, because they would have removed the decision making process from the local Committee which was responsible for the implementation of the local Streetscape Plan. " Council, of course, has the ultimate say, but interference at the council level before dealing with issues at the local committee level would be taking away the power of St Marys residents to make decisions about their own town."

The Committee also believed that the responsibility for ensuring a slow traffic flow through the town should not rest entirely with the Committee and any proposed traffic engineering works, but that Tasmania Police should be asked for much stricter implementation of existing traffic speed limits through the town. Additionally the Department of Transport should be approached to review existing speed limits.

The calmers will not disappear totally from the town - they have been recycled into the footpath currently under construction from the Break O'Day Milkbar to complete the 'Linden

Walk' from the bridge to The Flat.

Do you, or someone you know have a swollen limb or limbs?

Persistent swelling (oedema) could be lymphoedema.

In October '96 I had surgery for cancer and by early '97 my

feet and legs were swelling.

Information received from the RHH seemed limited to a fact sheet of Do's and Don'ts. Later the Physio Deptartment of the LGH provided an exercise program and some custommade support hose. As things became steadily worse I searched far and wide for information.

Lymphoedema is due to excessive fluid in the tissues which is not being drained off and filtered through the lymph nodes (glands in groin, abdomen and armpits). It is most commonly seen after surgery and radiation therapy for cancer of the breast or pelvic area, lymphomas, melanomas and accidents. As this dis-ease progresses the areas swell and become heavy. Movement becomes more difficult. Skin becomes taut and dry. Tissues harden, cutting off blood and oxygen which often leads to recurring infections requiring urgent medical

So, last October I greeted with delight some articles I received from the Breast Cancer Support Group which gave the personal statement of a fellow sufferer from Tasmania. This lady had discovered the Lymphoedema Management Therapy offered by Associate Professor Neil Piller of Flinders University and two South Australian physios, Robyn Heddle and Anne Thelander.

Robyn gives complex physical therapy (CPT) and Anne, laser therapy.

The laser used produces light energy at two wavelengths which penetrates the tissues to stimulate the lymph vessels to pump faster to reduce swelling and pain.

How exciting to go to Adelaide to get some help.

After one treatment I lost 16 centimetres offmy leg. Afurther two treatments saw me back into some normal clothing and footwear. Icould walk again!

Well the good news is that this trio have agreed to come to the St Marys Health Centre, mid April to offer the treatment and teach CPT to lymphoedema sufferers, their partners, physiotherapists, masseurs and health care professionals, so good self-management can be given in Tasmania.

It is important to remember that lymphoedema is quite common, can and should be treated, can be much reduced and can be maintained by laser therapy and CPT.



Two wrongs make a write off

Last Saturday late afternoon two cars in St Marys Pass did not service dangerous intimacy. The one coming up on the left, met the one coming down. The passengers emerged from their potential graves shocked but unmaimed. The cars would not move again without great encouragement. Two young girls in bright frocks, near their journey's end of Scamander, were tearful. Their father comforted them. The young man in the other car limped around in a dazed state. Possible fracture of one lower leg bone.

When I heard the crash I was out of sight masked by forest. The crash was awesome in that confined space of

the pass.

I do First Aid refresher courses every few years but I dreaded gushing arteries and compound fractures. Not breathing and in need of resussitation didn't do much for me either.

It was quiet in the pass except for the cicadas: we'd had the big bang, now was only left the whimpers.

We were all pretty helpless and situation verging on hopeless: we asked a passing car to contact St Marys Police. He came and she came. They know who they are and you know who they are. Order was restored. Hope enter via blue car with flashing lights.

Next from Scamander came the paramedic. Her hugs and comfort for the two girls finished the work of the occupants of a passing car which had stopped: Woman, girl and labrador x puppy - I don't know who they are but they did all that was necessary to ease the suffering of those little girls (there are times when men are worse than useless !) What the cuddles didn't achieve, the lollies achieved and the puppy was in constant attendance.

The one from Scamander - it would be worth having a wild smash to have her attend you - checked the girls for breaks and abnormalities while seeming to play with them (aren't women wonderful?)

Very soon after Scamander came St Marys paramedics. They took on the young man and sat him in the back of the ambulance. No lollies, puppy or cuddles for him, just a possible broken lower leg bone. She and he -these two ('our') paramedics were great. They know who they are and you know who they are so that's OK.

I'm writing this 'cause I was impressed and proud of the quality and quantity of help we might get if it was us ! 4 victims, 9 helpers - including the puppy, are good odds

aren't they? Thank you all. D.Lawler St Marys.

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UP UP AND AWAY

Oh, 5am. It's up - quick shower and an even quicker bite to eat and oh yes a hot cuppa, then off to Launceston 0545. Pick up other family members (another quick cuppa!) and to Devonport airport, actually it was nearer to Port Sorell. We take a little time to locate the correct building but once inside it's introduction time.

"Hi, I'm your instructor, now just pay attention, this is good fun but serious stuff Listen well, learn thoroughly and I promise you a truely great experience"

"Are you all in then?" "Yes" all six reply. The other members of the family disappear for a few hours relaxation. Now for the dictionary of terms - toggles - canopy - nine cells - harness - strut - static line - altometer - risers - sliders - gear - suit - helmut - goggles - deployment bag - P.S - reserve & main - flare - brakes......

Let's watch the video, that will sort it out for us. Looks easy - simple - nothing to it!!

Now back to the book, more terminology - static - line hangup - Hi/Low speed malfunction (things are sounding serious now) - do I go on ??

Pay attention, for the emergency strategies. 'Look' - 'Locate' - 'Punch' - 'Clear'. WOW!! - - we continue on, 1000, 2000, 3000 - - oh now the emergency roll procedure, I can't quite get it - the others don't have a problem. Ken (the instructor) remarks that "as we get older we become a little less flexible" - ouch, that was just the urge I needed and yes, executed a superb emergency landing (one never knows when one may encounter power lines or roof tops!!)

Phew, it's lunch time, over to the airport lounge and pretend we're tourists and yes back to the classroom.

Being a person who appreciates the practicalities rather than the study books, I relished the next session. It was now time to get 'suited up' and into our harness and practice what we had learnt. A few run throughs and it's cuppa time again and ready for the exam.

I've heard this terminology earlier today and I recognise it - toggles - sliders - static line - look - locate etc. A little discussion, the family members (support crew) have returned, the time, oh it is 4.15pm, the sun is still shining brightly, breeze 15-20 knots, OK - knowledge aboard, time to suit-up and harness on (this is an experience in itself!). First crew at the ready, (not being one to hang back, of course I was in the 1st crew!) - last minute instruction and it's out on the tarmac and introduced to the pilot (no time to worry about appearances !!) and then to the jump instructor (and wouldn't you know, he's an ex St Marys man). He pointed out the important aspects of the plane, ie the step and the strut under the wing. This plane is about 2.5m high and not a lot of room inside to fit 3 jumpers, pilot and instructor, we all crouch in (the pilot has a seat). Engine roars, no muffler, and along the runway we veer and then up and up and up - all three and a half thousand feet up. Yes I can do this, no worries ! Up goes the door and whoosh, the force of the wind is greater than I had imagined.... remain calm I thought. The 'nod' is given to Jumper No 1 - out onto the step, hands on the strut, edge along and hang, look back to the instructor and wait for the 'GO'.

Seems to take a few seconds longer than I thought but she looks blissfully happy, then WHOOSH -suddenly she is

gone - sucked into oblivion. I couldn't see a thing - where had she gone? Tears welled in the height of the emotion (a natural response one might say). The instructor then closed the door and turned to face me, he noticed my apparent distress and wrongly assumed I was unable to continue. However he began to assure me of number one's safety - there she was - I spotted her, a little dot apparently way out over the sea (a parallax I'm told). A superb view of the northern coastline.

Now I am ready (have to now, as I really could not stand to say I couldn't do it!). I decided that the guys had taught me well - I now needed to trust their teaching and so with a quick Hail Mary (don't leave anything to chance), it was my turn

Out onto the step - hands on the strut - edge out and hang - look back at the instructor. Seconds tick by but I feel great - remember that I am hanging at 3½,000 ft - then 'GO' - head back, hands/arms back, back arched and counting 1000,

2000, 3000, 4 - the canopy is out, oops strings tangled - untangle as instructed, toggles down and up and look now for the huge orange cross on the landing pad.

How do I feel? Absolutely, sublimely wonderful, overwhelming sense of peace and calm - oops, pay attention, look to the arrow for guidance down. Rick now guides me as I marvel at the scenery of

colour - skyline, coastline, hills, terrain, the city of Devonport - delightful stuff!!

Eventually after 3½ minutes of unforgettable freedom Rick assists me to execute an incident free landing (no need for the emergency roll!!)

I hear the cheers from the film crew (yes, the other family members were both support and film crew).

The spotlight now turns to the next candidate, this sequence is repeated for the remaining three who went up in the next flight which followed.

All of us chatted excitedly as we returned home. Do we have the photos? Did we have it on film to provide us with a vivid memory of a truely unforgettable and great experience?

Ah, midlife crisis I hear you mutter (yes I'm well aware that I'm 20 plus years older than the other 5), I prefer to call it quality time with the children, but really it's more a case of, if an opportunity arises don't let it pass you by and if that opportunity involves family then it's all the better.

So if you have a spare day, can discipline yourself to learn a new skill and wish to experience a truely blissful and equally exhilarating 3½ minutesGO SKYDIVING with Ken and Rex at Devonport. You will not regret it.

Who or what is Y.A.M.H.I.G.?

Youth and Mental Health Issues Group

The YAMHIG has been in existence for almost 12 months and since October of 1998 has been meeting on a monthly basis.

The group was initially formed in response to concerns by our community with regard to problems associated with young unemployed persons and also those people with a serious mental illness. It was the poor service provision associated with these two groups that led local workers including health workers, Tasmanian police and concerned local people to meet to discuss what should be

The group now has approx. 12 regular members who represent both local service providers and some service providers from the

city. There is also representation from our local community. This has meant that as rural workers we are more It is well after midnight and I still have some aware of which services visit this area and what their agendas are. We are more able to communicate our concerns directly to government departments through their workers.

Some of the ideas that we are working on at present include assisting the Health Centre to complete its child care facility; establishing a local contact number for those persons in crisis to contact for prompt service; establishing a community garden; ensuring representation on forums and other government decision making groups and becoming a single voice for lobbying for change. While we agree that we must continue to support the move for better youth services and provide better services to maintain the communities mental health, our name does not mean that these are the only issues to be dealt with.

This group is not intended to be an elite club for health and welfare workers and for this reason I am asking any members of our community who has any ideas about what should or should not be happening in the area to feel welcome to attend.

The meetings are held on the first Monday of the month between 11am and 1pm in the Day Room at the St Marys Community Health Centre. A light lunch and tea and coffee are available from our ever capable kitchen and hopefully soon child care facilities will also be present.

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
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COMMUNITY GARDEN

Last year a move was made by the social worker and the alcohol and drug worker at our health centre to investigate the possibility of the community operating and using the vacant land behind the centre as a community garden. A public meeting was called which was poorly attended but a number of people responded in a positive way during the weeks after the meeting. Because the social worker was leaving it was decided to postpone any further development of the idea until 1999.

Community gardens are in operation in many community centre around Tasmania and provide a number of alternatives for their communities. Some of the opportunities that they offer include:

Nutritious food for those who don't have access to fresh fruit and vegetables

A relaxing environment for members of the community to meet and socialise and exchange skills

The opportunity for disadvantaged and disabled community members to garden and meet

The teaching of horticultural skills to the young and unemployed

The ability for people and their centre to generate some income through business ventures that may eventuate.

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St. Marys

St. Marys, a town on the East Coast, must have the most community-minded citizens in Australia.

They give so much time and money to social projects that the extent of their activities would put most communities to shame.

St. Marys has the only free ambulance service in Tasmania, if not in Australia. This service has been provided for the district since 1947 by the St. Marys Branch of the Red Cross. Each year a public drive is held to raise money for the service. It has been so successful in the past that no patient has to pay for the trips into Launceston which the ambulance makes.

This service is naturally very helpful to the pensioners and people on fixed incomes who can least afford to pay for such services. St. Marys also has a local paper run completely voluntarily. It is called "The Valley and East Coast Voice."

"The Voice" is registered with the Post Office as a periodical, and comes out once a fortnight. It is written and printed by local talent for local consumption. "The Voice" is an eight-page duplicated foolscap size paper which contains articles by the local policeman, ministers of religion, and the matron of the

local hospital. A farmer, Geof Dean, is the editor and his wife Betty looks after the business side of things. Sandra and Ada, two nursing sisters at the hospital, print and do all the art work.

"The Voice" has a circulation of 1000, and it must be closer to the people than any other paper in Australia.

Tourism


Since the coal mines shut down in the Fingal Valley, the St. Marys district has lost population, but this has not prevented those who live there from facing the future with optimism.

The local progress association, started two years ago, is fast becoming one of the most enthusiastic in the State. Already townspeople have made a tourist track to one of the many local beauty spots — a waterfall called "The Mare's Tail."

St. Marys Progress Association has been made a division of the Tasmanian Tourist Council. This position has only been given to five or six organisations in Tasmania. Soon St. Marys will have its own tourist information centre with information on all aspects of tourism on the East Coast.

Awards

The Sir Robert Cosgrove Memorial Award is given each year by the Tasmanian Tourist Council for road-side reserves. Sir Robert was always interested in road-side facilities for tourists and this is why the Council has named the award after him. The award consists of two \$100 prizes for (a) the best road-side reserve which has been established, and (b) the best-maintained reserve. St. Marys has nominated for the best established reserve. The Progress Association is building a new public park in the centre of town. It is bordered on two sides by a stream and should make an ideal place for tourists to stop for lunch. Mr. Ron Clarke, the Director of the Tourist Council, has said that "St. Marys has a good chance of winning the prize next year." Perhaps the activity which people in the district are most proud of this year was the raising of

over \$1000 to send a 16-year-old schoolgirl to Japan to represent Australia in the International Guide Council. Sue Herring, an auxiliary nurse and a Queen's Guide, was one of only two girls sent from the whole of Australia to Japan. It took over nine months to raise the money, all of which came from the pockets of people in the district. This was quite a feat, considering that the area is not a rich one at

Sue, an outstanding girl, was chosen as the spokesman for Australia at the Council, and was also picked from the 4,000 guides from all over the world to thank the host country for the Council. Apparently she did an excellent job, one of which any Australian would be proud.

The people of the St. Marys district are the kind which have given Tasmania the name of being the most friendly State in Australia.

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
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
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SPORTS CENTRE NEWS


