ST MARYS WATER SCHEME

IMPROVEMENTS The new water treatment plant at Cameron Street, St Marys is now online and residents should by now have noticed a great improvement in water clarity and quality generally. The plant treats borewater before it is piped into the town

Some clarification as to the role of chlorine in the treatment process is needed. The addition of chlorine accelerates the process of removal of iron and manganese from borewater from 2-3 hours down to a few minutes. A residual level of approximately 0.2 - 0.5 parts per million free chlorine remains after treatment, which has the benefit of protecting the supply in the event of post treatment bacterial contamination, such as birds or other animals accessing the reservoir or accidental backflows sucking in contamination via garden hoses etc, after a burst water main or similar unforeseen incident.

The residual chlorine level in the water supply complies with National Health and Medical Research Council recommendations. Residents may notice a chlorine odour in their water over the next few weeks. This may be exacerbated by the presence in the water mains of silt and other organic matter from the old creek supplies. The mains will be progressively plushed out to remove this material which should result in a gradual reduction in chlorine taste and odour. Continued next page

At the workshop will be the meeting of five Tasmanians who travelled to Adelaide to see the team for their "4 F dis-ease" treatment. Until recently we had never even spoken to each other. Now we come to meet and greet.

A National Health Care Complaints Conference in Hobart recently heard that "older people were far less likely to complain or question the standard of health treatment they received" — Eve Lamb in the Mercury 12.3.99 " The fear of repercussions coupled with a great degree of respect for the medical profession often meant older Australians did not report shoddy treatment," she wrote.

Well, I'm not complaining, to the contrary I'm very grateful. But I have decided to grow old disgracefully and with the help of my old runner shoestring I've begun to organise this workshop.

The hope is that surgeons, medical and radiation oncologists, G,P's, Physios and O.T's as well as all those at risk of lymphoedema and those already with it come to St Marys for the workshop to raise our voices loudly and clearly so strategies can be put in place to ensure future generations do not suffer from this debilitating problem.

Avoca Fire and Ambulance Station Opened

The new collocated Fire and Ambulance Station in Avoca has been officially opened by the Labor Member for Lyons, Ken Bacon.

The station, upgraded at a cost of \$60,000, is manned by volunteers with backup from neighbouring districts' fire and ambulance services.

Mr Bacon said the collocated emergency services were definitely a win-win arrangement for the delivery of efficient, quality services for Avoca residents and those of the surrounding Fingal Valley areas.

He said under the constant pressure to constrain budgets to levels taxpayers could afford, it was logical and effective use of resources to bring together the expertise of fire and ambulance services.

"The extension and upgrade has enabled one ambulance vehicle and two fire fighting vehicles to be accommodated.

"The collocation has also enabled the services to share training and recreation facilities and ideas, and to work together in a team environment.

"It is absolute commonsense that the two services co-operate in planning, communication, and where relevant in shared assets to improve total cost and service effectiveness.

The station, which operates on a 24-hour basis, is staffed by 24 volunteers.

LISTENING TO BABIES

From the very first days after birth, baby will be listening to you and will soon be smiling and cooing. That's your baby talking to you. Crying is also a very important part of your baby's language.

Some tips to remember:

- ≈ Crying is perfectly normal behaviour.
- In the first few months of life a baby spends about
 2 hours in every 24 hour period crying.
- ≈ Crying can be nature's way of making sure the baby's needs are met. It is meant to be a sound that parents cannot ignore.
- ≈ Things will get better !!

Useful tips for coping with crying:

- ≈ Rock baby in a cradle or pram.
- ≈ Walk up and down with baby.
- ≈ Sing or talk to baby.
- ≈ Play soft music.
- ≈ Carry your baby in a sling.
- ≈ Try a car ride it can work like magic.
- Cuddle baby if you can relax, this is the best comfort baby can have.
- ≈ Feed, change nappy, check comfort.
- ≈ Try a dummy.

REMEMBER— Most parents feel angry with their children at some time.

LISTEN TO YOURSELF

- ≈ Take a break when you can.



ANOTHER SLAP IN THE FACE FOR COUNTRY STUDENTS AND PARENTS

Parents with students at Orana Hostel were shocked to receive a call from "District Office", not "Newstead College" on Thursday afternoon in order to be told that Orana Hostel was closing at Easter. Parents who decided to send their children to Orana did so for specific and very good reasons.

They were no doubt under the impression that the Hostel would remain open for the whole of 1999. However, this was obviously not to be the case.

The previous Liberal Government was determined to privatize student accommodation and our present Labor Government has done absolutely nothing to prevent this happening. Basically country parents now have no choice of accommodation for their children.

If they go to Launceston for year 11/12, it's Clarence House or nothing. We have an 11/12 system in this state which is unlike any other state in Australia. We have large colleges - all city based - to cater for the needs of all. However, there is obviously one huge problem, Tasmania is very rural and many students must leave home at sixteen in order to attend these colleges.

Do governments or our city counterparts think for one moment that country parents want to lose their children at sixteen? Do they really think that we want to be unsure about who is looking after them, what rules apply and who is keeping an eye on our children?

If we are going to be treated in this manner, it is about time we saw a year 11/12 complex developed on the coast between St Helens and St Marys to cater for our children. A combined complex would allow our children to come together to form large enough classes to make pre-tertiary subjects viable. It would also allow our children to remain at home under the care of their parents until 18 years of age.

It's time we asked for a better deal for our children. A 'one stop' accommodation complex is simply not good enough.

All parents, relations and friends are most welcome to come along. Rev. Cliff Walker of the Uniting Church will be taking the Service.


SPORTS PREPARATION
