6am May 22nd and Jeff describes what's happening at his "ranch" up North.

"Three feral sows, 2 white and 1 black, and six small slips were nosing up Perch Cresent (Jeff's street) from the Ord River. The only concerned resident was a young agile wallaby that seemed alarmed at these weird animals. They sniffed at the sugar mill trash that I have spread over my vegie garden plot, then they headed back to have a feed of lily roots at the river.


On my first exploring walk along the river bank early yesterday morning I came across an extremely professionly made marijuana cage but of course no plants. Then talking to my neighbours I learnt of my total ignorance - it's a feral pig trap, so they urged me to go to the melon farm and load up the trap with melons and bingo - pork in abundance.!!

Around the trees and wild sorgham grass, were about 6 to 8 Coucal Pheasant flapping about. They are very floppy fliers and quite large. One of the locals has one coming up to his verandah to feed on meat scraps. Likewise the agile wallabies are fed and are tame and some are fed on dog pellets. The dogs have given up trying to catch them as they are the size of our grey Bennets wallabies but slimmer and faster. They have lovely lush grass under the mango tree orchards which are watered every day.

All the locals have pumps just below me on the Ord River, mostly electric and water pressure watering system. My system is slightly primitive as I have to walk 200 yards and fire up my fire pump to water all my trees and get a little green grass around the place ready for the flood of Tasmanian Tourists who may make it. ??

Up the road is a huge paddock of zucchinis which is irrigated every night by a central pivot spray and every morning backpackers are out picking the tiny zucchinis with the flowers still on them to be flown direct to Perth on the afternoon Ansett flight. It's trendy to eat zucchini with the flowers, so they say, so get with it.!! "

Gary Dakin hoped that some readers may be able to help him with some of the names and dates that he has researched so far.

Since the last article, we have learnt that Murray Berwick was omitted as one of the Managers at the Cheese Factory in Gardiners Creek Road St Marys.

Murray first worked at the cheese factory when he left school in 1950 and stayed there for 3 years before going to work in the mines. In 1962 Murray went back to the cheese factory when Horace Davern was Manager. When H. Davern retired Murray continued as Manager until the factory closed in 1969.

At that same time Bruce Nailer worked in the cheese factory and Geoff King drove the cheese truck, and you might well remember hearing Geoff whistling as he drove past, he always whistled when driving the cheese truck.

100 Years St Marys Businesses 1860 — 1960

Recalling more of the businesses as they once were:

The current Post Office covers the site of two houses both of which were used for business, the first was the Sweet Shop of Mrs M.Lutwyche which she organised from her front room. The second was the Fruit Shop of Mrs Rilat 1930, A Lucadou-Wells had a Dental Surgery there in 1931, R.C.Studt Electrical Repairs 1947, L.Tapp Bootmaker 1949.

The Supermarket has been a store since J.S.Cramp's General Store in 1882, H.C.Dawborn took over in 1928, records show M.E.Watts in control in 1946 with Dawborn back in 1951.

The Bank building next door has the new branch of The Launceston Bank for Savings built in 1954. Then the Health and Beauty shop site has an interesting history. The earliest I can substantiate was A.V.Doyle, Baker in 1893, J.Madden, Baker 1905, H.G.Williams, Baker 1913, Mrs E.Cooke, Fruitier 1918, E.Chapman, Baker 1923, R.Warren, Chemist 1929, C.P.Roots, Chemist 1929, G.Dineen, Chemist 1934, E.J.West, Chemist 1936, E.J.Hocking, Chemist 1939, K.R.Forsyth, Chemist 1948.

The two story building next door has always been

a Bootmaker with Jim Smith Snr. in 1892, Jack Smith in 1924, the senior boosted earnings by cutting hair and shaving, the junior Mr Smith, by operating a Taxi Service. Next door was Bookmaker shop of Jim Smith Junior. The corner shop was Butcher Shop of Jim Smith Junior 1927, A.Dawson 1941.

Around the corner in Story Street on right hand side was the Cake Shop of the Miss Bullock's in 1934, prior to that it was Bullock and Aulicks Butcher 1925, J.Smith Butcher 1930, Hayes Bros Butcher 1932.

The Service Station site (now Auto Electrical) was possibly a Blacksmith Shop G.Mitchell, a Garage Hindle & Co 1930, Kalbfel 1932, J.Sweet 1948, J.McGee 1956.

Next was a Fish and Chip shop of T.Lohrey. Then we have a Blacksmith Shop site. The Blacksmiths were A.Thomas 1920, before they moved out to Gray Road where he was followed in the business by his son H.E.Thomas.

W.Eade 1925, then G.Conella traded on this site. Then a private home site next, then a Saddler J.Clarke 1881, J.Cramp 1883, L.G.Schier 1885, R.Breadon 1933.

Somewhere in the last few sites as recorded in the 'Examiner' to be opposite the Methodist Church in Dec.1893 was a J.De Fries Jeweller and Russell who had a Drapery business.

As I said, the Thomas's Blacksmith was in Gray Road on the left past the school. A little further on the right hand side C.W.Royle conducted his Undertaking business.

Now back to Story Street. Around the corner turning left into Groom Street on the left nearly to the corner was one of the very earliest business sites, W.Lade started business here in 1864 with a General Store. At this point I will attempt to explain a General Store as they operated in the early days, they sold all manner of goods, eg. food, clothing, footwear, hardware, drapery, agriculture requisites, stock food, bicycles, firearms, tools and many other lines plus they always traded by buying agricultrural products, animal skins etc. Some transactions were cash, some were traded for goods, some towards monies owed.In lots of cases shopkeepers had liens on customers properties which in some cases they needed to exercise to obtain satisfaction.

All for now, more next time.

"I hope members of Parliament, especially the Government, will take notice of this petition because it does clearly show that people are unhappy about their hospital being replaced."







"At the last election, the Government said it wouldn't sell it. The only course of action the Government can take is to go to an election and seek that mandate."


