St Marys and surrounding districts are soon to be provided with a permanent doctor.

Doctor Shah's immigration papers have finally been endorsed and he and his family will be arriving from South Africa in the very near future. The community is indebted to Doctor Ian Naidoo who has been working very hard, along with John Brown and Len Miles to procure this doctor for St Marys.

More good news.

The main street of St Marys became the centre stage for camera crews and the familiar entourage of advertising signs atop cars as the Labor contingent moved into town. Labor Leader Jim Bacon, along with other party candidates visited St Marys on Tuesday. Those who attended the public meeting were expecting a statement by Mr Bacon of his plans for the St Marys Health Centre.

St Marys Hospital Support Association members were requested to attend the meeting. Jim Bacon made a commitment if elected, quote " to immediately install a 24 hour 7 day a week operation at St Marys"

This would be a partnership with the State Government, the Community and a non profit organisation. Mr Bacon is positive we can achieve what we need and want said Mrs Hendley.

Mr Bacon did say the only thing yet to be worked out was how the reopening would he achieved.

OnLine Access Centre to open this month

Within the next three weeks, the St Marys Library building will be open 6 days a week, providing free public access to 5 computers, free connection to the Internet and free E Mail facilities.

The President of the St Marys Association for Community Development (SMACD), Mark Bonnitcha, has received confirmation that the Association's application to co-ordinate and develop an OnLine Access Centre at St Marys has been approved and funding made available. The State Library is facilitator for the development, and the Centre will be located in the Library building in Main Street.

....to establish an Internet Café agement Group is Mark and to provide adequate Bonnitcha, Bob Cook, workspace for community Marjorie Kanagaratram, groups to operate within the Michelle Domanska, Peter Centre.....

The Access Centre Man-Witton, David Clement and Neal Butterworth. Follow-

ing advertisements in recent weeks and interviews held last week, Fiona Hope and Greg Cruse have been appointed as Co-ordinators for the Centre to manage day-to day operations, and to provide assistance and training to users.

The Centre will initially be open for 18 hours a week, on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday evening and Saturday. The operation of the Centre and the Library will be kept completely separate — when the Library is open the Centre is closed and vice versa.

The opening hours may be adjusted once the Centre has been running for some weeks, if it is felt necessary, but initially hours will be Tuesday 11am - 2pm. Thursday 9.30 - 12.30 and 1pm - 4pm. Friday 6pm - 9pm and Saturday 9.30 -12.30 and 1pm - 4pm.

Computers, printers and scanners are already in place in the Library just waiting for the final cabling to go "live". In the meantime the Library's two public

access computers are of course away and running and being used extensively for

Internet searching by patrons. It is anticipated that cabling of the Centre's three computers will occur before 18th August, and the Centre is provisionally scheduled for opening on

Tuesday 25th August.

The "Tasmanian Communities OnLine" project is assisted by the Commonwealth Departof Communications and 'Networking the Nation" programme, supported by the Tasmanian Government.

A major objective of the Centre Management Group over the next 12 months is to obtain funds to extend the Library building to allow the OnLine Access Centre to continue to cosite with the Library but in it's own space, to establish an Internet Café, and to provide adequate workspace for community groups to operate within the Centre on a permanent basis using the online facilities to develop their own interests and programmes.

Visiting the Fingal Forests

Mt Puzzler Forest Reserve (Meadstone Falls)

Access.

Turn south off the Esk Highway onto Valley Road 4km east of Fingal. Follow for 16km and turn right into MG 28 road and go 5km to the parking area.

The walk

The walk descends into a small gully before entering the forest. The rocky track then slowly descends through open forest to reach a point just above the St Pauls River. The track then sidles along above the river as it enters a steep gorge which dissects Mt Puzzler and Cut Off Hill.

At a point just downstream from the falls the track drops quite steeply to a viewing platform.

Here there are excellent views of the falls and downstream to Mt Misery.

Walking time: 1 - 1 ½ hours return.

Facilities: Nil

Tanya was asked how come she became a Trainer, "Glen McDonald was looking for more help and because I had certain certificates for my Ambulance work I thought I would give it a go if I could work it out with Ian and his ambulance roster" said Tanya.

Although her family comes first then her Ambulance roster next, she has been able to get to most games and give assistance to players when needed.

Heartstart Accreditation must be renewed every 12 months.

Tanya has recently gained training in a Salbutamol course which allows her to treat patients with asthma or breathing problems.

As you can see Tanya is kept very busy with her volunteer work but with football season over there should be a few free Saturdays coming up.

100 years of business in St Marys 1860 - 1960 by Gary Dakin.

This is the final chapter of Gary's notes on the history of early days of business in St Marys as far as he has been able to ascertain from all his avenues of research.

Thankyou Gary for allowing the Valley Voice to publish these which we know readers have enjoyed. Look forward to more articles from time to time. Ed.

Coachbuilding. In 1885 A.N.Wright built coaches, S.Birrell probably took over from him. R.Beddy built in town then moved to Gray in 1887, W.Boles in 1899. This was in Cameron Street. We had a Dental Mechanic, W.Temple in 1925, a Dentist, H.R.Warren 1926.

In the entertainment field we had R.Loves Assembly Rooms 1896, M.Coleman Billard Parlour 1902, a Skating Rink was built in 1888. These were before Todds Hall, round about this time too, dances were held in Napiers barn. This was when they had the shop so one can assume that it was behind or beside the shop. T.Parry and I.Harvey both were listed as operating fish shops.

A Jeweller, C.G.Goldsmith traded in 1915. A Chester the Photographer lived in Irishtown Road, but did he have a shop in town? Solicitors we had namely Evans(corner Clive and Main Street), Solomon and Weston, also Elliston.

In 1939 Bewglass Motors listed as a Motor Hire business.

Stores and Shops. Where I know what was sold I will say, otherwise it is assumed that they were general stores, W.Tapsall 1892, E.D.Newman 1902, Buckley's Coffee Palace 1890, 'Examiner' reports had him catering at functions. J.Brown Confectionary 1932, T.Goldsmith 1902, T.Butler 1918, T.Jackson 1874, T.Stanley 1878, W.C.Challender Draper 1913, W.Hawkes 1912, F.C.E.Button 1924, A.Armstrong Fruit/confectionary 1937, G.Mitchell 1860, D.Mitchell 1868, G.Mitchell 1875, J.Lohrey 1902.

A Millinary shop was built in 1887, where?.

F.Avery had stables in 1889, he was a noted coachdriver of the times. W.Duffy took over the stables in 1889. A separate stable was run by J,Maney 1893, J.Grant 1895, it closed down in 1896, where the stables were is unknown.

C.Anderson was another tailor in 1918.

In 1931 a Mrs Miller operated Tea rooms

Jeffs jottings

"Winter has arrived up here with temperatures down to 29° with a slight nip in the air.

lan Loane and family have arrived and their 10 day stay has been excellent as it has allowed me to check out Carlton Hill Station - one of Kerry Packers properties - a 2 million acre spread, 2,500 acres of irrigated luceana on the edge of the Ord River. Also visited the Wyndham Crocodile farm and Keep River National Park. Another day we went to the seed farms, paddocks and paddosks of black soil covered with crops not quite ready to harvest. There is plenty of work up here and there is an uninterrupted supply of packpackers who battle the monotonous work and heat for about \$10 an hour.

Come November and the temperature shoots up to 40°, things close down as the black soil becomes like glue.

Yesterday Ian and I went out to the Research Station to see an experimental plot of poppies from Tassie. Glaxo from Devonport are testing them out, a rather sorry sight the poppies are too, about knee high and coming to seed in three months. Things just bolt here and it looks like its too hot to get good germination.

It was strange stepping into the Government vehicle with spent shot gun cartridges all over the floor. The white cockatoos attack the grain crops and play havoc.

August 4 and my visitors have headed off to Darwin then will head south through Katherine, Alice, Coober Pedy and Adelaide before arriving home to cold Cooma near Canberra. The Loanes, 2 adults and 2 children, were travelling light, no 4 wheel drive, caravan or trailer - just a Commodore car and sleeping bags".

The Council could be forming a working party to assess options for the Conara Junction as a major "gateway" to the East Coast and Fingal Valley. The working party could consist of representatives from tourism, Chamber of Commerce, etc with the job of assessing options that could be available to direct and promote the area and it's qualities.

RAINWATER TANKS (pert 1)

In Australia, water is a valuable commodity. Rainwater can provide a renewable supply of natural, soft, clear and odourless water that can be used for a range of purposes including drinking, washing, bathing, laundry and gardening. In some areas it may represent the primary source of household water while in others it can supplement existing mains water supplies.

Water Quality

Rainwater collected in tanks generally contains few chemicals, however, there may be increased pollution by airborne contaminants in major urban centres and industrial areas. Collection of rainwater for human consumption (drinking & cooking) in areas affected by heavy traffic, industry, incinerators and smelters is not recommended. The microbiological quality of rainwater collected in domestic tanks may be lower than that of many mains water supplies, however, providing systems as well maintained the risk of harmful organisms being present is low.

Is The Water Safe To Drink?

Generally yes. Providing the rainwater is clear, has little teste or smell and is from a well maintained system it is probably safe and unlikely to cause any illness for most users.

For those who are immunocompromised such as the very young or very old, cancer patients, people with diabetes, organ transplants or those who are HIV positive, disinfecting the water before consumption should be considered. This can be achieved by heating and holding at a rolling boil for 1 minute or more.

STICKY DATE PUDDING

Serves 8

250g pitted dates, roughly chopped 11/2 cups water 11/2 tspns bicarbonate of soda 90g butter 1 cup castor sugar 3 eggs 134 cups self-raising flour ½ tspn ground mixed spice

Caramel Sauce

125g butter 2/3 cup brown sugar I cup cream

Preheat oven to 180 C. Grease a 6 cup pudding basin, line base with paper, grease paper. Combine dates and water in a medium saucepan, cover, bring to boil, reduce heat to low, cook (uncovered) for 5 mins or until dates have softened. Remove from heat, stir in bicarbonate of soda, cool. Cream butter & sugar in bowl with electric mixer until light and fluffy. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating to combine between additions. Transfer to a large bowl, fold in half sifted flour and mixed spice and half the date mixture, then fold in remaining flour and date mixture. Pour into prepared pudding basin, bake for 1 hr or until firm in the centre. Stand for 5 mins before turning out.Cut into wedges serve with caramel sauce.

For the sauce: Combine butter, sugar & cream in a saucepan, stir over heat until sugar has dissolved and mixture is simmering.

young people in our community are and for once and for all remember that you may come from a small community on the East Coast of Tasmania, but you can still make it to the top.












Believe It! St Marys Students Achieve!

After the Cross Country you may take your children home if you desire, but please inform their class teachers.




