School Industry links Demonstration Project

The East Coast regional development organisation, a volunteer committee, recently attracted a commonwealth grant to conduct a series of enterprise workshops at the St Marys and Winnaleah District High Schools.

In addition to these workshops St Marys has been chosen to host this years Small Business Careers Expo **'MORE THAN YOU THINK'** on October 15th 1998.

The workshops aim to promote a relevant and realistic approach to enterprise focussing on opportunities that are specific to our region and the current economic climate. As part of the school program the students accepted an invitation to form a youth expo committee and assist the reference group and project officer in the co-ordination of the Small Business Expo. In forming this partnership with students we aim to expose them to a project that will benefit their community and offer them an understanding of the benefits of community involvement. It is also an opportunity for them to develop skills in many different areas that will assist them when they leave school. It is an opportunity for us to work together and for the students to have a say in a project that may guide their future.

The Expo was hosted by Bicheno last year and proved to be a successful event for the East Coast and hinterland region. The exhibitors will be a combination of the local community, public and private sector. We have invited organisations that represent local industries, vocational educational bodies and representatives of local enterprise.

It will be a great chance for students and the community to come together to develop an understanding of the opportunities that are available to us and our region.

Letter to the Editor

Sir

Our Council is to be congratulated on providing the Minutes of its Meetings for public display in the Library at St Marys. It is one measure which helps the 'open government' process and keeps us informed, so that we may raise legitimate questions, if necessary.

For example, the Minutes of 10th August 1998 provoke some questions. Who, or what, is the Beacon Foundation? Why does Council provide \$20,000 in it's current Budget to fund the activities of this body? Why does Clr. Salter declare an interest in the Beacon Foundation and leave the meeting when it is discussed?

This group is asking Council for funds to dismantle the slaughter shed located at the entrance of the WTS (the 'tip') at Gray Rd. St Marys, to relocate the shed to a site somewhere else, and to build a natural stone barbeque next to the shed.

Council staff believe that the project will develop skills in splitting and erecting fencing and splittingshingles, and in the art of stonework, one that 'public benefit' will be received from dismantling and relocating the shed. Also that "the project has significant potential to be expanded and form a key component of the Foundations efforts in the Break O'Day area."

A consultant, a heritage consultant no less, is also involved, who advised that 'it may be an idea to create a video' of the dismantling and removal of the shed.

During the 14 minute discussion, Clr. Corby also suggested that designs and an artists impression be prepared.

Well, now we know, and can form some preliminary ideas.

I have one thought. Excluding water and sewerage rates, the average rate on a property in St Marys might be about \$400, which means that 50 property owners in St Marys pay their rates to provide \$20,000 for the Beacon Foundations projects.

What is the 'significant public benefit' we receive from dismantling a shed, making a video of it and building a barbeque?

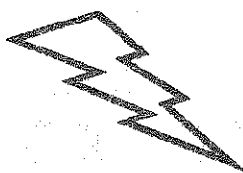

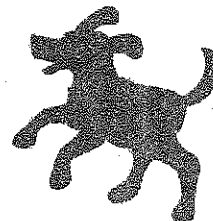

* A financial allocation has been made to help fund the inaugural St Helens Rotary Club's Regatta and Seafood Festival which is to be held in January 1999.

* The council agreed to subscribe for one year, to provide information to community groups, on various grants that may be available to them from time to time.

* Council confirmed its Tourism funding support to Gateway for 1998/99.

* Council did not support a substantial funding request from the St Helens Tourism Promotion Group.

* A Conara Junction Working Party is to be established by Council involving Tourism Chambers of Commerce with a brief to assess the options available to develop Conara Junction as the major Gateway to the East Coast and Fingal Valley.

* The Fingal Community Association is to develop a "Heritage Painting Competition" and apply for National Heritage Trust funding to assist in the "heritage-trail - historic walk" planned for the Fingal area.

* Council has agreed that a Special St Helens History Room Committee be assessed and this be investigated and reported back to council.

* A special by-law is to be drafted on a "Code of Conduct" for the use of the new Skate Park on the St Helens Foreshore.

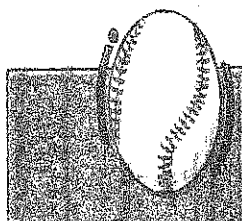

1 cup milk 1 cup canned tuna
1 cup grated parmesan cheese
1 teaspoon garlic granules
Fresh herbs (chopped to taste)
Capers - to taste (optional)
Dash of Tabasco sauce
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Sprinkle of sunflower seeds.

Beat eggs lightly in a large bowl,
then add milk. Tear the bread
into pieces add to bowl and leave
to soften for a few minutes.

Add the tuna, parmesan cheese,
garlic, herbs, capers, Tabasco
sauce and Worcestershire sauce.

Spoon mixture into buttered pie
dish and sprinkle with sunflower

Saving St Marys hospital

State Labor leader Jim Bacon gave a commitment while visiting the small East Coast community.

Mr Bacon told the St Marys District Hospital Association it was the first to blow the whistle in Tasmania on the decline of regional communities.

Mr Bacon announced that a Labor Government would immediately convene a meeting of local, State and Federal government representatives to find a way of restoring the St Marys Hospital to a 24 hour, seven day a week service. "We intend to include non profit organisations like St Lukes in the discussions."

We will convene a meeting immediately after the state election if we are fortunate enough to win Government. Mr Bacon said rural communities were more important in Tasmania because the State had the most decentralised population in Australia.

'All of our policies are aimed at reinvigorating rural communities. Our State Development strategy has a focus on industries that create regional employment particularly in the primary industry and tourism sectors. "We will also ensure that the decline of Government services in regional areas is stopped in its tracks and reversed.'
