



Local Government Development Program Report was received by Council and they agreed that the implementation process commence.







Ross Quinn very kindly offered to be the adult supervisor and provide the transport for the weekend. His involvement and support were much


This is the first time that St. Marys has sent a team to the Challenge and our students are to be congratulated for their enthusiasm and


