The Minutes of the Break O'Day Council Meeting 9 October 2000, show that \$110,000 has already been set aside in this years Budget for 'The St Helens Central Car Park Project', and that within 5 years Council will have the necessary total \$400,000 for the car park.

A construction levy was imposed upon St Marys residents to pay for the St Marys Sewerage Scheme. Why not install parking meters in St Helens to pay for their car park? Over 5 years, at \$1 per hour (less than a packet of chips), only 219 car parkings a day would be needed to pay for this Vision, without any need to raid the rate revenue. A few extra parks a day would pay for the meters and the meter maid, hey presto, a self financing project, generating local employment and demonstrating fiscal responsibility.

Otherwise, a \$400,000 car park seems a bit of a wank. D W Clement



Short stay in the jungle

It is time to leave behind the grand, early Spanish Colonial architecture of Lima and have a complete change for a few days, just a one and a half hour flight takes us from city to jungle.

Arriving at Peurto Maldonado, the day is very hot and humid now, this is a jungle frontier town and our driver and guide who meet us at the airport are friendly and efficient, there are smiling locals and plenty of three wheeled taxis, children walking or sitting sidesaddle on their father's motor-bike getting a ride to school, there is a slow pace around the town.

We are taken to the local trekking office to leave our main luggage and then take our smaller bags with us down to the river edge where a narrow 40 foot open launch is waiting to take us up the Madre de Dois and then the Tambopato River to the Explorer's Inn where we will be spending the next four days. The banks of the river are steep and rather muddy but our boatman soon has us all safely aboard and we begin the three hour cruise up river. The river is wide and in some places fast flowing, occasional rapids, tall dense vegetation with isolated thatched huts along the banks, children and cattle at the edge of the water.

We are glad of the canopy over the open boat as the sun is now beaming down but the breeze from the river and the spray that comes off the water makes it an enjoyable ride and we are all looking forward to our jungle retreat.

The thatched roofs, fly wire windows, long verandahs to look out onto the forest, comfortable beds

under mosquito netting, make up for the absence of hot water and electric light in our bungalows. A large separate kitchen, dining and recreation room are serviced with gas and solar power.

After lunch and a rest, our guide Hugo takes us to explore some of the nearby jungle and walk to a good vantage point to watch the sunset, it was then that we first smelt it. A horrible smell was coming from the bushes but the more we moved away the smell kept following us, 'don't worry' said Hugo 'that is only Stinky'. Stinky is a wild pig who had wandered into the Inn one day and made himself a permanent guest. From then on we would try to sneak off without him, as he followed everyone around like a pet puppy would. Next day we were up and having breakfast at 6am ready for an eleven kilometre trek through the jungle. We carried a good supply of water as the day would be hot even though we would be under the canopy of the trees for much of the time. The morning trek was rewarded when we came to a beautiful lake, so after lunch we took to the water in canoes which had been kept hidden in the dense undergrowth. Some of the braver ones went swimming but the rest of us were content to cool off by just trailing hands and feet in the water.

Time to get back on the track for home, along the way we saw a group of Red Howler monkeys high up in the trees, beautiful butterflies of all colours and a variety of native flowers and plants.

Short stay in the jungle continued

We were all glad to have the late afternoon free to just sit around and relax on the bungalow verandahs watching colourful Macaws, small deer, a baby pig (not Stinky), and a large group of acrobatic Tamarin monkeys that came to play in the trees beside us.

Our group were getting to know each other by now, there were two from Toronto Canada and the rest of us were from all around Australia, most had done a lot of travelling and were very interesting companions. There was a dentist and a lawyer amongst the twelve and we hoped that we would not need the services of either.

Evenings were spent watching the fireflies and the monkeys, then having a late meal and these were very good considering the isolation of the Explorers Inn, later on we went out on the river spotlighting for Cayman - these are South American crocodiles and their numbers are dwindling. There was also a lot of other strange scampering animals along the river banks at night.

One morning we went to visit a community and their school on the other side of the river. We walked through jungle size orchards of mangoes, bananas, oranges and other exotic fruits, then came to the clearing of the school. Our visit coincided with a visit from the community doctor, nurse and dentist and the children and people from the village were treated at the school. The children were delightful and when we gave them gifts of paper, pencils, little koalas, tennis balls and frisbees they were very excited and we played a game of cricket together for some time.

The morning we were to leave the jungle we needed to be up, packed, have breakfast and down at the boat ready to leave at 4.30 am, the early departure was necessary as there was the three hour trip down river again and we had to be at the airport for a 9am flight. It was an unforgettable experience, being on one of the rivers of the great Amazon waterway, gliding along in the dark, silent morning, no one spoke much and I think we were all feeling the same awe of being here in this remote place.

Daylight and we are back in Peurto Maldonado where we collected our stored baggage then off to the airport. This is another leg of our trip over and now we are about to move on to the section where we will find out how we cope with the high altitude and prepare for the five day trek at even higher altitudes. Greens pick up Labor's Chemical Trespass Bill

Green Party Agriculture spokesperson Ian Ewen-Street said he was dismayed to learn last night that Labor had withdrawn their Chemical Trespass Bill, but the Greens have immediately adopted the Bill as their own.

The Bill makes it an offence to drift pesticides on to a neighbours property without consent. It has been supported by Labor for over four years but after finally winning the ballot it was withdrawn before the first reading debate. The Bill will now be in the name of Ian Ewan-Street.

"The Greens have had a very keen interest in this bill for a long time now" said Mr Ewan-Street. "There are thousands of people who are sick from spray drift and who have no legal address."

"Pesticides use poses very serious risks to people's health as well as the ecological stability of New Zealand. Residues from the more than 3,000 tonnes of pesticides sprayed onto our crops each year currently contaminate our streams, lakes, waterways, marine environment and our own human beings," he said.

"Just recently compensation was turned down in a case of chemical trespass which seriously damaged the health of a man on a neighbouring property. The whole area of chemical trespass clearly needs some scrutiny and people need some protection."

The World Health Organisation report a wide variety of known health effects, both chronic and acute, from exposure to pesticides including cancer, immune system damage, damage to the reproductive system and birth defects.

"The Government has announced yet another 'working group' into spray drift. If it produces satisfactory legislation before this Bill is drawn from the ballot we will be happy to defer to that" said Mr Ewan-Street.

"In the meantime we will be backing this bill regardless of who it embarrasses"
