New Mayor and new faces in council

The October council elections created a little more than normal interest with several new candidates nominating and for the first time electors were able to elect their Mayor. Break O'Day Council was one of the municipalities with the higher percentage of electors recording their vote.

Cr Stephen Salter received a convincing win both as councillor and to be elected Mayor, defeating Robert Legge who had held the position since the amalgamation of the Fingal and Portland Municipalities and the mayor was then elected by fellow councillors. Margaret Osborne was elected unopposed as Deputy Mayor. Other successful candidates are Bill Daly of Akaroa, John Le Fevre of St Helens, John McGiveron of St Marys and Henry Holder of Fingal. John Tucker failed to regain his seat after 15 years on council.

Cusco a wonderful city

The moment we met Pepe we knew that he would be a great chap to have for our Guide for the next two weeks. Pepe Lucho Corpancho - 'just call me Pepe' met us as we got off the plane at Cusco, he soon had our group, our names and our luggage all sorted out and onto the Tambo Tours bus to take us to the Hotel Los Apus.

There was a wonderful feel about Cusco from the first glimpse of the city from the plane, the soft colours of the terracotta and adobe buildings all set in a basin with the surrounding hills looking down. The very narrow cobbled streets caused a bit of a problem with our bus being unable to turn at the hotel so Pepe ran up to the top end of our street and stopped all the traffic while the driver did a hair-raising job of backing up the narrow street and even avoided running over people and food stalls in the process.

It was only a matter of minutes before we became aware of the heaviness in our legs and the breathlessness after taking just a few steps. Cusco is at 11,200ft and would be where we spend the next few days for acclimatisation before the trekking to higher altitude.

We had a short briefing session then a few hours rest, it was stressed to us that we rest, walk slowly, drink water until you think you can drink no more and then start drinking again - these are the basic ways to help acclimatisation. We would also drink coca tea and have high carbohydrate meals whenever possible. Our hotel had wonderful views over the city, especially from the open breakfast room on top, but for the first couple of days we were almost

too puffed out to eat by the time we climbed the steps up to it !!.

The large open Central Plaza in the city has grand cathedrals and museums along two sides of the square and on the other two a huge variety of shops and restaurants behind the arched facades.

Cusco a wonderful city continued

That night we walked slowly down town to have dinner at the upstairs Tumi Restaurant which looked out over the beautifully lit up Plaza, not only was the food wonderful but the Andean band added to the excitement of the place with their music and the dancers in traditional national dress. Walking slowly back to our hotel was quite an effort, not because of our great night out but from the lack of oxygen in the air.

After a leisurely start the next morning, we went out to explore Cusco, narrow alleyways, crafts on sale along footpaths, women and children in colourful dress, young persistent shoe shine boys, young boys insisting you buy their post cards, chefs outside their premises coaxing you inside and all this alongside architecturally extravagant colonial churches and palaces. Cusco, once the capital of the extensive Inca empire, has seen many changes since the Spanish invasion in 1533. We visited the huge ruins site at Sacsayhuaman, spectacularly set above the city.

The young boys were very enterprising, they were outside our hotel one morning selling post-cards of Peru with our photos on them! Evidently the photos had been taken as we arrived at the airport the day before and these had been made into instant postcards ready to sell to us as we emerged from our hotel and of course most of us bought one - have to give them top marks for their initiative.

Most Saturdays there is a festival held in the Central Plaza and we were lucky enough to be there for the Festival of Children. Hundreds of school children from the very young up to colleges were marching and dancing with their bands and all dressed in their very best and most colourful costumes. The parade and entertainment went on for hours and included police and military bands and many floats, certainly great to watch. There were just so many things to see and do in and around Cusco that it was very hard to remember to rest, and all the wonderful food was a great temptation. I had intended to be brave and try some Cuy (guinea pig) which is real Peruvian food and supposed to taste like chicken if you didn't think too much about it!! Not sure if I am sorry but did not find it on the menu - perhaps I ate at the wrong (or right) places.

We soon became at ease with the altitude and as the time for our trek up the Inca Trail got closer, the excitement but also some anxiousness could be felt within our group, we were all unsure of how well we would cope. Having spoken to trekkers who had recently completed the five day hike, they all spoke of the terrible difficulty of Day 2 and how they thought they would never make it - and these were young fit looking people - this certainly gave us more to think about!

Came the day when we were each issued with sleeping bag, thick down jacket and duffle bag and knew that this was it. We were to pack all our gear for the next five days into the duffle bag, it really took a series of eliminations to end up with essentials only.

A bus took us into the Sacred Valley of the Incas, through Chinchero at 12,300 ft, superb views out to the towering snowy mountains of the Andes. We travelled along the beautiful valley of the Urubambo River, visiting ancient fortresses and temple ruins along the way, and having lunch in a garden restaurant then to the Hotel St Augustine for the last night of comfort before the nights in tents up in the mountains.




Does more money breed better politicians? Current discussion on parliamentary salaries once again; leads to considerable: comment from those for and against. The main criticism of those against simply state that because politicians don't, necessarily have to have any recognized qualifications they are, in fact being paid adequately or more than they are worth already. / But have are This also applies when the amount of hours politicians are required to work, is compared with other professions of similiar value. All of which is, to say the least, a very. vague sizing up of the situation. To start with, there is no really valid, comparative, profession nor; is t ere any real way the worth of a politician can; be: measured. And again, the number of hours can, because of the essence of politics, vary dramatically, depending on the individuals dedication to his job. Nor can one dispute the talents a good politician has to develop to remain a politician has to develop to remain a politician; talents that are equal to the qualifications of any profession. On the other hand, the main reason for increasing salaries seems to be that this is necessary to insure a continuing or increasing standard of politician. This also is a very vague and doubtful stardard. One could just as easily say it might further entice the opportunist to seek a good, cushy, well-paid bludge. Perhaps it is time we looked at something more exact in an endeavour to upgrade the standard of the candidate for election. For instance, the scrapping of the alphabetical system of listing candidates names that gives not so good Abel an unfair advantage over zealous Zorba. Again the completely irrational set-up of our own Wilmot electorate that stretches through half an island, gives distinct advantage to the candidate with the most

Miami Park

This is a delightful picnic area set amongst white gums on the banks of Miami Dam, only 11km from Fingal. The dam was built around the turn of the century (not the last turn!), to serve the Miami Gold Mine. The mine is situated on the hill south of the park and the tunnel entrance can be reached by a short walk through the plantation. Gold bearing ore was transported by tram to an area near the dam where it was crushed and the gold recovered in a sluicing operation.

Tailings and sand can still be seen opposite the park. The overflow channel, hewn from solid rock can be seen on the northern side of the dam. Parking areas, picnic tables, barbecues and toilet facilities are provided.

Mathinna Falls A spectacular four tier waterfall is the focal point of this 280 hectare reserve. A 15 - 20 minute walk along a well graded track leads to the base of the falls. Many of the native plants are labelled along the way, the vegetation changing from dry sclerophyll to myrtle forest near the falls. For those fit people wanting an extra challenge, a rough, steep scramble can be made to the upper falls. The effort is well rewarded with great views of water cascading over vertical drops in a rugged, confined gorge. To get there, follow the signs from Mathinna.


