West Wing demolished

A little bit of history gives way to allow for a contemporary facility which will take our delivery of health services well into the future. On Monday 6 November 2000 personnel from Stubbs Constructions of Burnie arrived on site at the St Marys Community Health Centre, the objective is to build a facility which will encompass:

- 24 hour inpatient beds x 4
- G.P Surgeries x 2
- an Accident, Emergency & Treatment room
- an Xray processing room
- Administration rooms & associated offices
 All this is to be achieved with as little interrup-

tion to the Centre activities as possible. This building has been designed by the Launce-

ston Architects ARTAS.

Next after some preliminary preparation comes

the demolition crew. 'Phil' is in charge, ably supported by Des I'm sure and wow - once they start it's hey lads hey!. Despite the inclement weather the demolition crew have been forging ahead with removing the West Wing.

This part of our unit was the original St Marys District Hospital built in 1927 and the Maternity unit in 1963.

I walked around the site on Friday to take a few photos, I had an umbrella in the left hand and

Grant for test transmission

Mr Denys Walters, Chairman of the steering committee working to establish an F.M. Radio Station for the East Coast, shows his delight and a cheque for the amount of \$5000 given as an incentive grant to the project. Scott Marshall of 'Rostrevor' Fingal, and Director of The Tasmanian Community Foundation, was extremely supportive of our cause said Mr Walters and for his major role in the distribution of grants the committee proffers heartfelt thanks.

Gratitude also must be given to Steven Walley who submitted the application, the Break O'Day Enterprise Centre under whose umbrella the (as yet) non-incorporated body is functioning with regard to finance, and the Break O'Day Council which has been most cooperative.

At present technically orientated members of the F.M. committee are preparing for a test transmission and this grant will be mainly utilized for costs incurred therein. At the successful conclusion of authorised testing, a public meeting will be called to elect office bearers and take the necessary steps to become an incorporated body. This should occur early in the new year.

Given recent rains we are expecting quite a serious fire season. Residents are reminded that the burning of material should only be undertaken when it is safe, there is a water supply available, it is not in a fire permit period, the material is dry, it is in small heaps and you do not cause a nuisance to neighbours.

The Inca Trail

I know this part of my adventure is going to be hard to put into words, nothing I write can fully describe the beauty and the wonder of walking the ancient Inca Trail, the feelings and difficulty and then the exhilaration of achievement when arriving at Machu Picchu one of the truly amazing wonders of the world.

Hats, boots and packs and a good supply of bottled water, nuts and nibbles and we were ready to start walking. Most of the treks start at 'km 88' but Pepe wanted us to do an extra twelve k's and we started at 'km 76' - he must have thought we were a fit looking lot!

The first half hour was a sharp steep hike up to the track which we would follow high above the Urubamba River. The views were wonderful, looking down into the valley with farms along the river and the adobe homes of the farmers, but also up to the distant peaks of the Andes.

The day was hot and the walking we knew was easy-going compared to what was ahead of us. We stopped for a breather at an impressive home being built around a huge rock and with fantastic views, belonging to one of Pepe's many friends who was building a retreat for trekkers. Pepe had been a guide for twelve years and he had friends everywhere we went and they all greeted him with hugs and much laughter, obviously a very popular man and we were very lucky to have him with us.

We kept climbing until we came to a grassy clearing and set out in the middle of nowhere was our lunch, table, stools, a bowl of hot water for a wash, meats, cheeses, salads, breads and a big kettle of hot tea. The porters had gone ahead and prepared the meal for us, we would grow to have great

admiration for these men, happy, smiling, hard working and able to cook up the most wonderful meals each evening when we arrived at camp.

After an hours rest we started back on the well defined track climbing all the time but went down lower to our first campsite at Patallacta 9,000', set below an ancient Inca City built on a series of terraces. Sleeping at a lower altitude each night would help with being able to cope with the high altitude during the day.

Our tents were all set up as well as the kitchen and dining room tent and in the background were the two 'little red tents' which were a most essential part of our tent city! Again hot water for a wash and plenty of hot tea, milo, coffee and biscuits. At this spot on the trail you could decide if you wanted to opt out of the trek and take the train to Aguas Calientes near Machu Picchu, stay in a hotel and wait for the rest of the group to arrive.

Dinner that night was a real treat - soup, chicken, pasta and vegetables and a sweet that no one was real sure what it was, the cooks did a terrific job. Next morning woken at 6.30am with a hot cup of tea and a dish of hot water, we snuggled in our sleeping bags enjoying the hot drink before venturing out. After a generous breakfast and all packed up ready to move again, two of our group decided to take the hike through the forest with a porter to the train and spend the next few days at Aguas Calientes instead of continuing with the hiking and camping.

This is now the dreaded 'Day 2' of the trek, we climb and climb often through very steep cloud






forest, the moisture from the clouds encouraging the growth of beautiful hanging moss on the very old trees. Most of the 'Royal Highway' is stone paved, with steep steps, in some places almost vertical, then again steep drops on the other side, built by the Incas more than 500 years ago.

The day was very hard, three of the group were really struggling and well behind all day, but that did not matter as a porter with the first aid box was always at the back with the slowest walker.

I found I was coping well with the hard work of the steep climbing and was able to enjoy the wonderful views around me and marvel at where I was and what I was doing.

At the end of the days walking we arrived at the campsite Lulluchapampa -12,400', tents already pitched and hot drinks and water waiting for us. We were being well looked after by our guide Pepe, the cooks and porters. I am quite sure I could not have enjoyed it if I had been carrying my own tent, gear and food, to say nothing of all the drinking water which was being boiled at each camp.

The second night in the tent was oh so cold, I wore hat, scarf and gloves to bed and used the bottles of boiled water to keep my feet warm. We were really up in the mountains and next morning there was frost on our tents and a nearby lake was frozen over - it was very cold and the hot tea and warm water was very welcome, but we sure soon warmed up when we started walking again.

From our campsite we looked up to the track winding up and up and up and other walkers looking like ants in the distance. That morning we had to climb to the first pass, a 'brisk' two hour hike up to the Inca Trail's highest pass, Warmihuañusca at 13,700 feet. The climbing was mostly very steep stone steps. After a rest and time to take in the spectacular views at the top of the pass, we dropped very steeply down into the Pacamayo Valley where we stopped for a well earned lunch and rest before continuing on to the small but impressively set ruins at Runkuraqay and on to our next camp at Cochapata set just below the second pass at 12,800'.

In spite of the hard days of extremely steep climbing and descending, the tiredness seemed to disappear when we were all into camp, those of us arriving first would always give great encouragement to those who found the going hardest. Our group had become very supportive to each

other and strong friendships were forming as we shared the same experiences. The two Canadians, Will and Margaret, Sandra a young woman from Sydney and myself had become good friends.

The evenings were spent in the dining tent with candles after dinner, just chatting, writing up diaries and playing word games and this was one of the nice times of the day. If Pepe thought we had been good we could have some wine with our meal - of course he was always pleased with us! He was great fun and good company and always encouraging to the ones who found the days extra hard.

One night my tent was set right on the edge of our campsite with sheer drops down into a valley and towering snow capped mountains above, what a view from the front door. We found that the early morning trips down to the 'little red tents' was quite an effort, after lying at rest for the night and then getting up to walk down to and back up from them would leave us quite breathless for a short while.

Next time: Two more days on the trail before we arrive at Machu Picchu. Audrey

State Conference Delegate Report

The Tasmanian Health Auxiliaries Annual Conference was held on the 31st October to the 1st November at the Launceston General Hospital. Pam Jones and I attended as the delegates on behalf of St Marys. Each auxiliary was asked to give a short report on their progress for the past year but as the St Marys Hospital Auxiliary has put our active fundraising in abeyance until our hospital reopens next year, my speech covered our towns overall issues.

I have the utmost respect for the hard work that has been put in by the people of this community, without their input and perseverance our hospital would not have the chance of being reopened with promise of better things to come and, in keeping with progress (something the older and younger generations cannot escape from), new and better things to look forward to.

Other issues were the loss and urgent recruitment of a much needed GP for St Marys, (if we want a doctor we have to stand up and be counted not just leave it to the few on your behalf), the Lymphoedema Centre and our community in general. Most of the 84 people attending who represented 34 auxiliaries were unaware of our immediate problems and were totally supportive, with the State Health Auxiliary Executive voting to write letters to the State Medical authorities on our behalf for the doctor situation and State and Federal authorities to have our Lymphoedema / Laser treatment recognised as a true form of medical benefit to patients. The replies of which we await with interest.

Guest speakers were Dr Peter Renshaw Director of Medical Services, LGH Management, Director of Nursing, and Judith Walker Associate Professor of the University Division Rural Health, who are pushing for nurse 'on the job' training to be brought back into the hospital system, benefiting overworked nurses, understaffing problems, patient interaction and reinforcing practical knowledge needed for patient care.

Something of concern that was to come from each delegate was the lack of response to calls for new membership within the communities. If you have just one hour to spare each month for a meeting and some-





½ cup glazed cherries

½ cup raisens

½ cup mixed peel

½ cup sultanas

1/4 cup toasted almonds

1 tspn cinnamon

1 tspn nutmeg

1 dspn mixed spice

1 tbspn rum/brandy or Grand Marnier

1 dspn cocoa

1 tbspn hot water

4 egg whites

1 cup icing sugar

750ml cream

METHOD:

Chop fruit finely and marinade in liquer overnight, with the spices. Add almonds.

Blend cocoa and hot water. Beat egg whites and ½ icing sugar until stiff.

Beat cream and other 1/2 of sugar.

Fold together cream and egg white mixtures, then mix in the fruit.

Lastly swirl through the chocolate.

Line individual or large mould with foil, fill with mixture and freeze until solid.

Boil Water Advice to St Marys Residents

The Break O'Day Council wishes to advise St Marys residents that due to supply problems and suspected vandalism to the St Marys Water Treatment Plant, water will be intermittently supplied from Richardsons Creek.

The Richardsons Creek supply will be chlorinated however until bacteriological tests confirm water quality, residents should boil all drinking water for a period of 3 minutes. This supply may also be discoloured.
