Small Business Incubators - Can they work on the East Coast?

Small business incubators have been described in the recent Price Waterhouse Cooper national review for the Commonwealth Government as 'a facility designed to assist new and growing businesses to become established and profitable by providing premises, advice services and support'

'Incubator tenants are provided with an initial place of operation and a supportive environment in which to grow their business. The incubation period is normally three or more years, during which the fledging business becomes established before graduating into the wider business community' the report says.

'The primary objective of a small business incubator is to foster self-employment, business enterprise and accelerate business growth; reduce the failure rate of new start-up businesses; and assist business to operate, graduate and create jobs and wealth.'

Neil Butterworth of the BEC said 'There is no single model for incubators, they need to be tailored to the practical needs of an area or region. In this instance the Break O'Day Business Enterprise Centre and the St Marys Online Access Centre propose to research the need in this region for a small business incubator.'

'Commonwealth Government funding is available for such projects on a competitive basis throughout Australia. The BEC and the St Marys Online are seeking expressions of interest from local and 'would-be' enterprises. If you operate from a home base or you have a good idea and want to become a self-employed business operator, then we want you to contact us - either by telephone 6376 2044 or by mail to PO Box 228 St Helens or Greg Cruse at St Marys Online 6372 2005, Mr Butterworth said.

'An incubator requires tenants to still pay a commercial rent for the business space, however tenants receive free business assistance, and initial

set-up costs and management are minimal as the incubator provides telephone, telephone answering, secretarial, bookkeeping and reception services on a shared cost basis. The value of networking with other small business enterprises in the same incubator is regarded highly beneficial. Tenants are not expected to enter into long and binding rental agreements - a license agreement specially prepared for incubator tenants, is all that is required' said Mr Butterworth.

'You may reside anywhere in the Break O'Day Municipality - we need to know your needs. If we can attract sufficient interest - a funding application can be submitted in February 2001'



If this was not enough then you could always do as we did and phone the Council and ask for yourselves as the then Mayor, Mr Legge pointed out to those who gathered at a meeting prior to Dr Shah's departure. The old 'ask and you shall be told'.

Part of applying for a position is the fact that most people for their own reasons do not want it around that they have indeed applied. We were asked to keep this confidence and we did so with respect. Some are saying that Pravesh spoke about the fact himself, that was his to do, not ours.

We have all suffered for the want of a doctor, we have one now and not only that but one we know and are looking forward to having back. Prayesh had to reapply for this position, go through all the interviews etc. he did not simply walk through the door.

School/Community Pool







More tramping the Inca trail


It has been another cold night but the hot pancakes with bananas and lime juice, toast, jams and hot drinks for breakfast soon had us ready to move on again. Another pass to tackle, just a short hike up to this second pass, Runkuraqcasa a mere 13,000 feet!!

- we then descend to the large ruins of Sayacmarca and on to the last pass at 12,450 feet.

Most of us were by now wishing that despite the demanding climbing, that our trek could go on for much longer instead of only two more days.

On reaching the top of the pass and a short spell and photos, we tackle the very steep descent. From here we get great views down into the forested gorge of the Urubamba River set more than a vertical mile below. This day has certainly been easier and we had walked through some beautiful cloud forests and more of the impressive moss covered trees that line the stone paved tracks, through a rock tunnel and along a good track but with a sheer drop down to the left. We had reached our lunchtime site early and even though it was only 11.30 am we decided to eat, a pasta and vegetable dish, olives, cheeses, fruit and flat breads all waiting for us. Not much chance of us losing weight with all the strenuous hiking while we were being fed so well.

The afternoon took on a more relaxed atmosphere as the track got easier and the campsite for the night was not far away, then to our stunning campsite so

aptly named the 'City of the Clouds'. Our tents appeared to be set up on top of the world amongst the majestic cloud wisped peaks.

It was always good to shed our day packs each evening, as they had almost become a part of us like a snail's shell. Hot cups of tea, a chance to wash our feet and change boots for a while, write up diaries, then time to explore around us before dark and the evening meal. This would be our last tent meal together on the trail, for the next day we would arrive at Machu Piechu. The meal was good and plentiful and once again with a 'strange' desert, but the cooks were obviously trying hard to serve up a complete meal for us gringos. While we were in the dining tent there would be a 'tent guard' on patrol out in the dark to make sure there were no unwelcome 'visitors' prowling around. At some campsites there would be other groups camping as well as ourselves. We all readily agreed to throw in tips for the

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cooks and porters who would depart in the morning after breakfast. By the time we came out of the dining tent to head back to our beds for the night, we had a job to find our way, the cloud was so low and thick and it was interesting to listen to others as they stumbled finding their way to those 'little red tents'.

During the night thunder was heard rumbling through the mountains and we all hoped that there would not be rain on our last day. So far we had not needed the wet weather gear that we carried in our packs.

Climbing out of tents in the morning we were greeted with thick cloud swirling around our campsite and were told not to wander too far away because of the step drops around us. After breakfast we went outside to thank and say goodbye to our group of porters who were lined up and looked impressive with their bright red woven ponchos and their dark sun browned smiling faces. They were tough hard working men, most of them having small farm holdings and the money earned from these treks was a bonus to help their families.


By the time we were ready to depart there was a very fine rain falling, but it was so humid that I soon chose to shed the rain gear. The porters raced downhill past us with huge packs on their backs and only open sandals on their feet. Their trek work was finished when they delivered the gear to the train at Aguas Calientes, the station at the foot of Machu Picchu and at the rate they were moving they would be there many hours before the rest of us.

This morning we walked through some beautiful slender bamboo forests, and along the track saw many flowers, proteas, orchids, impatiens, lupins, geraniums just a few. The misty rain had gone and the day now warm and clear, still more climbing just when we thought it was all behind us. The tracks were well preserved with great white granite slab walls and staircases all impressively set in high jungle. On the way we explored the recently cleared extensive ruins of Wiñay Wayna We would soon arrive at Punku the 'Gateway to the Sun' from where we would get our first sighting of the lost city of the Incas - Machu Picchu.

So much for the Gateway to the Sun, just as we climbed the last steep steps up to it, down came the rain. It was so heavy that we could barely distinguish the truly lost city below us! The track down to Machu Picchu was lined with beautiful orchids and in spite of the soggy boots and pack it was an awe inspiring occasion as we walked into the wondrous place.

We had the following day free to return to the Lost City so decided that going down to the hotel with hot showers and dry clothes sounded the best option.

Aguas Calientes means 'hot springs' and these were close to the quaint little town nestled at the foot of the towering mountains with the fast flowing Urubamba river running along side. This town with the railway running through it's centre was a colourful hive of activity with tourists and locals and shopping galore. There was even an Australian flag flying above a recently unveiled bronze sculpture in the town plaza, the last thing we expected to see deep in the mountains of Peru.

The Sculptor who had created the bronze story of the Inca civilization was Andrew Rogers from Melbourne and the local authorities had done us proud with Advance Australia Fair and the Flag even if something did not quite look right with it perhaps it had an extra star and was only printed on one side but we thought it was a terrific effort on their part.

That evening we dressed up a little and went down town to a outdoor restaurant and were all hungry for some different food after our days on the trail. An Andean band came along and played to us while we dined in the warm evening, there was a wonderful feeling of achievement amongst us now that we had completed and survived the Inca Trail and Pepe made sure we all had some 'Pisco Sour' to celebrate.

I had rung home earlier in the evening to share my excitement and let them know that I had indeed made it! That night I found it hard to sleep, was it the roar of the flooded Urubamba River or was it the disbelief of being at Machu Picchu on the other side of the world. Next morning we would go back up the mountain and spend the day there with a local guide who would tell us the history of this ancient city, but for now I would just relive the past few days in this amazing country with such wonderful people and spectacular scenery. The club will be providing some refreshments (beer and wine). This function will include the presentation of the Night Roster prizes.



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
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

Background to the Celebration

Jeanette Schier (nee Stuart 1825 - 1897) who is buried in an unmarked grave near the old cemetery at Falmouth, was born in Scotland. In 1854 at Collingwood Victoria, she married Ludwig Schier (1830 - 1865) who had been born in Hamburg Germany in 1830 and had arrived in Australia the previous year. Ludwig was a builder and contractor and also an undertaker. Jeanette and Ludwig's only surviving child Ludwig Gilbert Stuart Shier (1857- 1934) was born at Campbell's Creek near Castlemaine in Victoria. When Ludwig died in 1865, Jeanette remarried

a Mr Lewis, hence the name 'Grandma Lewis'.

Ludwig Gilbert Stuart became a saddler before marrying Mary Winstanley in 1877. He came to the east coast of Tasmania in the 1880's where he was joined by his mother. He lived at Fingal where he was a police constable and at St Helens where he was a saddler before settling at St Marys where he was proprietor of the St Marys Hotel and established a successful saddlery business.

Ludwig and Mary's children were: (these dates and spellings need to be checked.)

- Minna Winstanley (1878 -1966) married William Walker.
- Mary Jeanetta (1880 -1967) married Alexander McMurray
- Clara Isabel (1882 -1978) married Sydney Targett
- Barbara Louisa (1885 -1979) married George William Walker
- Ludwig Selwyn (1888 -1961) married Beatrice King and Edith Hughes
- William August (1891 -1971) married Lily May Munday
- Bessie Vera (1895 -1911)
- Effie Ella 91895 -1986) married Percy Lawrence Lohrey
- Elsie Eva (1899 -1911)

Ludwig Selwyn (Ludie) and Edith Hughes, a descendent of John Allen a pioneer farmer who settled near Bicheno in the 1820's, had only one son, Louis Gilbert Schier (1923-1999). Ludie, Edith and Gilbert lived at Gray until 1939 when they moved to St Marys where Gilbert worked as a mechanic.

Gilbert married Jean Connelley and settled at Falmouth near to the old cemetery where Jeanette Stuart Flint Schier Lewis had been buried. They had 6 children- Michael Gilbert 1947, David Leslie 1948, Valerie Jean 1950, John Selwyn 1952, Murray Louis 1957 and Robert Scott 1961.

On the anniversary of his great grandmother's death in 1997, Gilbert Schier had planned to erect a plaque in her memory on the humble, stone ringed grave but was unable to complete this task.

In his memory and in the memory of Jeanette and Ludwig Schier, from whom 5 generations are now descended, we will gather at Falmouth on 7 January 2001 to honour Jeanette and Gilbert, talk about our heritage, meet again with family, friends and distant relatives, yarn and keep alive the stories.
