'Fenceliners' visit St Marys too

The Fenceliners rode into St Helens last Friday - twenty-five 'moderately fit' breast cancer survivors who are cycling around Tasmania and spent the night at the St Helens Caravan Park.

The women involved in this national group, formally known as 'Following the fenceline', aim to raise awareness of breast cancer research. In 1996 they organised 'Changing Gears', rode 17,000 kms over 58 days on their motorbike adventure. Five of the breast cancer survivors completed the whole trip and some had even had to learn how to ride a motorbike before they could set out.! Their average age was 52. They gained much publicity and raised \$12,000.

The second adventure in 1998 saw them paddling 1000 kms down the Murray River in canoes, 34 days later they had raised \$20,000.

By yesterday evening in St Helens they had reached \$4,000 - great that they were given such a good reception by the St Helens Lions Club who hosted them for a wonderful evening indeed.

The highlight of the afternoon and evening for me was meeting up with Maxine Barker from Port Lincoln South Australia. Maxine was instrumental in the fund raising and buying of a 3B low level therapeutic scanning Laser, like ours, for the Port Lincoln Hospital.

It was great fun, exchanging experiences, ideas and showing off the Laser, the Health Centre and St Marys.

Hope to keep in touch with them to compare notes and exchange research information.

We wish them the best of luck for the remainder of the ride and a safe trip home, wherever that might be as they came from all states.

FRIENDS OF VALLEY RAIL REPORT-PROJECT OBJECTIVE

1.0 Introduction

The Fingal Valley (St.Marys, Fingal, Cornwall, and Mathinna) has a population of approximately 1000 residents. Industry in the area is primarily rural and mining. Coal mining in past years provided the majority of employment but through the preference of other fuel resources, mining has seen a steady decline and the future of mining in the area is limited.

Farming and other rural activities have also seen decline through fluctuating world prices. Farming has not provided many employment opportunities in recent years. The population of the Valley will erode and continue to erode further unless a project is developed that will stop the economic decline.

To address the decline and restore some prosperity, economic and employment opportunities, the Steering Committee needs to develop a strategy with priorities for the re establishment of tourism interests in the area. The Fingal Valley is the gateway to Tasmania's East Coast. The Tasmanian Visitor Survey 1999 records that some 128,000 to 171,000 tourist visit the eastcoast towns of St Helens and Bicheno.

The Steering Committee of the Friends of Valley Rail recognizes that tourism is today's largest employer and the importance of presenting and attracting greater visitor numbers to the area.

2.0 Objectives

To prepare a report that identifies the priorities and strategic requirements of the Valley by:

- 1. Defining the valley's current and future tourism values to local, interstate and international visitors.
- 2. Evaluating the potential tourism benefits by re establishing a rail link between Launceston and Fingal (stage 1) and Fingal to St Marys (stage 2).
- 3. Assessing the possibility of additional transport services (bus from Fingal to other towns) and the rail link becoming a regular multi daily service from Launceston.
- 4. Promoting and educating the entire community on tourism needs i.e. customer service, hospitality, signage, townscape, attractions, entertainment, accommodation etc.
- 5. Obtain Council assistance with townscape, signage and in-kind support.
- 6. Collate relevant project costs and investigate the level of government funding available to complete the project.
- 7. Establishing milestones for project completion.

3.0 Items to consider for Action-not in priority order

- 1. Partner to operate the rail service from Launceston (i.e. Don River Railway)
- 2. Partner to operate other transport services to other towns from Fingal.
- 3. Evaluate the tourism potential (existing and future possibilities)

4.0 Promote and identify all tourism attractions in area. Such as:

- Mining tours
- ♦ Walking tracks to North/South Sister, Limestone Caves, Patricks Head, Indigenous sites, Grassy Bottom site, Arboretum, Waterfalls, Bird Sanctuary and a 'Devil's restaurant'.
- Sporting packages including accommodation
- 5.0 Educate the community through a training program in tourism needs including an awareness/compliance to extended trading hours to service visitors.
- 6.0 Encourage support for the St Marys' museum and the collection of relics for curating by the University of Tasmania.
- 7.0 Refurbishing the St Marys and Fingal Railway Stations (Heritage Listed).
- 8.0 Secure a Tourism "I" facility as an information distribution centre manned by volunteers continuously.

9.0 Ongoing media updates to keep community advised in progress.

This draft report is subject to an acceptance in principle by the Community of the Valley. Without acceptance the project cannot proceed. The Steering Committee asks you to respond with any constructive comments in favour or against the project by phoning Bob Hersey 63722 783 or Fax 63722990 prior to 31/3/01.

St Marys Police Report

No significant issues have arisen in the past two weeks in the St Marys and Scamander areas. However, minor issues continue to be a problem. Drunkenness, loutish, swearing and noisy behaviour in the streets is not tolerated by the community, and will be acted upon by police.
