Police report: Community can help

A couple of issues have come to light in the last two weeks. Firstly on the 19th March attempted damage was caused at the Waterworks in Cameron St. St Marys. The damage may have resulted in the works becoming non-operational, affecting the entire community. Three days later damage was caused to an air vent at the rear of the On line Centre, the vent was pulled from the wall and entry was not gained. Also on the same date an anonymous report was received that the remains of drug usage was found in a vacant shed/garage. Amongst the rubbish left behind was evidence to suggest the person or persons responsible for trespassing and using drugs.

A report was also received during the period that some fire damage was caused at the school swimming pool. Enquiries are currently being made in relation to the mentioned reports.

It is apparent that damage is a problem, particularly in the past two weeks. To alleviate the problem, people need to report what they see, who they see, where they see it and at what time it is occurring. The community can help to police itself by following these simple steps. It should be made aware that vacant sheds/garages/houses are being used for drugs, squatting and drinking by youths. Damage problems in the town emanate from this type of behaviour, therefore people should make the effort to check that their dwellings are not being used for such purposes. It may also be your child that is involved in such behaviour.

Isn't it funny how one thing will make you recall something else quite vividly.

As this Valley Voice goes out, our school's Annual School Fair is about to happen and no doubt it is going to be a special event once again after all the effort that has gone into organising it. The school excels at these things and it is an event looked forward to each year.

Which brings back memories to this former student of a special event in our Primary years and one particular year that stood out in the early 70's.

For weeks and weeks Mr Williams, Mrs Berwick, Mr Camplin, Mrs Saunders, Mrs Binns and Mrs Lodge would coach us in the finer points of the Waltz, Foxtrot, Progressive Barn Dance, the Twist, the Submarine and everyone's favourite, the Pride of Erin.

Remember the opposite sex was yuck and not to be got too close to unless so ordered, although very different a few short years later, so dance classes were to be dreaded. The real fun was trying to keep the costumes a secret so as not to give anyone any ideas in case it jeopardized the originality. However you always seemed to have heaps of dragons, astronauts, ballerinas, queens, witches, police, firemen, doctors, soldiers, nurses, Frankensteins, daleks (aka Dr Who), fairies, kangaroos - the list goes on.

The particular Fancy Dress Ball I recall above all others had little to do with the costumes and dancing but a unique meteorological occurrence that has never happened again in St Marys, especially to the extent of that time. It was not rain or wind that late winter day. It was snow and lots of it.

As I recall it started snowing early in the day and it just kept snowing and by home time it was thick on the ground. All us kids wanted to do was to get out in it, throw snowballs and build snowmen, but that night we had to get ready for the school ball and ended up having a good time.

I can honestly remember the next day, a Saturday, and nowhere much could you see the snow, it had disappeared as quickly as it had come.

I wonder if anyone else can remember that time and if they can, perhaps they could pen a few lines for the Valley Voice.

I am certain it has never snowed here like that since but maybe it did before then. I'd love to know how unique that day in the early 70's was, but it is still a great memory to me.





Break O'Day Council Keeping the Community Informed

The Town of Trees - St Marys:

The Council agreed that further quotes should be obtained for the purchase of advanced Pin Oaks and Poplars to create an avenue of trees on the northern side of the Esk Highway approach from Fingal.

St Helens Waterfront Development Plan: The St Helens Waterfront Development Plan was received by Council as a guiding document for the future long term development of this unique part of St Helens.

Illegal Building Works: The Council discussed the issue that illegal works do not only involve physical construction but includes the use of garages/sheds as 'shacks' or temporary dwellings. It would be noted that it is illegal to inhabit a building not built as a dwelling without a certificate of occupancy. The Council is to adopt a policy of issuing Notices of Illegal Works where such changes are made without Council approval.

Break O'Day Arts and Culture Steering Commit-

tee: The Council accepted several nominations from the Community to form the committee which was a Community Plan strategy to highlight and develop new arts and cultural events over the whole of Break O'Day.

Municipal and Settlement Entrance Signage: The entrances to the municipality and settlements are to receive an upgrade in the form of standardised graphics to promote the whole of Break O'Day through the entrance and settlement signs.

Television Black Spots Program: The Council agreed to engage a technician to develop an expression of interest for the coverage of SBS in areas of Break O'Day. The expression of interest is only to advise the costs of installation required and the future running costs of this service which has to be borne by the whole community.

Website: Break O'Day Council: The Council is on the Web! www.bodc.tas.gov.au The site is still in final development stages and Council meeting agendas and minutes are available. Have a visit and surf around Corporate Services, Works, Development Services and Community Development as well.

Break O'Day Council is eligible for Federal Govern-

New Capital Works and Maintenance Pro-

ment funds under the Roads to Recovery Program recently announced (approx. \$1.6m over four years). The following projects have been approved as our initial program for this financial year. Subsequent years will be developed as the project progresses.

- St Columba Falls Road (upgrade and bitumen seal). We will commence upgrading the existing surface with the aim of sealing the gravel section within two to three years.
- 2 Gardens Road (upgrade and bitumen seal) We will commence upgrading the gravel section from Seatons Cove, north to the Gardens with the aim of sealing approximately 5 kms within two years.
- Scamander Avenue (kerb, channel and seal 3 works) We will complete the kerbing from Byatt Court to Pelican Sands, tidy up drainage work and seal the shoulder from Wrinklers to Pelican Sands, works will be completed this calendar year - 2001.
- Mathinna Road (reseal several sections). We will be undertaking a major reseal project on this road to do approximately 7 kms in sections between Mathinna and Fingal, a small reseal will be done at the same time on Mathinna Plains Road.
- Forest Lodge Road (reseal). A short reseal will be done on the first section of bitumen in the vicinity of Oldhams Dairy.

WORKS: Binalong Bay Bridge: We will be placing additional decking over the existing planking on the Binalong Bay Bridge over the Georges River to overcome lifting planks. This project will commence in approximately one week's time. Traffic lights will be operating during working hours, please take care as the works will take several days.

Roadside Slashing: Slashing will continue on several roads in the Break O'Day Municipality. Please take care and observe all directional signage.


Sports Centre News
