Dr Who comes to St Marys?

The construction of the TARDIS * at the corner of Main and Story Streets St Marys, has been a focus of interest within the town over past weeks, generating reaction such as 'awesome' 'amazing' 'serious' and drawing comparisons with the Pyramids and Stonehenge.

Speculation as to its purpose has encluded an observatory, maypole for the Grassy Bottom Arts Spring Festival, pissoir, a focal point for magnetic fields, and a hotdog and lottery ticket kiosk. It is actually a tourist information bay, a joint project of the Commonwealth Government, the Break O'Day Council and the St Marys Town. Theme Committee, not quite as exotic as other options perhaps but it does attract funding.

About thirty people attended the Dawn Service which was conducted by Peter Rubenach.



Information Kiosk continued from front page

Why so big in St Marys when the other kiosks are more like small mushrooms? Because of the site: the obvious site for the kiosk in St Marys was at the junction of the three tourist roads into the town. However this location is identified by the St Marys Townscape Project (1995) as a site of 'primary significance' in the town, and the Break O'Day Planning Scheme 1996 requires that any development of the streetscape recognises the values identified by the project.

Accordingly the Committee recommended to Council that additional funds from their Reserve Account be added to the Commonwealth funding to ensure that development of the site conformed to those values and objectives. The additional cost excluding graphics was estimated at \$8,000.

The Streetscape Project identified the corner as a very significant site of primary importance, which requires a building to repair the streetscape, to infill an unsightly building gap, to enhance the function as a regional link and important townscape focus, and to provide a 'sense of place'. The report specified that any development needs to compliment surrounding buildings, to anticipate corner modification for a roundabout, and, above all 'not to settle for less than the roof'. The high pitched roof was required so as not to be squashed by the surrounding buildings, to be of significance in its own right as an addition to the town streetscape, and to reflect the dominance of Paddy's Head. Subsequent research into photographs of early St Marys also shows the the original building on this site, Alf Dawson's butchers shop, had an almost identically pitched roof to the new building, so that the design restores an original streetscape.

A key element of the Streetscape Project Report, which embodied input from over 200 residents at several workshop sessions, was that St Marys should develop a 'sense of place'.

The design of the TARDIS together with the signage on the four facia boards, St Marys 1857 (when the town was surveyed and named), St Patricks Head 1773 (when it was named), St Marys Pass 1842 - 1845 (when it was built), Elephant Pass 1888 (when it was first blazed), should make a significant contribution to our 'sense of place'.

The site will be completed with lighting, seats, murals, a tree and improved footpath paving.

Break O'Day Council Keeping the Community Informed

Student participation at Council meetings

The Mayor and Councillors welcomed senior students from St Helens and St Marys District High Schools. The students will be encouraged to raise issues and ask questions regarding debate.

Council Support application for Incorporation

The Council approved the payment for Incorporation of the Break O'Day Health Resource Association. The Association has been working hard to secure funding for additional health resources for the whole of the Break O'Day area.

Youth Issues

The Council will request the State Government to provide appropriate resources to meet the needs of youth in Break O'Day that have been identified from previous studies, when the key issues of the Partnership Agreement discussions are held.

Marine Pumpout Facility - St Helens Foreshore

The Break O'Day Council has been successful in obtaining funding of \$35,800 from the Natural Heritage Trust towards the establishment of this facility. Council to negitiate with the Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol on management of the facility.

WORKS

Tip Maintenance - St Marys

Council have had funds in the budget for some time to erect gates and litter fencing at the tip. This work has commenced with the gates being erected.

Water Meters - St Marys

Work is nearly completed on installing water meters, we will then commence trial readings and advise residents of their usage patterns, this will occur twice before December 30th.

Full details of the charging regime will be sent to users later in the year after the budget is set, experience from St Helens shows that average users will find little difference in their total costs. The initial charges will be set on an excess usage basis.









