## Fiery Celebrations

Most people recognise the 21st of June as the shortest day, but it is doubtful if the Winter Solstice has ever been celebrated in such a spectacular manner as it was in St Marys on Wednesday night.

The parade of thirty lanterns was the culmination of a series of workshops held during the school holidays to create the lanterns. A wonderful variety of shapes and sizes appeared,



Sun, Moon, Earth and Stars, fish, flowers, hearts and many other designs were made with cane frames, covered with paper then decorated. The parade wound around the centre of town then moved onto the grassy

area kindly made available by the Faulkner family.

The Fire Dragon which was designed and constructed by Eo Greenstick and her helpers was carried by the five brave dragon bearers, Vicki, Julie, Adele, Gary and Kenneth who held the fiery dragon aloft as the flames licked around the hoops.

A special performance for the St Marys Winter Solstice Celebrations was a display of fire dancing and juggling and a poetry reading by Ellie Tea Tree. More about Ellie and her beautiful poem can be read further on in the paper.

The large crowd that turned out on the evening were very appreciative of the effort that had been put in to this, the first Celebration of this kind.

The festival was co-ordinated by members of the recently formed Grassy Bottom Arts Group who are also bringing many other events to the town.

Following on from the Solstice Celebrations, a night of music was held in Todd's Hall featuring Bo Jenkins as well as local musicians.

The weather did the right thing, no wind, no rain and nice and crisp winter solstice evening.

A great night for everyone and hopefully one which may become an annual event in St Marys.

## Ellie breathes fire

To be a 'fire breather' would not be most peoples choice, but it has been for Ellie Tea Tree. Ellie has lived near St Marys for four and a half years and before that had at one stage lived in South Australia where she joined the Earth Circus as the female Fire Breather as well as using fire staff and clubs, juggling and dancing.

Ellie learnt fire breathing from a fellow performer for a play about a clown for the Fringe Festival and Wednesday night was the first for a long time that she had done any fire breathing.

It was a special 'one off' just for St Marys and the Solstice celebration, also as it is the Year of the Dragon

The Fire represents the Sun and on the longest night in ancient rituals the Fire draws back the Sun in hope of the lights return.

Ellie said that fire breathing is exceptionally dangerous and as with any use of fire it is dependant on the wind and safety awareness is most important.

While living in Victoria, Ellie worked in theatre in fire performances and with Yob Krewe performed at Scamander on the last two Tasmania Days.

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## LEST WE FORGET 1914 - 1918

The Roll of Honour at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra shows names of 102,000 Australians who lost their lives in all conflicts in which Australia (or the founding colonies) has been engaged, from Sudan 1885 to Vietnam 1962 -72 and Peacekeeping Forces since 1973.

The Roll can be accessed online at [www.awm.gov.au](http://www.awm.gov.au), either at the St Marys Library or at the Online Access Centre or from our home computer if you are Internet connected.

If you know the name of the person you are searching, you can obtain a record showing some or all of Number, Rank, Unit, Conflict, Date Place and cause of Death, Memorial Panel Number, Cemetery details, Next of Kin, Place of Enlistment and Native Place. Relatives can apply to the War Memorial for more details.

The following list shows the names of 41 men who lost their lives while fighting in World War 1 obtained by searching the Roll by "place of enlistment" St Marys, Fingal, Cornwall, Mt Nicholas, Irishtown, Falmouth, Chain of Lagoons and Mangana. Some of the names may be of people who enlisted locally, but most are of local men.

## Break O'Day Council

### Keeping the Community informed

#### St Marys Town Theme Committee

The Council were advised that a project on the Western end of St Marys is to move to a formal stage and planning developed for the establishment of a Wetlands adjacent to the sewerage lagoons.

#### Road Maintenance

The Acting Works Manager presented a comprehensive report on the various maintenance aspects of the Ansons Bay Road, Mathinna Plains Rd, St Columba Falls Rd and Gardens Rd.

#### Service Agreement - Break O'Day Business Enterprise Centre

A service agreement has been approved between the Council and the Business Enterprise Centre covering Council representation, performance, reporting, financial assistance, formalising the link and assistance between the Council and the Business Enterprise Centre.

Break O'Day Community Plan Implementation procedure be undertaken and expressions of interest would be called in the near future to form a Community Reference Group.

#### Works Program : Capital Works

All unfinished jobs will be put on to maintenance program for the period due to weather uncertainty.

Minor projects at the Jason St Pump Station and the Water Treatment Plants at St Marys and St Helens will be completed.

The Telemetry System (Sewerage Pump Station Monitoring) will become fully operational.

Work will continue on our manhole and sewer rehabilitation, with particular emphasis on storm water infiltration.

#### Bridge Maintenance

Preliminary works will be carried out to replace a bridge on Grimstones Rd. Materials are currently being stockpiled to enable us to re-deck the Binnalong Bay Bridge and replace a span of the main bridge over the Upper Esk River near Mathinna later this year.

# Break O'Day Council

The article in The Valley and East Coast Voice (Vol 34 Issue 9, 9 June) critical of a clause in the Residential Development Code in the Break O'Day Planning Scheme is misleading in that it takes a single clause in isolation to other relevant clauses.

Careful reading of the Code shows a number of clauses are relevant to achieving a laudable aim of encouraging energy efficient building design. The principal means of achieving this outcome is to incorporate features which allow buildings to take advantage of free solar energy for space heating in the colder months of the year. Related to this approach is a sensible requirement to prevent uncomfortable over-heating by the sun during the summer months.

Basically the Code requirements to encourage solar heating in winter include the following:

- ♦ 70% of new lots in a sub-division must allow houses to be sited so that living rooms receive not less than 4 hours of sunshine between 9am and 3pm on the winter solstice, that is the shortest day of the year when the sun is at its lowest elevation, around 23° at noon.
- ♦ There are also requirements to ensure lots are not excessively shaded.
- ♦ Houses must be designed so that at least one main wall is north facing and windows in north walls take advantage of solar energy first by having access to solar energy in the winter and secondly by having large enough windows to capture the sunshine. North facing windows must have a total glazed area of not less than 5% of the dwelling floor area. For a house of, say, 15sq or 140m<sup>2</sup>, the north windows must be larger than 7m<sup>2</sup>. This is roughly equivalent to a floor to ceiling window 3m wide. Of course, a number of smaller windows would be equally acceptable.
- ♦ Buildings and landscaping are not allowed to overshadow the north walls and preventing capture of the solar energy, particularly through the north windows. Overshadowing can be caused by buildings and landscaping on adjacent building sites, particularly on the

northern boundary. In order to constrain overshadowing, the Code specifies any new building shall not shade the north walls of an adjacent building for more than 2 hours on any day.

The Code requires measures to prevent solar over-heating during summer:

- ♦ Houses shall be designed to ensure adequate shading of the north facing windows during the summer months so as to reduce overheating by solar energy. If sufficient shading is not available through absence of adequate eaves or shady pergola or other means, then the interior of the house is likely to overheat. Such a house can become uncomfortable, and possibly require artificial cooling by an energy consuming air-conditioner, which would defeat the purpose of using free winter solar heating. To define minimum shading requirements, the Code requires the north windows to be shaded from direct sunlight between 10am and 3pm on the summer solstice, when the sun is at an elevation of around 70° at noon. Typical floor to ceiling windows would require an eave of about 700mm. For windows with a sill 400mm above the floor, the eave would need to be about 550mm. For a 1.0m high sill, the eave need only be about 350mm.

As the path of the sun varies during each day, hour to hour and season to season, the Code sets requirements on specific "design" days, ie the winter and summer solstices. These merely define extreme limits. Other times and dates could have been chosen, eg. an equinox, but by using the solstices, the yearly pattern of the sun's radiation is more obvious. To achieve an optimum balance for the need for winter heating and to avoid summer overheating, properly proportioned north facing windows are essential. Of course, inappropriate large south facing windows will negate the benefit of north windows. Many aspects of the building fabric, design and siting will affect its thermal performance. The Code merely sets some minimum requirements that make good design possible. Energy efficient design should be encouraged to reduce energy needs and improve comfort. Solar energy is the cheapest energy available forever.

## **'I'VE TRODDEN IN IT'.....**

### **A Directory of St Marys street names.**

#### **1. Gardiners Creek Road**

'Having been much annoyed by a lessee of Crown Land adjoining my farm here, who seems to think he can cut up my marsh and make roads over it in any direction he thinks proper to convey the produce of his cultivated land to the New Road to the Coast, I shall be much obliged by you informing me whether the Government claim a right of road over my property from the land leased to J.B.Gardiner while there is Crown Land unoccupied over which a road may be had without at all interfering with my Property, and as it appears to me, quite as short or shorter than crossing over my land.'

This letter to the Surveyor General from Donald Cameron, owner of 'Londavra', dated 20th September 1849, was written 8 years before the town of St Marys was surveyed in 1857. While Cameron gave his name to Cameron Street in the new township, marking the western boundary of the town and the Londavra estate, J.B.Gardiner still annoys Cameron posthumously by having a road named after him which runs into Cameron Street.

As a matter of fact, the naming of this road is also a matter of annoyance to some current residents of Gardiners Creek Road, as until only some few years ago the road was referred to as 'Rosegarland Road', which it is felt is not only more appropriate but also is a more 'euphonious' appellation, to quote earlier correspondence in 1842 with regard to the replacement of the name 'Grassy Bottom' by 'St Marys'.

John Badcock Gardiner was born in Devon England in 1800 and married Esther Jarman at Beckleigh in 1823.

They were living in the Launceston area in 1838, as witnessed by the baptism of their son William Henry, and of daughter Virginia in 1843, but had moved to the Avoca district at least by 1846, and certainly to the (to be) St Marys district by 1848.

Gardiner obtained an 800 acre grant on the Macquarie River in 1823, and a further grant of 1200 acres in 1831. By 1844 he had moved to the Break O'Day Plains, gazetted as the Post Master at St Patricks Head District in 1844 and 1849 when the Post Office name changed to Cullenswood.

Census Return No 3 for Parish 11 of the Fingal District shows John Gardiner as renting property from the Crown on which stood a finished wooden dwelling, 'Break O'Day Lodge' inhabited by 10 people, 7 men and 3 women of whom 7 were free. So he was a fairly substantial settler, with a household of equivalent size to that of Thomas Ransom at Millbrook.

Nevertheless he was gone at the latest by 1858, when he is not mentioned in the first Valuation Roll of the Fingal District, and his death at age 65 is recorded back in Launceston in 1864, by coincidence the year in which the township of St Marys was proclaimed.

Gardiner would seem deserving of at least one street name, even if not at the expense of Rosegarland.

It is to be regretted that he has been emasculated at the junction with his old enemy Cameron Street which reads GARDNERS Creek Road, even though the Clive Street intersection correctly commemorates GARDINERS Creek Road.

We may be thankful a horticulturally inclined GARDENERS Creek Road does not appear at the junction with Hugh Street.
