The saga of Dr Who continues-

Dr Who and the TIBs

The TARDIS* at St Marys was subjected to a treacherous attack on the 26th April by the implacable enemy of Dr Who. Trees to enhance entrance to town

For the record, 29 Pin Oaks (Quercus Palustris) were recently planted as an entrance to St Marys, over a distance of 500m approaching the Railway Station. Council Reserves Foreman Scott Parks and Jason Lynch planted the trees on Tuesday April 10th and David and Jan Clement watered them in over the Easter weekend.

A tree was selected that met the following specifications:

- 1. deciduous, so that the road would not be shaded during winter months
- 2. acid loving, to match the soil type
- 3. able to stand water logging
- 4. long lived, to provide a long term return on investment
- 5. hardy, able to withstand wind, frost and drought
- 6. hardy, not susceptible to disease, insect, bird or animal attack
- 7. attractive foliage in spring and summer, significant autumn colouring and graceful architectural shape in winter
- 8. individual to St Marys i.e. different to other town entrances in the state.

The Pin Oak scored 8 out of 8.

Together with a new town entrance sign, it is hoped that the Drive will provide an improved sense of anticipation of a town of interest and character.

Building a better Ark —

or how the Government seems hell-bent on destroying the enterprising businessman

Anyone who has recently tried to open a new business or make changes to an established one will appreciate this story which was also published in the local government section of The Sunday Herald.

It is said that if we were to attempt to build the Snowy River Project today, it would be an impossibility. There is also someone else who might not nowadays be capable of achieving his goal.

And the Lord spoke to Noah and said: "In one year I am going to make it rain and cover the whole earth with water until all flesh is destroyed, but I want to save the righteous people and two of every living thing and remember it must be complete and everything aboard in one year".

Exactly one year to the day, fierce storm clouds covered the earth and all the seas were in tumult. The Lord saw that Noah was sitting in his yard weeping. "Noah, where is the ark," the Lord asked. "Lord, please forgive me," cried Noah. "I did my best, but there were problems. First I had to get a permit for construction and your plans did not meet the codes. So I had to hire a naval architect and redraw the plans.

"Then I got into a fight with the Occupational Health and Safety people over whether the ark needed a fire sprinkler system and flotation devices. WHAT'S IN A CIGARETTE.

Smoking is the major cause of heart and lung disease in Australia today. Tasmanian Parliament: An Overview

Parliament consists of three parts: the Crown, the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly. These three act together make State laws for Tasmania.

It is the task of Parliament to provide a forum for the people's elected representatives to debate the important issues of the day and make laws accordingly.

The Governor has an important formal role as part of the Parliament. He summons, prorogues and dissolves Parliament, on the advice of the Ministry. When summoning Parliament, the Governor makes a speech to all Members outlining the Government's legislative program for the forthcoming session. The Governor also acts on behalf of the monarch to give the Royal Assent to Bills passed by the House of Assembly and Legislative Council.

It is through Parliament and the free speech of its Members that matters of public concern can be raised.

History

Tasmania is the second oldest Australian settlement, having been established at Risdon Cove on the River Derwent by Lieutenant John Bowen in September 1803. Shortly after Hobart's settlement, Colonel William Patterson established a settlement on the Tamar River in the north of the island at the site which subsequently became Launceston. Until 1812 the colony was divided into two counties and administered separately from Sydney. In that year Colonel Thomas Davey was appointed the first Lieutenant Governor of the whole colony.

Van Diemen's Land, as it was then known, became a colony under its own administration on 3 December 1825. The colony was administered by the Lieut-Governor, Colonel (later Sir) George Arthur, and a Legislative Council of six members. In 1856, the name of the colony was changed to Tasmania. In the same year responsible government was established and the present bicameral Parliament met for the first time. The basic constitutional structure has remained the same since that time.

Currently 16 staff have volunteered to work in their own time to learn about Online Education, to develop courses for our students and to communicate with their peers about teaching ideas and practices.
