Credit Card Fraud

St Marys police reported that last week, on Monday 3rd September and on other occasions prior to this date, a male person described as being of Indian descent with a strong accent, about 165 cm tall, slim build, olive complexion, dark hair, very well dressed and driving a new Holden VT Commodore bronze in colour, was presenting businesses in our immediate area with a memorised credit card number and purchasing large sums of cigarettes, chips, drinks, motor oil and fuel. The credit number the suspect was using related to stolen credit card. The suspect did not have the card, but was simply presenting the number which he had memorised, and the transaction was being approved. In each of the instances, the suspect appeared genuine as he also presented a number of personal identification cards, of which were mostly in foreign text.

Constable Rockliffe reminded that, 'Credit cards can be a very dangerous tool (especially when our wives get hold of them!!), and people need to be reminded to keep them secure'.

In the case of theft of your card, be sure to have it cancelled immediately to prevent the above instance occurring. Business owners need to be reminded that they should only accept the credit card as an object rather than a memorised number. Insurance may not pay out in such a situation, however the bank will quite often charge a hefty fee for unsafe bank practices which will be far greater than the insurance payout.

What is this Lymphoedema that we hear about?

Lymphoedema is due to excessive fluid in the tissues which if not being drained off and filtered through the lymph nodes (glands in the groin, abdomen and armpits).

It is most commonly seen after surgery and radiation therapy in cancer of the breast, of the pelvic region, lymphomas, melanomas and accidents.

As this disease progresses the areas swell and become heavy. Movement becomes difficult, skin becomes taut and dry. Tissues harden, cutting off blood and oxygen which often leads to recurring infections requiring urgent medical treatment.

When Professor Neil Piller held his first workshop in St Marys he said "Lymphoedema is still a very significant problem in Australia with about 150,000 people with some form of lymphoedema currently. Most lymphoedemas originate from the necessary surgery and radiotherapy subsequent to cancer, and about 30% of all those who have surgery and radiotherapy get some form of lymphoedema. For many there is more than just the problem of the swelling—there can be a range of psychosocial issues.

"Dealing with lymphoedema then is more than just dealing with the swelling. There are aches and pains, tension heaviness, mobility problems, concern with appearance and a plethora of related psychosocial problems.

Because not all lymphoedemas appear immediately, in fact a recent report says the average onset time is 3.4 years, it means we all have time to work with the patient to try to reduce the risk. Education can greatly help here.

"There is an ongoing lack of knowledge of the problem of lymphoedema and minimal research funds directed towards its investigation. Patients must raise their political voice, their problems be heard and strategies put in place to ensure future generations do not suffer as the current ones have from this problem called lymphoedema."

The Tasmania Lymphoedem Centre at the St Marys Community Health Centre, conducts Laser and Massage Therapy treatment.

Professor Neil Piller will be visiting St Marys in early December for patient assessments.

Volunteer staff needed for community radio station

For the past twelve months or more, the Break O'Day Community Radio committee has been working to commence broadcasting to the municipality. Plans are well advanced and the radio station will have its call sign as 'BODFM' - the initials of our own municipality-Break O'Day.

Several funding grants have been received to allow the station to purchase equipment. This funding is limited and only designated for operating equipment. Skateboard Rules

On 1 July 2001 new laws came into effect that set out rules for skating on footpaths, roads and in other public places.

This is good news for people who enjoy skating and use it as a way of getting around. It means that everyone now knows where it's OK to skate. Skates will be able to share footpaths and some roads with other people, unless an area is clearly signed as a place where skating is not allowed. Skate smart and safe-check out the detail of the new rules.

Sharing the roads

In the interests of skater safety.

- You must not skate on any road at night.
- Do not skate on a road with a dividing line. median strip or on one way roads with more than one marked lane.
- · Do not skate on any road where the speed limit is greater than 60 km/h.
- Just like driving, you must skate as far to the left of the road as practicable.
- Do not be pulled along by a vehicle.
- On roads, skaters must give way to all vehicles
- If you are under 12 years old, you must not skate on any road.

Sharing the footpaths

If you are skating on the footpath:

- Do not skate in areas marked (by signs or by footpath markings) as No Go Zones.
- Do not skate alongside more than one other skater or pedestrian.
- Give way to all pedestrians.
- Pass people on the right, and only when there are no on-coming pedestrians.

Respect other footpath users - slow down when it is busy, or where there are young children, older people and people with disabilities.



Future program-waste management

Stieglitz Waste Collection

Council will be implementing a 'wheelie bin' service into Stieglitz in the near future following a decision made by Council during the August Council Meeting. The residents affected will receive full details in the mail shortly.

The initial collection service will take in the entire area from the Tasman Highway to Simeon Place which includes all of the area currently serviced by our rubbish collection service.

Binalong Bay Waste Collection

Planning is well advanced for the introduction of 'wheelie bins' into the general Binalong Bay area which will most likely take in the Gardens area and settlements in between as well.

The Waste Transfer Station will be changed to a local garden waste receiving depot only, with restricted hours which will be developed in consultation with the Binalong Bay community.

Changes to Council Tip Areas

Binalong Bay and Falmouth are currently Waste Transfer Stations, all non-household rubbish, building waste etc. should go to St Helens or Scamander tips. The continual misuse of these sites by some people is costing Council a considerable amount of money to address.

All contractors carrying out private contracts for clients must deliver the waste generated to designated areas or risk legal action under the 'Litter Act'

Tyres are not a permitted waste to drop in collection bins and must be sent to St Helens or Scamander tips or disposed of directly to a recognised recycling company.


The soccer lads
