Masseuse training

The TLC committee recognise the importance of ongoing training as can be seen with this present course, and are looking forward to the visit of Prof. Neil Pillar later in the year and the Convention which is being planned for next year.

The St Marys 'TARDIS' has been funded by a grant from the Commonwealth Government, and by the Break O'Day Council from the Reserve Account of the St Marys Town Theme Committee. It was designed by David Crockett from a brief provided by the Town Theme Committee, built by Glen Ihnens, Peter King and Bill Daly, lighting by Andrew Haas, signwriting by Stephen Baldock with construction coordinated by Russell Montgomery.

The Centre will be lit at night, providing increased safety at the junction corner and adding to the nighttime townscape.

Removal of the advertising signs and future developments to the site are due for discussion at the next meeting of the Town Theme Committee in June.

Significant dates: St Patricks Head 1773, St Marys Pass 1842 - 1845, St Marys 1857, Elephant Pass 1878 now appear on the building and the story of these significant dates can be read inside the paper.

Beware of cheques and chainsaws

This weeks St Marys police report:

It appears that a "Crime Ring" has developed in the St Marys area. This ring may involve between one and six people. Their main prerogative at present is obviously to commit crime, mainly involving the stealing of chainsaws.

In the last 4-6 weeks, four chainsaws have been stolen from the Four Mile Creek, Chain of Lagoons and St Marys area.

It is suspected that persons involved in these stealings are local. Persons from other areas may also be entering the town to assist in such stealings. Other crime which is being committed and that may be linked are, stealings from garages, sheds and the presenting of forged cheques to our local businesses. In relation to these cheques, business owners should only accept cheques from persons who are recognised and commonly present cheques. Any person making an attempt to present a forged cheque should be reported immediately.

Once again, please ensure that your property is securely locked away. In the event that your property is stolen, particularly chainsaws, it is advisable to immediately, write down the serial number for easy future identification.

Any suspicious activity or movements at any time of the day or night, particularly vehicles, should be noted and reported ASAP.

Time of Council Meeting: General discussion took place and finally Council decided to leave the meeting date as is, on the second Monday of every month commencing at 10.00am at the Council Offices at St Helens.

Community Mentoring Tasmania: Council has agreed to provide support to Mentoring Tasmania by providing interview rooms for them to seek appropriate mentors from a cross section of the Break O'Day community and develop a mentor resource base to support various community groups in the future.

Dog Management Policy: The Council has sought expressions of interest from residents of Break O'Day relating to the Policy. Submissions closes May 25 and a Policy will be considered regarding the management of dogs in the future.

The 'TARDIS'

Significant dates in the development of St Marys as the capital of the Break O'Day plains are being added to the Information Centre.

ST PATRICKS HEAD 1773 ST MARYS PASS 1842 - 1845 ST MARYS 1857 ELEPHANT PASS 1878

St Patricks Head 1773 commemorates the European naming of the mountain. Called 'Lumera Genena Wuggelina' (molar tooth) by aboriginal tribes of the region, it was given it's European name on St Patricks Day 1773 by Captain Tobias Furneaux as he sailed past in the 'Adventure' after having become separated from Captain James Cook during Cook's second Pacific voyage of exploration.

Within four years 'St Patricks Head' appeared on published maps and is the oldest Irish place name in Australia, documented 15 years before the First Fleet arrived at Botany Bay. In early exploration of the Break O'Day, the pyramid peak of Paddy's Head would have acted as a reference point, in the same way as the peaked roof of the TARDIS signals the location of the Tasmanian Automatic Regional Destination Indicator Station at St Marys.

St Marys Pass 1842 - 1845 commemorates the building of the Pass by convicts based at the Probation Station at Grassy Bottom, as a vehicular route for carts and drays from the valley through the Eastern Highlands to the coast at Falmouth. The Pass provided a northern access to and from the future township, which was named after the Pass, not the other way round.

St Marys 1857 commemorates the survey of the township site in 1857 and the sale of the first township lots in December 1857. The town was named in recognition of the use of 'near St Marys Pass' as an address by settlers over the previous 10 years. While the township was not officially 'proclaimed' until 1864, town lots were sold between 1857 - 1860, and the township appeared on Wellers Map 1858 as 'a township not yet settled'. The original township was located entirely to the north of the Rivulet, bounded by Cameron St to the west, and almost to the top of the Pass to the east, with a narrow strip between the Rivulet and Pass Road.

So, the Library, St Marys Bakery and St Marys Butcher, Top Shop, BP and Caltex Garage are not in the original township site, being south of the Rivulet, but houses along Pass Rd are, because the Rivulet crosses the road at Margison's Creek.

Elephant Pass 1878 commemorates the blazing of the route from Chain of Lagoons to Gray which subsequently became the Elephant Pass by William Meinas who arrived in Tasmania in 1870 on the 'Victoria, and settled at Grey. This route opened St Marys to direct access to the south. Known officially on land titles as 'the road to Swansea', 'the road to the East Coast', 'the road to Chain of Lagoons' or 'the road to Picaninni Point', Elephant Pass did not get its official name until 1906 at the earliest, as the 1905 Electoral Rolls still refer to electors living at 'Mount Logie', the original official name for 'Mount Elephant', even though Walch's Almanac of 1864 refers to 'Mount Elephant' as a locally used name.

There is no reference to our third Pass, the Four Mile Creek Pass, providing access to the town from the coast to the east along Irishtown Road, because no record has yet been found to determine an authoritative date for this route.



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


